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
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

THE POND BILL. The Pond Bill, the full text of which may be seen in another column, has become a law. This is the first step of a practical kind that has been made in this State for many years, to regulate the liquor traffic.

Heretofore we have been treated to esolutions, petitions, frothy temperance harangues, and local hub-bub's of evey conceivable sort, each of which, when it had expended its torce, left the matter just as it was before. In the passage of the Pond Bill a step forward has been made, which will ultimately end in the practical, and to the masses, satisfactory solution of the liquor question. Between the inconsiderate and intemperate zeal of the most radical temperance people and the efforts of the free liquor people, the State has been for many years given over to a helpless and hesitating policy, which has resulted n a widespread feeling of restlessness amongst the conservative masses. It has long been apparent to the people that something should be done to regulate and restrain the evils which have followed from a too free and indiscriminate traffic in intoxicating liquors. Hampered as it is was supposed, by an unfortunate clause in the

State Constitution, the plan of licensing the traffic was dispaired of. In the Pond Bill, if sustained by the courts, the same end has been achieved, and the benefits of a license will be obtained without resorting to the tedious process of amending the Constitution. We believe the principle embodied in the Pond Bill, will meet with popular favor. The Bill as it was passed, may be open to some objections, but in the absence of such

amendments as might render it more fair and just, it will be regarded as a good thing. What faults it possesses can be corrected in the future. If has furnished a foundation upon which to build a system which will inure greatly to the benefit of society and the State, by putting a troublesome business under control, and compeling it, by payment of money, to take from off the better class of citizens a burden of expense which they have too long borne.
