THE business men of New York will hold an immense mass meeting on Oct. 6, in the interest of Cleveland, Thurman and Tariff Reform. The business men of New York are not scared by the Free Trade scare which the Republicans have rigged out.

## Candidate Harrison on the Surplus.

On the nineteenth of September delegations of Republicans from La Porte, Ind., and Watska, Ill., called upon Candidate Harrison at his home in Indianapolis. In response to addresses from the spokesmen of the delegations, Mr. Harrison touched upon the tariff as follows:

"My income is more than our current expenses. There is no authority for the secretary of the treasury to lend the money, and so only three methods of dealing with it present themselves, under the law, to our Democratic friends. First, to lock it up in the treasury vaults second, to let the banks without interest, or third, to use it in the purchase of our bonds not yet due. The objection to the third method was that the withdrawal of so large a sum might result in a monetary stringency; the second obviated this objection by allowing the banks to put the money in circulation, but neither method resulted in any advantage to the government. As to the money it is not to be placed in the treasury interest for its use. By the third method the money would be returned to the channels of trade and the government would make the difference between the premium paid for the bonds and the interest that the bonds would draw if placed in circulation. It is not whether we if government bond bought at the market premium is a good investment for a capitalist, who is free to use his money as he pleases, but whether the finance for the government, having money that it can not use in any other way, to use it in buying up its bonds? If not, it is not whether we will purposely raise money to buy our bonds at a premium, no one would admit, but will we use a surplus that we have on hand and cannot lawfully pay out in any other way?

This is the most important little speech that candidate Harrison has made during the campaign, and it is worthy of careful consideration. In the first place it is not a speech that he admits as true what the Democrats have all along claimed, that "our income is more than our current expenses," the surplus being over one hundred millions of dollars every year. It will be noted, also, that Candidate Harrison speaks of three methods by which this surplus, wrongfully wrung from the people, may be disposed of, viz: 1st, by locking it up in the government vaults, 2d, by loaning it to the banks without interest, and 3d, by buying unmatured bonds at a high premium. The latter idea must have struck his listeners favorably, for they manifested their feelings by applauding the speaker.

The reader will perceive that Candidate Harrison does not meet the real question now at issue between the two great parties of the country, viz: A reduction of the present tariff to the actual requirements of the country, so that this unnecessary and wrongful accumulation of \$100,000,000 in the national treasury every year may be avoided. That is the real question now before the country, and all this Republican talk about "free trade" is gammon and clap-trap, intended to deceive the people. The Republicans ally themselves with the monopolists of the country, and voted away by congress in applications for the benefit of private individuals and corporations, but of no earthly account to the public.

WEDNESDAY, Sept. 19, was lawyer's day at the Ohio Centennial, Columbus. Judge Thurman presided and delivered a fine speech, giving reminiscences and anecdotes of the early members of the bar. Other speeches were made by Hon. W. L. Gilmore, of Columbus; Judge Joseph Cox, of Cincinnati; Hon. M. C. Read, of Hudson; and Hon. Andrew Squire of Cleveland.

SPEAKER CLEVELAND and Senator Blackburn addressed a large barometric meeting at Erlanger, Ky., Wednesday. The speaker spoke at length on how the tariff should be adjusted, but failed to say how he was elected in the Sixth district.—Columbus Journal.

If you really want to know how Mr. Cleveland would reduce the tariff, ask the Democratic party what this tariff reform stopped—the Republicans, representing the monopolists of the country, want it to go on. Choose ye between them.

**Double-Faced Republican Hypocrisy.** The Republican party is a Janus-faced party. It can be for or against any measure, as policy dictates, adapting itself to the side that can give it the most votes. For instance, in the city of Cincinnati, where there is a large foreign element, composed mostly of Germans, who are fond of congregating together on Sunday and drinking their beer, the Republican managers and city officials will not interfere with them, as any violation of the Sunday closing law. There the Republican party has allied itself with the "liquor element," and George Cox, proprietor of a vile gambling den and disreputable gin mill, known as "Murderer's Corner," is not only the Republican political boss, but is the Republican candidate for clerk of the courts, and expects the support of the religious, church-going element in the Republican party, as well as the "whisky vote."

