

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

Regulations of the Theological Seminary

ANY candidate for orders in the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, may, on examination, be received as a student in the Seminary; and any other person, who may give sufficient evidence of a fair moral and religious character. The candidates for admission, not Bachelors of Arts, will be examined in Latin and Greek Grammar, Sallust, Cicero's Orationes, Virgil's Æneid, Jacob's Greek Reader, and the four Gospels and Acts of the Apostles; and on the general principles of Natural, Intellectual and Moral Philosophy, and Rhetoric. They will also be required to read an original composition.

Candidates for admission to an advanced standing, must pass an examination in the studies which the class they desire to enter, has pursued.

Every student, on admission, must subscribe the following declaration in the matriculation book of the Seminary:—

"We the subscribers, Students in the Theological Seminary of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Ohio, do solemnly promise, with reliance on Divine Grace, that we will faithfully obey the laws and prosecute the studies thereof, endeavor to promote the reputation and interests of the Seminary, and make daily effort by pious reading, self-examination and secret prayer, to cultivate all religious and moral dispositions and habits, and grow in those graces which should characterize the Christian and the Minister of the Cross."

The course of study occupies three years, including vacations.

COURSE OF STUDY.

JUNIOR CLASS.

Hebrew, five days in each week.

Greek Testament, Exegetically, the Gospels, and Epistle to the Romans.

Biblical Literature, Sacred Hermeneutics, Sacred Geography, Manners and Customs of the Jews, and analysis of the books of the Old and New Testaments, together with exegetical exercises.

Sacred Rhetoric, Homiletics, including examination of Skeletons of Sermons.

MIDDLE CLASS.

Hebrew, continued.
 Apologetics.
 Systematic Divinity.
 Greek Testament, Epistles to the Galatians, Ephesians, and Hebrews.

SENIOR CLASS.

A weekly Exercise is conducted by the Professor of Sacred Rhetoric, in which the service is read, and a Sermon delivered by a member of the Senior or Middle Class,—and an Essay by some member of the Junior Class, in the presence of the Faculty.

Students are allowed to attend gratuitously, any recitations in Kenyon College which they may choose, provided they do not interfere with the appropriate duties of the Seminary.

A public examination of students takes place at the close of each year.

No charge is made for Instruction, Room rent, or use of Library. Indigent Students are aided from Scholarships, and from the funds of the Education Committee of the Diocese.

The Seminary Library contains between six and seven thousand volumes.


The following Societies exist among the students in Bexley Hall, viz :





Admission, Course of Study, &c.

COLLEGE.

Requirements for Admission.

Candidates for admission to the Freshman Class must sustain a thorough examination in the following studies.

English Grammar, Modern Geography, Ancient Geography and Classical Antiquities, Arithmetic, and Algebra (Davies' Bourdon) to Square Root of Numbers.

Greek Grammar and Prosody, Bullion's, Jacob's or Felton's Greek Reader entire, or four Books of Xenophon's Anabasis.

Latin Grammar and Prosody, two Books of Cæsar's Commentaries, six Books of Virgil's Æneid, and the four Orations of Cicero against Cataline.

The Examination for admission of Candidates to the Freshman Class is held on the day before Commencement.

Candidates who may not have studied the prescribed course, will be admitted if they can pass a satisfactory examination in an equivalent portion of any other Latin and Greek Classics. It will be observed that the requirements have been somewhat extended, and a full compliance in quantity will be exacted.

Candidates for *advanced standing* will be examined in the studies of the College course corresponding to such standing.

No Candidate is admitted into the Freshman Class under fifteen years of age; a proportionate increase of age is necessary for admission into the higher Classes.

The Grammar School has lately been removed to Milnor Hall. This building, in which all School Exercises are conducted, is large and commodious, the Students' Rooms are airy and comfortable, and the grounds sufficiently extensive for purposes of recreation. A boarding-house is attached, at which the Teachers, with the Students desiring to do so, take their meals.

Students belonging to this Department are permitted to attend Lectures and Recitations with the College classes, in such branches of study as they may desire and be qualified to pursue. It will be the aim of the Instructors to impart to students a sound, thorough, accurate and extensive business education.

Those wishing to study the French or German language, will have the opportunity. Tuition extra.

Weekly Rhetorical Exercises are held, in which all students of the Grammar School are required to participate.

Laws & Regulations of Kenyon College.

Matriculation.

No student even after his admission to College, is allowed to *matriculate*, until he shall have sustained a satisfactory probation of *at least* twenty weeks, and established a personal claim to the confidence of the Faculty. Matriculation alone gives accredited membership in the Institution, and renders the student upon whom it is conferred a proper candidate for degrees and honors. Should any student after matriculation, abuse the confidence on which that act proceeds, he may be degraded, *i. e.*, reduced again to the condition of a Probationer, and then further disciplined as the occasion may require.

The conduct of undergraduates is marked and reported as follows:—

Absence from Church, or leaving Church without excuse, will incur *two marks* of demerit, Tardy at Church, and absence from Daily Prayers, will incur *one mark* of demerit, and Misconduct in Church from *one to five marks* of demerit, to be reported under the head of “Absences from Prayers.”

