In his last article we find the following account of the rescue of Simon Kenton, who was captured and sentenced to death by the Seneca tribe of Indians. He came to Kenton and seeing that he was already blacked and, would be burned in a few hours; and learn ing he was an officer, he began a conversation with him. "How many men had you?" said Girty. He told Girty he could not tell how many men he had, but he could tell how many officers there were. So he named officers enough to command a thousand men. He then asked Kenton what his name was. Simon Kenton, in his own words, gave the following conversation and incidents in reply to Girty's question:

"I asked him what he asked that question for, You know me very well, and I know you. Your name s Simon Girty." "Yes," said he, "that is so, but I don't know you."

Some years ago I was fortunate enough to purchase such a "balky" animal, and a more delightful saddle and driving animal I never owned; high-spirited, gentle, and as active as a cat. She would balk if irritated, but there was no need of that. In harness, she was always allowed to stand with a slack rein (which all horses should be accustomed to,) and when starting took her own gait, the lines being gently drawn, She never balked, when so used. A high-spirited, active horse should never be mismated with a slow, "poky" animal. We often see balking in the city cars from that cause.

In another case, I have seen the driver speak to his horse to go, then calling out, "Take your time," jump on his team. There was no instantaneous movement, but in less than half a minute, each horse was up to his collar, and all were pulling together, and started rightly. An English horse trainer writes that he never puts a colt at first even to a light wagon, but has ropes tied to traces and held by a man until the colt is used to his work.—[Our Dumb Animals.

Black Tooth in Swine. The Ameri an Swine Journal avs: Black tooth, so called, in swine, is sometimes caused by mechanical injury to teeth, received by chewing the dry and hard ker-uals of corn. The ailment consists in a state of decay in the teeth (caries). Such decayed teeth may be removed by the same instrument as a dentist would apply to ones own tooth under similar circum-

swine are similar to those exhibited by mankind, viz: Loss of appetite, salivation or slobbering, hanging of the head, mostly to the side which is affected, peevishness, 'los of all fear of men,' and a hot and repulsive breath.

When hogs are fed on strongly acidulated food, for any length of time, their teeth may become discolored; but it is a question whether the teeth at the same time are materially injured. So long as no decay or diminution of their substance can be noticed, and while the appetite and chewing facilities of the animal do not appear diminished, no interference will be nec

Eggs for Setting. An English agricultural paper says that eggs intended for setting should be stored with the large end down, because the air bubbles do not spread so much as when the small end is down—this spreading of the air bubbles being known to affect the freshness and vitality of the egg. Eggs stored with the large end down will keep perfectly good for hatching more than a month, while the others cannot be

New England Farmer says a successful poultry breeder in Franklin, has been experimenting with eggs for setting, and declares the above statement correct, and adds that eggs stored on the large end for a few weeks before setting will hatch at once, instead of vary ing several hours, as is usually the case with eggs not so prepared.

Kerosene to Destroy Insects tleman saturated a cloth with kerosene, and wrapped it around his plum trees. He had his trees load ed with fruit that season, but at the expense of the lives of the trees. He believed if he had hung a wool-en cloth wet with kerosene among the branches, it would have driven off the insects, saved the fruit, and not injured the trees. It is worth while to try the experiment.