In the city and State of New York, however, quite a different state of affairs prevails. There, the Prohibitionists hold the balance of power, and hence the Republican leaders are making extraordinary efforts to win them over to their side so as to elect "wool-pull" Warner Miller Governor and secure the electoral vote of the State for Harrison and Morton. To bring about this result it is alleged that Governor Hill, who is a candidate for re-election on the Democratic ticket, is supported by the "saloon element," and a powerful effort is being made to prejudice the religious community against him on that account. The men who resort to this method of electioneering, who drink the full share of the whisky and beer that are manufactured, but they regard everything as fair in politics, and will resort to any trick or device to secure votes. But the Prohibitionists perfectly well understand the tactics of these political gamblers, and will be very apt to spurn any overtures they may make.

**Mayor Hewitt Spoils a Despicable Republican Scheme.** Early last week the Republicans sent out a number of brazen-lunged missionaries to lie about the tariff in the manufacturing towns in New Jersey. One of these apostles of malice smuggled himself into Cooper, Hewitt, & Co.'s iron works, at Trenton, and made a tour among the workmen, telling each that the "old man," meaning Mayor Hewitt of New York, was red hot for Harrison and would send his men to vote the Republican ticket.

The Mayor became red-hot, but not for Harrison, when he heard of it, and he at once wrote to Trenton denying the truth of the assertion. "I am a Democrat," he said, "and I would not work against my convictions. I have never tried to influence any men one way or the other. The man who said that I wanted my employees to vote for Harrison told. That is all there is to it."

This House bill to make the Department of Agriculture one of the Executive Departments of the Government, passed the Senate, with some slight amendments on Friday. It provides that the Department of Agriculture shall be an Executive Department, under the supervision and control of a Secretary of Agriculture, who shall be appointed by the President and with the consent of the Senate, who shall perform such duties as may be required by law or prescribed by the President. The Secretary of Agriculture shall receive the same salary as is paid to the Secretary of each of the Executive Departments, and the salary of the Assistant Secretary of Agriculture shall be the same as that now paid to the First Asst. Secretary of the Department of the Interior.

There is a war cloud visible on the Texas border. An armed body of Mexicans crossed over the line and took possession of Rio Grande City, having failed to secure the person of an American named Severe, who killed a Mexican who was resisting arrest for robbery. Gov. Ireland of Texas, ordered several companies of State militia to the scene, and the Secretary of War has ordered the U. S. troops to assist in protecting the lives and property of the Americans. The telegraph wires have been cut and details of the situation can not be obtained.

The Democracy of the Tenth Congressional district assembled in Convention at Fremont on the 19th inst. Senator Zimmerman presided. The names of five gentlemen were presented as candidates for Congress, and on the 45th ballot Col. Wm. E. Haynes, of Sandusky county, received the nomination. He is an able and popular man and will be triumphantly elected, which will make a Democratic gain to Congress. Hon. Frank H. Hurd will not allow his name to go before the Convention.

HON. ROGER C. MILLS, Congressman from Texas, and author of the "Mills Bill," addressed an audience of fifteen thousand at Richmond, Ind., on Thursday last. He discussed the tariff question in an able and satisfactory manner, and showed that the Democratic party has always been the friend of labor, while all the legislation by the Republican party has been in the interest of capital and monopoly. The speech was a masterly effort and gave unbounded satisfaction.

The Republicans have furnished money to a son and nephew of Pat Ford, the renegade, to purchase the New York Freeman's Journal, and convert it into a Republican paper, Maurice F. Egan, its able editor, who is the associate and confidential friend of Mr. McMaster, the founder of the Journal, has withdrawn entirely from the paper. The Irish Democrats are withdrawing their support from the Journal by hundreds and thousands.

