Secretary of State Taylor, in . he chief of police, of Columbus, says that 260 harters are only granted to organizations formed for lawful purposes, and that a charter does not authorize any club to act ontrary to the statutes or a city ordinance The communication was called out by a recent decision in the Columbus police court, in which it was held that a social club, duly chartered by the state, could not 4436 0 be prohibited from selling liquor to its members on Sunday. Members of the club were arrested, but discharged on the ground that they were chartered by the state and had a right to make such rules as they desired to govern the membership, even if







Noth ing destroys progress on the farm so much as the expensive scrub. Many farmers have worked hard for many years, supporting scrubs, when to-day they might be enjoying prosperity if they had long ago used only pure-bred stock. They have saved the small cost necessary to procure pure breeds, and paid an annual tax to the scrub every year, greater than the cost of improve Pork raising should to some extent be part of the routine of every well-conlucted farm. It should be followed up onsistently, whether prices are high or low; but when they are low it requires careful attention to make the feeding profitable. The experience gained in
