CROOKEDNESS

Charged Against an Army Officer, a Supervisor of Public Work.

Mobile, Ala., Jan. 8.—Secret Service

Agent E. P. McAdams arrested in this eity Captain C. W .King, quartermaster and supervisor of the government work at Fort Morgan, Ala. McAdams, with a local detective as witness, searched Captain King and found \$1 .-000 in bills, King, it is alleged, telling them that if it was of any value to them to know he would say he had received the money from Contractor J. H. Hobson. All the bills had previously been recorded and marked. Hobson told McAdams that this was the second thousand dollars paid to King by him. King was taken before United States Commissioner Rickarby for preliminary examination.

Hobson testified before the commisdoner that for some time he had been having trouble in carrying out his contracts on buildings at Fort Morgan, about 50 per cent of the material he furnished being rejected as unsatisfactory. About eight months ago King approached him and substantially said that if Hobson made an arrangement with him he would not be so hard on him. The amount said to have been named by King was \$5,000, and as failure on the contract meant ruin, Hobson agreed to pay \$3,000. Hobson says he paid King \$500 in October, \$500 in November and \$1,000 yesterday. King was bound over in \$10,000. He is a volunteer officer, hailing from Iowa, and has well-to-do connections

Doctors' Fatal Quarrel. Alexandria, La., Jan. 8 .- Dr. S. D. Bevill was shot and killed by Dr. C. J. Gremillion on the streets of this place. It is said that Dr. Bevill was attending Louis Sterk and the family asked for a consulting physician and Dr. Gremillion was called. He and Dr. Bevill did not agree in their diagnosis of the case. Dr. Bevill claimed that Dr. Gremillion influenced the Sterk family to discharge him and then Dr. Gremillion was given the case and he called in another doctor as consulting physician. Dr. Bevill was greatly incensed and when the men met they quarreled, with the above result.

# NOT TO SIGN THE NOTE

Was the Order China Forwarded to Her Plenipotentiaries.

## NEWS IS NOW CONFIRMED.

China Took Up the Objections of the Southern Viceroys.

### PRINCE CHING SAYS IT IS TOO LATE.

Reported That the Plenipotentiaries Will Sign the Note Regardless of Instructions of the Empress-May Lose Their Heads.

Peking, Jan. 8.-The report that the Chinese court has instructed the Chinese peace envoys to refuse to sign the joint note of the powers to China is confirmed. The court referred to the objections of the southern viceroys, which are the same as the court have. Prince Ching, however, informed the cour. that it was too late, and s reply from the court is expected

Two Will Sign.

Peking, Jan. 8.-Agreements identical for each nation were presented to Prince Ching. Those close to Prince have decided to sign, even if they lose latest orders in the court. Others, who are apparently equally close, say they will not sign immediately, asserting also that there are two factions surrounding the court, equally strong, and that it would be impolitic for the Chinese plenipotentiaries at present to act for themselves.

Commercial Treaty With China.

Shanghai, Jan. 8 .- Sir Ernest Mason Satow, British minister to China, has proposed to other foreign envoys the draft of a commercial treaty with China based upon the following conditions: Freedom for all coasting vessels; freedom for all vessels upon inland waters, especially the Yang-Tse-Kiang; permission to import foreign salt; adoption of regulations encouraging Chinese investments in foreign concernrs; steps extending China's exports and imports; protection of trademarks; the protection of treaty ports.

Waldersee Won't Quit.

Peking, Jan. 8.-Count Von Waldersee says that China's request through her representatives at foreign courts that the expeditions should cease can not be complied with at present. In the afternoon he went to Rendville to see a customer and was returning to Corning to remain over night when he was killed.

Seems to Have Caught France's Favor.

## **WOULD ANNEX BELGIUM**

A Secret Proposal Alleged to Have Recently Been Made by France.

BELGIANS STIRRED BY THE EXPOSE.

Strained Relations Between Colombia and Venezuela - American Physician's Grievance Against the Portuguese.

Brussels, Jan. 8 .- The military committee which is studying the reorganization of the defense of Belgium has been informed, in support of the government's project, that General Zurlinden (former French minister of war) proposed in 1897 to the superior war council that France annex Belglum and that the Belgian minister at Paris notified his government of this fact. The statement has caused a sensation in Belgium and has attracted much attention in France. Baron D'Anethan, the Belgian minister at Paris, denies that he has attributed his declaration to General Zurlinden. He admits he sent his government cuttings from newspapers containing similar assertions, but he refrained from comment on them.

Charges of a Doctor. Dalton, Ga., Jan. 8.-Dr. Herbert Mc-Auley of Chicago is in the city, the guest of his brother, the mayor of Dalton. Twenty months ago Dr. McAuley enlisted in the Red Cross service at Chicago with other surgeons and nurses to go to South Africa. About eight weeks ago, he says, while en route home, he was summarily arrested on Portuguese soil and jailed. which, he alleges, was without cause. Surgical instruments to the value of \$10,000 were confiscated. The matter was referred to the state department, and is now in diplomatic channels. Dr. McAuley demands \$100,000 indemnity of Portugal.

Relations Strained.

Kingston, Jamaica, Jan. 8.-Letters received here from Panama say the relations between Colombia and Venezuela are much strained in consequence of the latter's connivance with and the assistance being given to the revolutionists in the former country. The activity of the rebels, it is added, only restrains Colombia from taking warlike measures against Venezuela even now Colombian troops are moved to the border. The rebels