A REPUBLICAN paper wants to know what becomes of the surplus \$130,000,000 collected every year above the necessary expenses of the Government. Bless your ignorant soul, you ought to know that the monopolists in Congress, if they had a chance would vote away ten-times \$130,000,000 every year for "improvements" to benefit private individuals and corporations, but of no earthly account to the public.

THE Philadelphia Times (Ind.) says: Senator Sherman's criticism of the Administration for its failure to buy the hogs which he, as Secretary of the Treasury, agreed should run for a time above and beyond the law, is a true copy of the robber taking the times for holding the money in the Fifth Congressional district of Ohio, for the year 1888, and that the same now appears of record on the Journal.

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Word comes from Paris that Mrs. Langtry has affected an arrangement with her English husband by which he will interpose no objections to her proceeding for divorce in this country, and after the knot is untied she will at once marry her devoted admirer, Freddy Gebhardt.

REPUBLICAN ORATORS in Indiana no longer discuss the tariff question, but entertain their audiences with bloody-thirst speeches and abuse President Cleveland. Indiana is an agricultural State and the high tariff is not popular there; hence this change of programme.

ABOUT all the Republican managers are doing now is soliciting contributions from the "protected" monopolists to carry on their campaign of falsehood and slander. They are not meeting with the success that characterized their efforts in former years.

CHARLES GROSVENOR admits that he told the preposterous falsehood in Maine that nine iron furnaces in the Hocking Valley closed down on account of the Mills bill. A man to be a successful Republican stumpster must be wholly devoid of conscience.

THE knowing ones say that Congress will adjourn on the first of October. This means no tariff legislation will be looked for before the Presidential election. The Republicans are afraid to meet the issue fairly and squarely. Shame upon them!

MR. B. HARRISON now, when a candidate for President, says he is opposed to Chinese immigration. A wonderful change has come over the spirit of his dream since he voted fourteen times for Chinese immigration as Senator from Indiana.

THE Judge of the Criminal Court at Memphis, Tenn., has instructed the Grand Jury to indict members of the Cotton Baggins Trust, regardless of the fact that they do not live there. That's the stuff.

## Cleveland, Thurman, Tariff Reform and Victory.

One of the most significant signs of the times is the fact that the Republican managers and speakers refuse to discuss the tariff question with the Democrats, for they well-know that the facts, the truth and the arguments are on the Democratic side. But by insisting on the "free-trade" question, the papers to keep up a senseless and ceaseless cry about "free-trade," they hope to terrify and deceive the honest voters of the country. But this idiotic howl is well-understood. People these times are reading and thinking for themselves. They know that a reduction of 7 per cent in the present tariff will bring relief to thousands upon thousands of people, and it will keep in circulation over one hundred and thirty millions of dollars every year, that under the present oppressive tariff system are locked up in the treasury vaults at Washington. If the Commissioners of Knox county would levy and collect every year from the people \$25,000 above what was needed to meet the necessary expenses of the county, there would be a new mill as was taken the roof from the Court House. And why should the National Government squeeze from the pockets of the people every year \$100,000,000 above what is required to meet the necessary expenses? This robbery must be stopped, and the way to stop it is to vote for Cleveland Thurman and Tariff Reform.

**Daniel O'Connell on "Protection."** A bogus Irishman named Ryan, who is hired by the Republicans to travel over the State and talk nonsense about "English free trade," spoke his little piece in Mt. Vernon a few evenings ago. There is no such an issue as "free trade" just now. But the doctrine of a high protective tariff to rob the laboring man of a large share of his hard earnings, for the benefit of manufacturing nabobs, is an issue in this campaign. Daniel O'Connell, who was one of the ablest men that Ireland ever claimed as a son, told his countrymen over forty years ago what this false claim of "protection" means. Read what he said:

"Protection means an additional six pence for each loaf that is the Irish of it. If it were not for protection the loaf would sell for a shilling, but it is protected it will sell for one and six pence. Protection is the English for spongers, and what is worse, it is the English for the spongers of the poor. The real meaning of protection, therefore, is robbery; robbery of the poor by the rich."
