decidedly superior in strength to Admiral Togo's fleet, but there is nothing authoritative to support such a report. The situation, so far as Vice Admiral Rojestvensky is concerned, is not materially different from the time when the Port Arthur squadron was first defeated. It is known that Admiral Rojestvensky had alternative instructions when he sailed covering such a contingency as has now arisen. So far as known, he has no intention of altering his plans owing to General Stoessel's surrender.

Russia Will Fight It Out. London, Jan. 3 .- The capitulation of Port Arthur was the one topic of discussion from the street corners, where groups were sheltered from the driv ing snow, to the comfortable service clubs, the legations and the residences and offices of cabinet ministers. Everywhere the utmost admiration was expressed for the defenders and the attacking army, and the probability that General Nogi has made concessions to the gallant General Stoessel is received with much satisfaction. The announcement of the fall of the Russian stronghold created little surprise in official and diplomatic circles, where it had been discounted by recent events. At the Russian embassy the same spirit of determination to prosecute the war to the bitter end was expressed. In fact, it was confidently stated that Russia would only regard the surrender of Port Arthur in the light of a fresh incentive and would spare no efforts for its recapture.

Kuronatkin Threatened. Paris, Jan. 3 .- The news of the serrender of Port Arthur created a profound impression here and was the universal theme of conversation in official and diplomatic quarters and with the public generally. The newspapers discuss the matter at much length and in a tone of sidness. Berlin, Jan. 3,--On the bourse the Port Arthur news tended to lower prices a half point. So soon as the report reached the bourse powerful financial influences immediately met it with statements that the Russian government would not deviate in the slightest from its determination to fight out the war, and by repeating tl figures recently put forward that Russian finances, as shown by the expenditure of less than \$400,000,000 over the usual budget since the war began, would permit Russia continuing the war for 10 years without reaching a breaking point.

Criticise General Stoessel.

Tokyo, Jan. 3.-General Stoessel is being sharply criticised for destroying the Russian warships, attempting to hoke the entrance to the harbor of Port Arthue and dispatching the torpedo-hoat destroyers to Chefoo subsequent to his offer to surrender the fortress. The Nichi Nich says that

while General Stoessel made a gallant defense, his action in blowing up the ships after he had offered to surrender leaves a lasting blemish upon his military reputation. His action indicates a want of sincerity and leaves no room for an extension of treatment of him commensurate with the reputation won by the bravery and gallantry of his defense. #### Is Added At The Mt. Vernon Electric Light Plant.

Has Recently Been Installed At The Plant

have added new machinery to their the accident. plant which now makes it one of the finest small plants in this part of the built to any of the neighboring towns family to this city. this company will be able to supply all the power needed. A Westinghouse motor-generator

has been installed and this supplies all the stationary motors that the merchants are using in their places of business and residences. A series of transformers have been added to the equipment so that the current is sent out of the station from 100 to 4000 voltage as may be needed. The general electric switch board is of Vermont marble and by the use of the metor attachments, all current generated at the station is recorded before leaving the station.

With the use of the meter system, the amount of electricity used for lighting and power is recorded four times each day. In a short time another large engine will be added to the plant to generate more power for the railway so that more cars can be run on the present lines, and also to help supply the electricity for the street lighting. This addition will be made in a few weeks as the lighting business has increased to such an extent as to make it necessary for new machinery. A private line has been built to the
