The Tariff Bill Goes Through.

The report of the Conference Com-

mittee on the Senate amendments to

the McKinley Tariff bill came before

the House on Saturday, and after

brief discussion passed that body by

a strict party vote, under a demand for

the previous question—yeas 152, nays

81. Mr. McKinley, the father of the

bill, explained the measures and the

amendments in a regular political har-

angue, which his friends of course ap-

plauded.

Mr. Flower (N. Y.) characterized the

measure as a cyclone bill. The point

was that the tariff should be no trade

bar between the United States and

foreign countries. It would enable

the manufacturers to combine and

fleece the people, while the farmers

would fail to find relief.

Mr. Cummings (N. Y.) declared that

the doctrine of American protection

was the most pernicious that had ever

permeated the American people. This

bill was not protection to industry, but

was a protection to monopoly, and it

was a protection to the tariff.

But the whole of this tariff

locomotive was screaming, gagged and

When the McKinley bill (or rather

the conference committee's report),

came before the Senate on Monday,

On Tuesday, the conference report

came up for final action. Senator Car-

le, of Kentucky, made a strong

speech against the iniquitous measure,

analyzing its character and making a

critical exposition of its leading fea-

tures, showing that its object was to

impose heavier taxation upon the peo-

ple than was imposed by the tariff

makers. The vote on the passage of

the bill stood: Yeas 33, nays 27. Three

Republican Senators, Messrs. Paddock,

Pettigrew and Plumb voted no with

the Democrats. So the bill passed and

it will doubtless be signed by the Pres-

ident and become a law.

More British Brutality.

When it became known that Patrick

O'Brien, who was arrested at Cardiff

and placed in the Dublin jail, a large

number of leading Irishmen secured

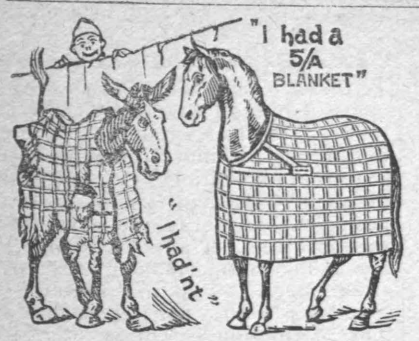
An explosion at the Achme nitro-
