A STATEMENT OF THE COURSE OF INSTRUCTION, EXPENSES, &c.

IN THE
THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY OF THE DIOCESE OF OHIO,
KENYON COLLEGE,
AND KENYON PREPARATORY SCHOOLS.

This Institution was originally chartered as a Theological Seminary. Subsequently an additional charter was granted, conferring upon the Institution the name and all the privileges of a College. For the convenience of those intending to become members of the College, or of the Theological Seminary, as well as to prepare young men to engage in the active duties of life, without taking a full College course, a Grammar School has been established, divided into a Junior and Senior Preparatory Department. So that the Institution now consists of four distinct departments: the Theological Seminary, the College, the Senior and Junior Preparatory Schools.

The location of this Institution contributes much to the attainment of the ends for which it was established. It is situated nearly in the centre of Ohio, at a distance from any city or village, in an elevated and healthy position, and in a neighborhood peculiarly free from the temptations and dangers to which young men are often exposed. The authorities of the Institution have the exclusive control of the lands, belonging to the Corporation, extending about a mile and a half in each direction from the College buildings. No portion

of these lands can be sold ; but are leased on such conditions and to such persons, that it is confidently believed, no influence from this source of an injurious tendency will be exerted.

It may also be proper to state that facilities for Manual Labor are, to some extent, afforded. Land of the best quality is devoted to this object:—Labor may be performed on this land by Students at such times and in such manner as shall be prescribed; the avails of which will be subject to their own disposal.

From experience it is found that a student skilful in any branch of *mechanical* labor, may, without difficulty, pay all his College bills.

The parents and guardians of Students connected with this Institution, in its various departments, having learned from painful experience that youth, if not checked, are apt, often from mere thoughtlessness, to contract heavy debts, have frequently expressed a desire that the expenditures of their sons and wards might be placed under some regulation and control. An arrangement has accordingly been made by which their wishes in this particular may be fulfilled.

The Treasurer of the College will take charge of all monies which parents and guardians may remit for the use of students, and disburse them according to such rules as they may lay down, or, if no directions are given by parents and guardians, according to the best of his judgment, taking counsel when necessary of the President. It is considered, however, by the Faculty of the Institution, altogether preferable that those who supply the funds should give particular directions in regard to the manner of laying them out, and it is earnestly requested that they will do so. When funds are not provided by parents and guardians, and they choose to have accounts opened at stores to supply the wants of students,—here also the same control can be exercised. The necessity of particular directions in this case, is even greater than in the former.

JUNIOR PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT.

COURSE OF STUDIES.

Spelling, Reading, Writing, Geography, Arithmetic, English Grammar, Book-Keeping, Latin and Greek, Declamation, Composition, Sacred Music and the Scriptures.

The following Text Books are used in the School :

Emerson's 1st and 2d Class Book; Malte Brun and Olney's Geography; Smith's Arithmetic; Smith's English Grammar; Andrews' and Stoddard's Latin Grammar; Jacob's Latin Reader; Anthon's Cicero's Select Orations; Virgil; Anthon's Valpy's Greek Grammar; Jacob's Greek Reader; Bible; Hale's History of the United States.

Spending money designed for the use of the boys, must be deposited with the Principal.

The pupils are entirely separated from the students in the other departments; the Hall being at the distance of a quarter of a mile from the other buildings. They lodge and board in the same building with their Instructors—their clothes are in the charge of a person employed for this purpose—they study under the eye of their Instructors—attend morning and evening prayers—are instructed in the Scriptures once a week, and attend Church with the other students.

COURSE OF STUDIES.

English Grammar; Arithmetic; Ancient and Modern Geography; Latin and Greek Languages; Book-Keeping;

Algebra; Geometry; Trigonometry; Surveying; Natural Philosophy; Chemistry; Rhetoric; Composition and Declamation.

Text Books used:

Smith's English Grammar; Smith's Arithmetic; Andrew's & Stoddard's Latin Grammar; Jacob's Latin Reader; Virgil; Anthon's Cicero's Select Orations; Anthon's Valpy's Greek Grammar; Jacob's Greek Reader; Greek Testament; Conversations on Natural Philosophy; Conversations on Chemistry; and in other branches the same books as are used in the Collegiate Department.

Students in this Department room in the College building, furnish their own rooms with furniture, and supply themselves with fuel, lights, &c. They are required, however, to study six hours each day, in a school room, under the eye of an instructor. For those who design to enter College, a regular course of study is prescribed. Those, not designing to pursue a full Collegiate course, can pursue any particular branch of study to any extent they may desire.

KENYON COLLEGE.

TERMS OF ADMISSION.

