Several of Lord Lansdowne's advisers favor the latter course. Mr. Frye said, made him a "figurehead." Mr. Frye says that when he protested against certain of its provisions he was promised they would be corrected. As the changes were not made Mr. Frye resigned. "The hope of Cuba lies in the great middle class," continued Mr. Frye. "Fully 90 per cent of the people are quiet, peaceful citizens. Educate them and there need be no fear for Cuba.




