LOCAL FRIEVITIES.

The annual crop of this year is said to be bumper. An original pension has been granted to George A. Porterfield, Mt. Vernon. The Congregational church has been improved by the addition of a safe. Mary M. Hyatt, former widow of F. H. Banks, Millwood. Monday was Labor Day, but there was no procession or other demonstration at this point.

Chas. Sharp, clerk at the Hotel Fulton Newark, is missing and so is \$74 belonging to the proprietor.

The Hartford Fair opens Sept. 23 and closes the 28th. Large premiums are offered and good races are promised.

A postal card received in this city indicates that ex-Congressman the Count De Lamoignon has been elected to the U. S. Senate.

Councilman Trick is confined to his home in the 8th Ward, by sickness, but his condition is not of an alarming nature.

The monthly meeting of the Y's was held at their room in the Public Library building, Monday night, with a good attendance.

Three or four cases of scarlet fever are reported to the health officer. The disease has attacked the children of a mild form and no fatalities have occurred.

The street lights were shut off for a few hours Tuesday night by a slight accident to the boiler at the electric light station, which was promptly repaired.

Mr. J. B. Blocher has been appointed agent of the Adams express company at Newark. He is a very competent official and is a son of Auditor Blocher of this city.

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NEW OFFICERS.

Auditor Blocher and Treasurer Ralston sworn in.

After seven years of faithful service, Curtis W. McKee, who has graced the Auditor's office during that period, on Monday turned over the books and other effects to his worthy successor, John M. Blocher, who was elected last fall for a term of three years. It goes without saying that Mr. McKee has been one of the most faithful, painstaking and courteous Auditors that the citizens of Knox county have ever called upon to perform their duty. As a mark of esteem the Board of County Commissioners, Messrs. Young, Vanatta and Fote, presented him with a handsome gold-headed cane, with the name "C. W. McKee" engraved thereon. Mr. Young was the spokesman and the popular ex-official called the gift in a few modest words of thanks. Mr. McKee has not yet decided what vocation he will engage in, but wherever his path leads, the well wishes of the county go with him.

The induction of the new officers was attended with but little ceremony. The official bonds had been examined and approved by the Prosecuting Attorney and the necessary oaths administered. Following signatures as follows: Treasurer, Wm. C. Cooper, Moses Humbert, John Simpson, James Dawson, L. H. Lewis, J. B. Blocher, O. A. C. F. B. Blocher, McNabb, Dennis Bricker, E. J. Chase and J. R. McElroy. His bond as City Treasurer in the sum of \$15,000 was signed by Stephen Craig, Wm. C. Cooper and John D. McNabb, and was duly approved by Mayor McNabb.

The bond of Auditor John M. Blocher was in the sum of \$5,000, and contains the names of George Rimmel, George W. Young, J. B. Blocher, O. A. C. F. B. Blocher, McNabb, Dennis Bricker, E. J. Chase and J. R. McElroy. His bond as City Treasurer in the sum of \$15,000 was signed by Stephen Craig, Wm. C. Cooper and John D. McNabb, and was duly approved by Mayor McNabb.

The Sabor Screen Ordinance.

Inoperative by the Omission of Two Words.

Which Council Proceeds to Correct—Short Session of the City.

There was a short session of Council, Monday night, at the city building, all the members being present except Messrs. Cooper, Kelly and McKee. On motion of Mr. Weiss the reading of the lengthy journal of the preceding meeting was dispensed with. At 8 o'clock the City Solicitor Ewing reported having filed in the Auditor's office that day, the petition for annexation of territory in the North-western part of the city, together with official copies of the same.

The Ordinance Committee presented an ordinance, which was read the first time and then went over to the next meeting, providing for the regulation of places where intoxicating liquors are sold, and the use of screens, blinds, front windows and other devices between the bars and Lewis, or at the hours of 10 p. m. and 6 a. m. This is the same ordinance passed on the 23d of August, 25th of the last session, which rendered the law inoperative, being the italicized words.

On motion of Mr. Miller, an iron bridge was ordered on Gambier street at the intersection of Perry street. This bridge was in the member from the 24th Ward obtained an order for two more bridges on Front street, on the East side of Mechanic.

Mr. Tulloss secured a bridge for the crossing at the corner of Chestnut and Jefferson streets.

Mr. Tulloss reported that the plank crossing over the B. & O. track on West Vine street was in need of repair, and Mr. Bell made the same report concerning West Chestnut street.

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DEATH'S MESSENGER.

Several Homes Desolated by His Icy Touch During the Past Week.

Several homes were made in Knox county last week that the above well-known citizen had suffered a stroke of paralysis and was in a critical condition. Being in advanced age he was unable to rally from the affliction, and died at an early hour Sunday morning, at his home on North Main street. Mr. Hills was a native of Bristol, Ontario county, New York, who was born June 10, 1816. When he was about nine months old his father removed to near Lockport, where he resided until the year of 1840, when he went to Cass county, Michigan, and located on a farm, which pursuit he continued to follow until 1860, when in consequence of ill health, he sold his farm and came with his family to Mt. Vernon. He left them here and returned to the pines of Michigan, and was engaged in the lumber business for four years. He then returned to Mt. Vernon and engaged in mercantile pursuits, which he continued until a few months ago. He married Miss Julia A. Cheshbrough, by which union there were five children, all of whom are living. The funeral occurred Tuesday afternoon, at the home of the deceased, on North Main street, and was conducted under Masonic auspices. The religious services were performed by Rev. A. D. Knapp of the M. E. church, and the interment was in Mount Vernon cemetery.
