### Town Gospel and Short Items of News Picked up Here and There.

—Rev. Sydney Strong is booked for a free lecture in the Disciple church, Centerburg, Friday of this week.

—A meeting of the Licking County Teachers' association will be held at 10:30 a. m. Saturday, October 20th.

—It is expected that the new Fourth Ward school building will be ready for occupancy by the first of the year.

—The new election of the Sanitation board was not in operation last week, and is said to give abundant satisfaction.

—Julius Weiss skipped out again last week, and went to Wheeling. He seems bent on going to London in the world.

—Rev. E. J. Jones of Newark, occupied the pulpit of the Baptist church, Sunday, and delivered two very interesting sermons.

—The Gann school district board, to the amount of \$5,000, were sold Saturday to Spitzer & Co., of Toledo at a premium of \$115.

—The State Convention of the Baptist Church will be held at Zanesville next week. Over 400 delegates are expected to be present.

—An effort is being made to revive the secret society known as the Order of Red Men, that once had a flourishing organization in this county.

—Hon. J. C. Fomereau, the Democratic candidate for Circuit Judge in this district, has his calling and election sure. There is no other nominee for the office.

—Governor Russell and staff of Massachusetts, passed through here Monday on a B. & O. special, enroute to Chicago to attend the World's Fair opening exercises.

—Rev. J. H. Hamilton on Wednesday of last week, performed the marriage ceremony uniting four Knox county couples, including four of his previous wards in that direction.

—During Sunday night the large barn of E. Schraeder of Liberty township, Licking county, was set on fire and destroyed with all its contents. The loss is about \$2,000.

—The Knights of the Golden Eagle will dedicate their new hall at Amity, Saturday, October 29, followed by an oyster supper in the evening. Grand Noble Chief Alexander, of Springfield, will officiate on the occasion.

—The contractors have been directed to a combination with the clerk of the weather as the most favorable conditions exist for the rapid completion of the pieces of work.

—A newly organized brass band, under the leadership of S. C. Spragg, made their debut on the streets Saturday evening, to see how the bluff would work on the people. Being under police protection, no trouble occurred.

—A small freight wreck occurred on the side-track leading from the B. & O. main track to the C. & G. Cooper warehouse Monday forenoon. Four box cars jammed the track and several hours were consumed in getting them back on the rails.

—Elmer Fry was dismissed in Square Barker's Court, last week, from the charge of embezzlement, the prosecuting witness failing to produce the testimony that he agreed to. From that fact can be learned the prosecution was in the nature of spite work.

—Mr. Erving Sims, President of the Knox county Farmers' Institute at Fredericktown, has received notice from Secretary N. L. Bonham of Licking county that an institute had been granted for Fredericktown this year, but as yet no date has been given.

## THE CITY WINS.

### Judge Waigh Denies the Temporary Injunction on the Public Square

As indicated in the last BANNER Judge Waigh rendered a decision Saturday in the case brought by R. C. Kirk, G. A. Jones, H. L. Curtis and others, to resist the payment of the special assessment for paving the Public Square, by refusing the temporary injunction prayed for.

At the request of the BANNER Judge Waigh dictated his decision, which was reduced to writing, and is as follows:

"I have read the petition of the petitioners, the City of Mt. Vernon, and the owners of the City of Mt. Vernon, for the purpose of public buildings, etc., under the laws of Ohio, vests possession and control in the Council of the city. For the purposes of such dedication, the petitioners have the right to assess back on the abutting property the expense of improvement for street purposes, follows the right to use it."

Second, Those of the plaintiffs who joined in the request of the City Council to the Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, to make it necessary to establish a street over other portions of the Square, would be thereby estopped from denying the right of the city to use any other portion of the Square for street purposes."

While at Newark last week, Judge Waigh stated that the pleadings and briefs were submitted to Judge Knickerbocker for the decision was announced, and he concurred in the above opinion.