Candidates for admission to the Freshman Class are examined in Arithmetic, Geography, English Grammar, Andrews' and Stoddard's Latin Grammar, Anthon's Valpy's Greek Grammar,* six books of the *Æneid* of Virgil, 12 Orations of

* The deficiency of most candidates for admission, in the Latin and Greek Grammars, Geography and Arithmetic, makes it necessary to remark, that the examination in these subjects will be strict and comprehensive; and that no student will be admitted, who is not well acquainted with them.

Cicero, Jacob's Greek Reader, the Gospel of St. Matthew and the Acts of the Apostles, with Latin and Greek Prosody.

Persons admitted to an advanced standing must pass an examination in the studies pursued by the class they wish to enter, or an equivalent.

The stated time of examination for admission is on the day preceding Commencement, but persons may be examined at any other time in the College sessions.

Testimonials of good moral character are in all cases required; and twenty weeks from the date of admission will be a season of probation, during which the Faculty will judge from the deportment and diligence of a student, whether it be expedient that he remain at the Institution.

Every Student in the Collegiate and Preparatory Departments is required to sign a promise, that while a member of the Institution he will neither use profane language, nor gamble, nor drink ardent spirits.

COURSE OF STUDIES.

FRESHMAN CLASS.

1st. TERM.—Sallust; Cicero de Contemnenda Morte; Xenophon's *Anabasis*; English Grammar; Arithmetic Reviewed; Davies' Bourdon's Algebra; Porter's Analysis.

2d. TERM.—Folsom's Livy; Herodotus; Davies' Legendre's Geometry; Logarithms, and Trigonometry.

Through the Year—Dilloway's Roman, and Cleveland's Greek Antiquities; Exercises in Reading, Declamation and Composition; Translations from Latin to English and from English to Latin.

SOPHOMORE CLASS.

1st. TERM.—*Iliad*; Horace—Odes and Satires; Davies' Descriptive Geometry; Shades, Shadows, and Perspective; History.

2d. TERM.—Xenophon's Memorabilia; History; Cicero de Officiis; Quintilian; Davies' Surveying and Mensuration; Bridge's Conic Sections.

Through the Year.—Compositions, Declamations, and Translations.

JUNIOR CLASS.

1st. TERM.—Tacitus; Horace—Ars Poetica; Chemistry; Olmsted's Natural Philosophy; Blair's Lectures; Whately's Logic.

2d. TERM.—Whately's Rhetoric; Plato; Chemistry; Olmsted's Natural Philosophy; Demosthenes—Pro Corona.

Through the Year.—Translations and Compositions; Declamations—Selected and Original.

SENIOR CLASS.

1st. TERM.—Upham's Intellectual Philosophy; Natural Theology; Say's Political Economy; *Œdipus Rex* and *Medea*.

2d. TERM.—Wayland's Moral Science; McIlvaine's Evidences of Christianity; Butler's Analogy; Constitution of the United States; Geology; Herschel's Astronomy.

Through the Year.—Compositions and Original Declamations.

Classes in the Modern Languages may be formed during any part of the College Course by permission of the Faculty.

MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS AFFECTING ALL DEPARTMENTS.

ATTENDANCE.

Punctual attendance is required at Church, and at morning and evening prayer, as well as on other College exercises.—

An account is kept of all delinquencies in these duties, which, together with a report of Scholarship, is published monthly in the Gambier Observer.

EXAMINATIONS.

All the Students are examined at the close of the first session.

The Senior Class two weeks previous to the first Wednesday in September.

The other Students during the week before Commencement.

PUBLIC EXHIBITIONS.

The Junior Class at the close of the first session.

Commencement on the first Wednesday of September.

VACATIONS AND TERMS.

The first Vacation, from Commencement, eight weeks.

The first Term, twenty weeks.

The second Vacation, from the end of the first term, four weeks.

The second Term, twenty weeks.

The next Spring Term commences April 18th, 1838.

EXPENSES.

IN THE JUNIOR PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT—

For board, tuition, room rent, bed and bedding, washing, fuel, lights, and Physician's attendance, per annum, \$120
Incidental expenses, from \$2 to \$3

In addition to the above, \$5 must be deposited with the Treasurer, at the commencement of each Term, for contingent expenses, such as books, stationary, mending, &c.—the balance, if any, to be refunded at the end of each term.

At the commencement of every term, each Student must deposit with the Treasurer \$2 to pay for damages which may be done by students to the College buildings during the term—the balance, if any, to be refunded to the Student at the close of the term.

THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

BY-LAWS.

OF THE PROFESSORS.

1. The instructions of this Seminary shall be carried on by the following Professors. viz:—

1. A Professor of Pastoral Divinity and Sacred Rhetoric.
2. A Professor of the Evidences of Christianity and Systematic Divinity.
3. A Professor of Oriental and Greek Literature and Biblical Interpretation.
4. A Professor of Ecclesiastical History and Church Government.

