The New Town of Chandler is Not a Paradise.

The wild scramble for lands in the new Indian territory, which was opened last week, surpassed anything heretofore witnessed in this country, and what is remarkable there were no fights of any importance, although it is reported that a negro was pretty well battered up and left for dead on the "race track." There was a great struggle in the town of "Chandler" for lots although the "town" is located in a high bluff, covered with rocks as large as a house. A telegram from Guthrie, Sept. 24, says: Advice from the new settlement show that terrible suffering exists. In some places water brings 25 cents a glass, and horses are dying of thirst.

In regard to the new town of Chandler, another dispatch says: On Tuesday men rushed into and drove their takes there as anxious to secure a 50-foot piece of ground as though it was worth \$1,000, but when they got it they were not delighted. After sleeping all night Tuesday, tortured with hunger, thirst and a most ravensome species of mosquitoes, hundreds realized that they had had enough and began to leave. One man offered two lots in the Chandler annex for a ham sandwich without finding a purchaser. The town is over-run with gamblers of every description. There has been no trouble in keeping the people off the site.

There are thirteen murderers in jail at Charleston, West Va.

Forest fires have been sweeping over Minnesota during the past week, doing immense damage.

Forty-two young men, aged from 16 to 18, were tried for conspiracy at Los Angeles, and sentenced to death.

M. Holland, while on the 21st church steeple at Coal Creek, Tenn., fell to the ground and was instantly killed.

Joe Davis, a Chillicothe boy, aged 7 years, made a meal of buckeyes the other day, and he is an angel now.

The Plant Milling Company plant, at St. Louis, a five story brick building, was completely destroyed by fire on Sunday afternoon.

Ambrose Brier, employed at the glass works at Millville, N. J., hung himself on Sunday because his fellow-workmen called him a scab.

Thomas O'Brien, king of the New York buncoists, was arrested on Saturday night, charged with getting \$100,000 from a wealthy citizen of Albany.

Martin Kellogg, believed to be the oldest man in Ohio, celebrated his 105th birthday on his farm in Bronson township, Huron county, Ohio.

At Poplar Flats, near Vanceburg, Ky., John Allen, on Saturday, shot and killed his brother-in-law, John Moore, for being too intimate with his wife.

Charles Cook, a negro, who criminally assaulted a white woman at Swainsboro, Ga., was taken from jail by a mob of twenty-five persons and hung.

Lottie Musselman, a beautiful girl, daughter of respected parents in Osborn, Ohio, committed suicide at a house of ill-fame at Louisville, on Friday.

Ernest Lehman, the rejected lover of Emma Rush, at Newark, N. J., before parting forever, treated her to poisoned soda water, and she died in great agony.

Henry Crow, the leader of a desperate gang of highway robbers, was arrested at Lott's Junction, in Pauld county, Ga., a few days ago and lodged in jail at St. Marys.

Ralph Ray, of Durango, Colo., aged 20 years, while drunk, killed his mother with a hatchet, because she objected to him going to a county fair, leaving her alone.

Henrietta Murri (colored) was hung at Smithville, Charlotte county, Va., for the murder by drowning of her three-year-old child. She confessed the crime.

A fly-wheel in the Cincinnati Street Railroad Company's power-house, on the Reading road, burst on Friday, tearing the building to atoms. Loss about \$15,000.

Ross Walters, a young farmer of Washington county, crazed with jealousy, killed his pretty young wife with an iron bar on Monday, and then plunged her into a well.

At Avon, Mass., Annie E. Makepeace and her husband had a quarrel and to make peace in the family Annie procured a gun and filled her better half with shot. He will die.

At Plainfield, Conn., on Friday night, a supper was given at a social dance, for twenty-five persons were poisoned who partook of coffee into which some miscreant put cotton oil.

Charley Vrimpleburg, near Evansville, Ind., aged 16, took a pistol from a trunk and playfully discharged it at his little cousin, Lizzie Knore, aged 5 years, killing her instantly.

Jacob Brown, conscience-stricken, at Minneapolis, has confessed that he murdered a man at Central, Ill., years ago, for which an innocent man was sent to the penitentiary for life.

Two brothers, John and Frank Everett, of Blount county, Ga., quarreled about a pig, when John stabbed Frank through the heart, killing him instantly. The murderer fled to the mountains.

A destructive wind and rain storm passed over portions of Minnesota on Monday, felling forests and buildings and causing the death of many persons. The rain put an end to the forest fires, which were devastating the country.

E. D. Gates, of the firm of Gates & Payne, merchants of Marietta, Ohio, who went West to buy apples, was found dead on the streets in Chicago on Saturday. He was probably murdered by thugs, with whom he had been drinking, as he had some money.

Recent Deaths.

Gen. James A. Wilson, a prominent citizen of Columbus, died on Saturday.

Dr. James, ex-Chairman of the Wesleyan Conference in London, died at Plymouth, Eng., on Saturday.

Wm. H. Kemble, State Treasurer of Pennsylvania, died at Philadelphia on Sunday morning of heart disease.

He leaves a large family of children and grandchildren.

Rev. Dr. Samuel E. Burchard, author of the famous alliteration speech, about "Rum, Romanism and Rebellion," which contributed largely to the defeat of Mr. Blaine in 1884, died at his home in Saratoga, N. Y., on the 25th ult., after a short illness.

Gov. CAMPBELL addressed large and enthusiastic meetings at Wellington and Norwalk on Monday afternoon and evening.

At Wellington a delegation of Oberlin students sprang their college yell on the audience, supplementing it with a pleasing reference to Gov. Campbell. The Governor thanked them gracefully and said he hoped they would all be delegates to the next Democratic National Convention.

In the course of his remarks the Governor produced the analysis of a chemist who declared that cans and other utensils made from the "tin" Major McKinley dipped at Piqua would pollute their contents and poison people eating from them.
