The paper adds that the North sea incident has shown that Rojstvensky is a man whom it is dangerous to tamper with, and advises the British government to call off its "official spies" and thereby prevent the possibility of the occurrence "in the Indian ocean of an incident which will be regrettable alike to Great Britain, Russia and the whole of Europe."

Fall Announced.
St. Petersburg, Jan. 3.—The Novoe Vremya and the Russ briefly and sorrowfully announce the fall of Port Arthur. Those journals say that it will be sad news to Russians, though it had been expected and regarded as inevitable for weeks past. Both papers call upon the country passionately not to let the blood shed during the last seven and a half months in defense of the fortress go for naught, but to continue the war with the same steadfastness of purpose as before.

Reform Manifesto.
St. Petersburg, Jan. 3.—The committee of ministers has begun meetings to discuss the reform manifesto. A privately convened conference of representatives of the government and of private shipbuilding yards has also elected the first of a series of meetings to discuss plans for rebuilding the Russian navy.

Chadwick Sees His Wife.
Cleveland, O., Jan. 3.—Dr. Leroy S. Chadwick again visited his wife at the county jail. They were together for half an hour. The physician is experiencing no trouble in seeing his wife. There will be no conflict between the new sheriff and United States Marshal Chandler. All who have a right to see Mrs. Chadwick are being accommodated.

New York, Jan. 3.—Nathan Loeser, receiver in the bankruptcy proceedings against Mrs. Cass L. Chadwick in Cleveland, arrived here to look up some of his property which he believes is in this city.

Annual Report For The Year Shows There Were Just Forty Runs
The following is the report of U. G. Pickard, chief of the fire department, for the year 1904. Runs made by the department during the year are as follows: January 6 alarms, February 7 alarms, March 3 alarms, April 4 alarms, May 4 alarms, June no alarms, July 3 alarms, August 1 alarm, September no alarm, October 2 alarms, November 5 alarms, December 5 alarms. Total 40.
During February, April and December there was a false alarm in each month.
The class of buildings where fire was contained was as follows: frame 26, brick 10 freight cars 1.
Cause of fire from gas grates, stoves, furnaces, and gas jets 15, cigarettes and cigars 5, sparks 5, matches 5, defective flues 1, bonfires 2, lamp explosion 1, sky rocket 1.

Number of times chemicals used 6.

That The Parish Was Now Free From Debt
Father Mulhane Makes His Annual Report And Gives Five Hundred Dollar To The Church
Rev. L. W. Mulhane made an interesting report to his congregation on Sunday, stating that the parish was completely free from debt, the last note with interest on Calvary cemetery having been paid. It is needless to say the people were pleased and the church bells were rung in honor of the event.
During his rectorship of the parish nearly \$125,000 has been expended in current expenses in paying off the old debt, in building a new school house, purchasing property for a cemetery and improving the old buildings. Father Mulhane also said that during his pastorate he had baptized 540 persons, of whom 62 were converted to the church; had solemnized 126 marriages, attended 331 funerals; prepared 441 for first Holy Communion and 445 for confirmation.
The rector also stated that if the parish desired a new church he would gladly and freely step down and out and resign, for as far as he was concerned he had no ambition at his time of life to undertake the work—especially the burden of raising the money.
For 30 years Rev. Mulhane said he had been engaged here and other places in lifting church debts and felt now it was time to take a rest. He also stated that since coming to Mt. Vernon, he had devoted all the money he had derived from his pen and lectures to the church and in fact it was through his donation of \$500 that the last of the debt was lifted.

When The Fact Was Made Known Sunday
By Members of St. Vincent De Paul's Church

GREAT REJOICING
During the past few weeks the Mt. Vernon Electric Light & Railway Co. have added new machinery to their plant which now makes it one of the finest small plants in this part of the state, and should an electric line be built to any of the neighboring towns this company will be able to supply all the power needed.
A Westinghouse motor-generator has been installed and this supplies all the stationary motors that the merchants are using in their places of business and residences. A series of transformers have been added to the equipment so that the current is sent out of the station from 100 to 4000 voltage as may be needed. The general electric switch board is of Vermont marble and by the use of the motor attachments, all current generated at the station is recorded before leaving the station.
With the use of the meter system, the amount of electricity used for lighting and power is recorded four times each day. In a short time another large engine will be added to the plant to generate more power for the railway so that more cars can be run on the present lines, and also to help supply the electricity for the street lighting. This addition will be made in a few weeks as the lighting business has increased to such an extent as to make it necessary for new machinery.
A private line has been built to the iron yards of Jacob Dubinsky, on South Main street, to operate a large pair of shears that are run by a fifteen horse power motor. The shears cut a piece of iron four inches thick and will turn out 30,000 pounds per day.