2. These Professors, including the Bishop of the Diocese, who is ex-officio President, shall have the exclusive government of the Theological Students; and shall, for the maintenance of discipline, and for securing the full benefit of the prescribed course of theological study, hold meetings from time to time, and adopt such regulations subordinate to these by-laws, and in consonance with them, as may be thought advisable.

OF THE STUDENTS.

1. Any candidate for orders in the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, may, on examination, be receiv-

ed as a student in this Seminary: or any other person who may give sufficient evidence of a fair moral and religious character.

2. Every Student shall, on his admission into the Seminary, subscribe the following declaration in the matriculation book of the Seminary:—"We the subscribers, Students in the Theological Seminary of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Ohio, do solemnly promise, with reliance on Divine Grace, that we will faithfully obey the laws and prosecute the studies thereof, endeavor to promote the reputation and interests of the Seminary, and make daily effort by pious reading, self-examination, and secret prayer, to cultivate all religious and moral dispositions and habits, and grow in those graces which should characterize the Christian and the Minister of the Cross."

3. No Student shall be admitted, or expelled, or receive a regular dismission, without the approbation of the President.

4. On the admission of a Student, his name shall be entered in a book to be kept by the Faculty for that purpose, with the time of his admission. When he leaves the Institution, the time of his departure also shall be registered.

5. Every Student, unless excused by the President, shall attend morning and evening prayers at the Chapel of the Institution, with the members of the other departments.

6. No Student shall absent himself from recitation, without first obtaining permission from the officer to whom he was to recite.

7. Every Student in this Seminary must be a member of one of the classes, and engage in all the studies which appertain to that class.

8. No Student shall absent himself from a public examination of his class, unless authorized by the President, without forfeiting his standing in the Institution.

9. Theological Students may, by permission of the Theological Faculty, attend, gratuitously, any recitation in the Collegiate department of the Institution.

10. Each Student may have from the Library, at any time, any number of volumes, not exceeding ten, exclusive of text books in the Greek and Hebrew languages.

PREPARATORY QUALIFICATIONS AND COURSE OF STUDIES.

1. The literary qualifications for admittance into the Junior Class, are, a knowledge of the general principles of Natural, Intellectual and Moral Philosophy and Rhetoric, and such an acquaintance with the Latin and Greek Languages as will enable the Student to construe and parse Sallust, Cicero's Orations, Virgil's *Aeneid*, Jacob's Greek Reader, or the *Cyropedia*, and the four Gospels and Acts of the Apostles, especially the two last. Candidates for admission must also present a specimen of English Composition.

In order to enter a higher class, the candidate must have passed a satisfactory examination on the studies of the lower.

2. The full course of study in this Seminary shall occupy three years, the Junior, Middle and Senior, each year comprising two terms; and the Students shall be divided into three classes corresponding with these years, and indicated by the same names.

3. Of each class the Studies shall be as follows:—

JUNIOR CLASS.

Stuart's Hebrew Grammar, Hebrew Chrestomathy and Hebrew Course; Biblical Geography; Biblical Antiquities; Principles of Interpretation; Septuagint; Stuart's Grammar of the New Testament Dialect; Newcome's Harmony of the Gospels. Lectures are delivered on Biblical Criticism and Biblical Interpretation. Exercises in Sacred Rhetoric during the year.

MIDDLE CLASS.

The Interpretation of the Old and New Testaments will be continued by this Class under the instruction of the Professor of Biblical Learning; and the systematic study of the Doctrines of Natural and Revealed Religion will be commenced with the Professor of Systematic Divinity, who will also give instruction to the class in Ethics and the Evidences of Christianity. The study of Ecclesiastical History also will be begun, with the Professor in that department. Sacred Rhetoric and Pulpit Eloquence continued. Recitations and Lectures in Pastoral Divinity begun.

SENIOR CLASS.

This Class will attend, principally, the Professors of Systematic Divinity, of Ecclesiastical History and Church Government, and of Pastoral Divinity and Sacred Rhetoric, and occasionally the Professor of Biblical Literature, under such arrangements as may be made by the Faculty.

4. The details of this course may be altered and arranged at the will of the Faculty.

EXAMINATIONS.

5. There shall be two public examinations in each year, one at the end of each term.

DIPLOMAS.

6. At the conclusion of a full course of study faithfully pursued, each Student shall receive a Diploma conferring upon him the degree of Bachelor in Divinity.

EXPENSES.

Board per week, from \$1 25 to \$1 50.

No charge is made for Instruction, use of Library, or Room Rent.

TEXT BOOKS.

A Library has been commenced in connexion with Leighton Society in the Theological Seminary, for supplying Theological Students gratuitously with text books. Text books are also furnished to a considerable extent, from the College Library.
