A Portion of our Ticket Defeated by Treachery!

Never, in the history of Knox county, was an election contested more earnestly and determinedly than that on Tuesday last, and the immense vote cast shows that both parties did their "level best" to carry the day. Unfortunately for the Democracy, some of our candidates were but little known beyond their own immediate neighborhood, while the Republicans presented candidates of great personal popularity and who, with the liberal use of money, were able to control the "floating vote." The Townships did well—some of them nobly; but here in Mt. Vernon, where the Bondholder's money was poured out like water, unprincipled and treacherous creatures—were they not deserve to be called men—were they not only to vote but to work for the election of three of the candidates on the Republican ticket; and although Governor Allen received a majority of 297, Abel Hart a majority of 405, and Lewis Dibel a majority of 339, out of the largest vote ever cast in the county, (2929), our candidate for Clerk lacked 39, our candidate for Auditor 183, and our candidate for Probate Judge 63 of an election. The Democrats spent enough money to start a National Bank, and bought enough whisky to swim an alligator, but yet they could not carry the county against our noble standard-bearer for Governor. Below, we present the vote for Governor in full, by Townships, and the footings for the County Ticket. Mr. Allen, our candidate for Senator, had no opposition except Mr. Fowler, the Prohibition candidate, who received 153 votes, which is about the strength of that faction in the county.

OHIO ELECTION.
An Immense Vote Polled.
The Result Very Close—Hayes Probably Elected.

The Election on Tuesday called out the largest vote ever polled in Ohio, and considering the extraordinary efforts made by the Bankers and Bondholders, it is surprising that the Democracy were not overwhelmed with defeat. As it is, the result is exceedingly close, with the probabilities that Hayes is elected Governor over Allen by a majority under 1,000. The Democracy made gains in a majority of the agricultural and mining districts, but these were overcome in Cincinnati, Cleveland and other large cities, where the influence of the moneyed oligarchy was exerted and felt. In Hamilton county, where the Democracy were confident of a majority of 5,000, and the Republicans conceded to them 2,500, Hayes has a majority of 600. The Republicans made immense gains in Cuyahoga county, and more particularly in the City of Cleveland, nearly enough to give them the State, brought about by the false alarm of "danger to the Public Schools." All things considered the Democracy have done badly, but the indications are that the Republicans will have a small majority.

Delano's "Exhaustive Labor." Delano, in his letter of resignation to Grant, spoke of "exhaustive labor" and "fidelity to duty." Every one knows this is a huge joke. A statistician has prepared a diagram, which displays in figures the number of days the Secretary was absent from Washington from the date of his appointment, November 1, 1870, to September 30, 1875. The grand total shows that he was absent exactly 742 days or two years and twelve days, forty-two per cent. of the whole time and he has been paid \$16,933 33 for the time he was absent. There are many respectable heads of many respectable families who would willingly undergo the same "exhaustive labor" with the same "fidelity" for half, or even a fourth of the above remuneration.

The great American dead-head, U. S. Grant, has been returning "this week from his trip to Colorado, stopping long enough at each prominent town on the road to eat, drink, smoke and shake hands. Between his landing at Long Branch and riding in Palace Cars, the poor man's labors are immense.

The Labor Reformers of Mass. have entered the field with Wendell Phillips as their candidate for Governor. The Prohibitionists have nominated M. J. Baker as their candidate.

Bloody Results of a Spree.
ATRENS, Oct. 12.—A man named Carey who was returning home in a wagon from this place, was attacked by two Wats brothers a short distance from the city last night when Carey drew a knife, and striking a back kick, severed the jugular vein of one of the brothers. They had all been drinking and it was that old feud existed between the parties. All the parties resided near Harmen in this county. Carey was arrested and is now in jail at this place.

A proposition is pending in the Texas Constitutional Convention forbidding judges, prosecuting attorneys and jurors, under the influence of intoxication liquor, from exercising their duties. It seems somewhat singular that an evil of this kind should have become so serious as to require a Constitutional restriction.

General O. O. Howard, the later Harvelock, having run the Freedmen's Bureau into bankruptcy upon his system of reform, has attempted to show the army and saints of Portland, Oregon, the true way to salvation. During the vacation of the Rev. Mr. Easton, pastor of the Congregational Church, the General preached from the pulpit every Sunday.
