according to reports here.

The field has 35 new wells, which produced 400 barrels the first 24 hours. In April, there were 40 new wells, with an output of 631 barrels.

New work is increasing, despite the decrease in the price of crude oil. Eighty rigs up and drilling were reported at the end of the month.
