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**STATE AGRICULTURISTS**  
**Outline of the Program for**  
**Annual Convention to be**  
**Held in Columbus.**

Tuesday's session will be devoted to papers and discussion for representative members of the cattle, sheep and swine associations of the State. In the evening the associations will meet in separate rooms for election of officers and transaction of official or routine business.

Prof. J. W. Sanborn, late of the Missouri agricultural experiment station, has been invited to be present to discuss some features of the science and art of feeding. Dr. H. H. Hings, late of the University of Nebraska, has been invited to discuss inoculation as a means of prevention of swine plague.
