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



The county auditor shall send out the delinquent tax list on dogs, but it is to be separate from other delinguent tax lists, and the same penalty is added as in other delinquent taxes. When the owner refuses to pay the taxes the conpurpose; they did not send us here to kill the dog, for which he receives a fee of \$1. If the officers fail either to collect the delinquent tax or kill the dog, he is liable to a fine of from \$5 to \$10, one-half of which is to go to the informant.
