COURSE OF INSTRUCTION, &C.

ADMISSION.

None can be admitted into the Preparatory School unless they shall have completed their tenth year, nor in the lowest class in College unless they shall have completed their fourteenth year.

A candidate for admission into College must produce written testimonials of a good moral character.

For admission into the Preparatory School the candidate must be able to spell correctly and read and write with facility.

For admission into the Freshman Class, the candidate must be well versed in Arithmetic, Geography, the Grammars of the English, Latin and Greek Languages, Sallust, Cicero's Orations, Æneid of Virgil, and the Greek Reader, with Latin and Greek Prosody.

The regular time for application for admission is at the commencement of the term.

No admission can be for a period less than a year. Upon admission, the regular bill for one year must be deposited with the Treasurer. After the first year, the term bill will be required in advance for each half term.

Two dollars will be charged to each Student, which will entitle him to the attendance of the College Physician during the year.

Persons admitted to an advanced class must pass an examination on the studies pursued by the class which they wish to enter, or an equivalent.

The year is divided into one Term of 40 weeks, and one Vacation of 12. The Commencement takes place on the *first Wednesday in August*.

Persons not candidates for a degree may attend on branches of the College Course in connexion with the regular classes. This partial course is so far restricted that no one can deviate from the regular course without the written request of his Parent or Guardian, and the assent of the Faculty: No Student may recite in one of the dead languages without attending to the other, nor pursue one part of the scientific course without reciting in all parts studied by his class, and no Student pursuing a partial course shall be regarded as a member of the regular College classes.

The course of Intellectual and Moral Philosophy and Rhetoric is inseparably associated with the Classical and Scientific courses.

There are two regular and public examinations, one at the middle of the term, the other at the end of the year, one week before the annual commencement.

Twenty weeks from the date of the admission of undergraduates will be a season of probation, during which the Faculty will judge from the deportment and diligence of a Student whether it be expedient that he remain at the Institution.

Every Student is required to sign a promise that while a member of the Institution he will neither use profane language, nor gamble, nor drink ardent spirits, except in case of sickness, by permission in writing, of the College Physician.

The Faculty will insist rigorously upon the terms of admission into College, and will make the examinations a thorough test of the intellectual attainments and character of the Students.

All persons producing satisfactory evidence of having been admitted as Candidates for Orders with full qualifications, according to the Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church, may be received as students in the Theological Seminary. All others may be admitted who shall produce satisfactory evidence of Christian character and of classical and general education, as well as, of such dispositions and habits as may render them apt and meet to exercise the Ministry. All candidates for admission will be required to pass a satisfactory examination on the Greek Grammar and the Greek text of the Gospels and Acts of the Apostles, with a view to their qualifications for a critical study of the New Testament. Students, who may not be qualified in classical and other attainments for admission to the Seminary, may avail themselves of the instructions in the College.

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During the whole College course, a portion of the Greek Testament will be critically read every week.

There will be frequent exercises in Composition and Declamation; also written Translations from the Latin and Greek into English, and *vice versa*.

The Professor of Natural Philosophy may give extra instruction, with extra charges, in Civil Engineering, Architecture and Topographical Drawing. Extra classes may also be formed in Hebrew, German, French and Spanish.

LECTURES.—The Vice President will deliver a Course of Lectures on Natural Philosophy.

The Professor of Chemistry and Natural Science will deliver during the Winter, Courses of Lectures on Chemistry, and on Natural History, including the Physiological and Zoological characters of the Human race. During Summer, on Mineralogy and Geology; and on Vegetable Physiology, with the Classifications of Botany; and the Applications of Chemistry to Agriculture and Domestic Economy.

EXPENSES.

Students in the Preparatory Department under 15 years of age, will be charged for Instruction, Board, Fuel, Room-rent, Light,

Washing, Bed and Bedding, with the care of their persons, and clothes during forty weeks of Term time, *One Hundred Dollars*.

All other Undergraduates will pay for the forty-weeks of Term time,—For Instruction - - - \$30 00

For Board at the College table, per week,* \$1, 40 00

Room rent in a room with a stove, per annum, 4 00

Do in a room with a fire-place, 6 00

Beneficiaries, supported by Benevolent Societies, or by Individuals, with a view to the Ministry, and sons of Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, whether in the Preparatory School or the College, will receive their instruction gratuitously and be charged for board, room rent, and incidental expenses, \$50. Students in the Theological Seminary will receive their instruction gratuitously, and be charged for board, room rent and incidental expenses \$50.

* Board may be had in private families at \$1 25.