Absence from Recitation, or failure to prepare a lesson, without excuse, will incur *one mark* of demerit, and misconduct during Recitation, from *one to five marks* of demerit, to be reported under the head of “Recitation Demerits.”

Any student who may be found absent from his room, or creating disturbance, by his conduct in or about the College buildings, in study hours, will incur from *one to five marks* of demerit, to be reported under the head of “Study Demerits.”

All these marks of demerit will be reported, under the various heads, by the Patron, to the Parent or Guardian, at the close of each term.

Twelve delinquencies during one term will incur a private admonition; twelve more a degradation from matriculation, of which the Parent or Guardian is to be informed, and twelve more a suspension from College.

Patronage.

Each Student, within six weeks after his admission, is required to choose some one of the Faculty to act as his *College Patron*. To his Patron he is at liberty, and is expected, to apply, as to a friend, whenever his inclination, or circumstances, may lead him to seek advice, or information on any subject connected with his academic standing and pursuits, or with his personal welfare.

The Patron, on his part, is required to take an active concern in behalf of the client thus committed to his care:—exercising a parental guardianship over him, and giving him advice and caution as he may see occasion. In doing this, he will consult the wishes of the Parents, as well as the interests of the Institution, and will take care to be advised of both, as may seem necessary for his client's welfare, so long as he remains connected with the Institution. The Patron will also, at the end of each term, forward to the Parent or Guardian of each Student under his charge, an account of the Student's deportment during the session, as well as his grades in each study pursued. Parents or Guardians not receiving letters at the expiration of each term are requested to communicate at once with the Faculty.

Religious Worship.

Students are required to be present at Church twice on Sunday, and on such other days as the Faculty may direct, and at daily Morning and Evening Prayers in the College Chapel.

Examinations and Public Exercises.

There is a regular Examination of all the Classes at the end of each Term. To attend and report on these Examinations a Standing Committee of nine is annually appointed by the Diocesan Convention; the examinations immediately preceding Commencement are usually attended by the Bishop.

Students who by sickness, or any other unavoidable necessity, are prevented from appearing at the regular examination, may be examined *separately*; but no student, under any circumstances, is deemed to have made good his standing, or kept his term, till he has passed a proper examination.

Marks of Scholarship.

Every student at each recitation is marked, *unless previously excused*, from 0 to 10: the first symbol indicating a *total failure*, and the last a *perfect recitation*. When any one absents himself from a recitation, unexcused, he is marked 0. Parents are earnestly requested to have their sons prompt in

attendance at the beginning of each Term, as absence at such time is highly injurious to the student, and materially affects his grade of scholarship.

The average grade of each Student will be reported by the Patron to the Parent or Guardian at the close of every term.

These are two, viz: The Philomathesian and the Nu Pi Kappa. They meet weekly in their respective Halls, and possess, each of them, valuable and extensive Libraries. Occasional exercises are had by each of them in public.

Connected with the Grammar School are the Phi Delta and the Athenian Societies, in successful operation. The members have access to the Libraries of the College Societies.

Libraries.

The Libraries to which students may have access, are as follows, viz:—

1. The Library of the Seminary and College, containing 6,000 vols.
2. That of the Philomathesian Society, “ 3,487 “
3. That of the Nu Pi Kappa “ “ 2,767 “

Students' Rooms.

The rooms are large, neatly papered, and furnished with a stove. Two students occupy one room, unless otherwise permitted; and are held accountable for damage to the room during their occupancy.

Each student must deposit \$1 with the College Treasurer at the beginning of each term, to cover breakage and incidental damages to the College Buildings; the balance, if any, to be refunded at the end of the year.

College Bills.

Term bills must be paid at the beginning of each term. Tuition \$10.00 per term, or \$30.00 per year. Room rent and incidentals, \$5.00 per term, or \$15.00 per year.

Tuition in Grammar School, \$8.00 per term. Room-rent and incidentals, \$5.00 per term.

The above estimate for the annual expenses to each student is exclusive of cost of Text books, ordinary incidentals and furniture for rooms. Students board themselves for \$1.00 per week, and boarding is furnished at rates varying from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per week, in private families. When convenient, it will be well for students to bring from home, bedding, towels, &c.

Parents or Guardians may, if they desire, make their remittances through the College Patron, or in some way subject to his control; and may advise with him as to any allowance of money they may wish to furnish, over and above the estimate here given.

Valuable additions have lately been made to the Astronomical and Philosophical apparatus, the most of it made expressly for the College, and not surpassed in size and efficiency by that of any other Institution. The principal additions were a Plane Electrical Machine, of the largest size, the plate four feet in diameter, and mounted on a rosewood stand; an Air Pump of the first class, likewise mounted on a rosewood stand, together with necessary auxiliary apparatus for various experiments.

A large Achromatic Telescope, 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. clear aperture, equatorially mounted, and moved by clock work, has also been erected, and is sufficiently powerful to exhibit all the principal objects of interest in the heavens. Many donations have also been made to the Geological Cabinet.



ROSSE CHAPEL.

Historical and Topographical Sketch.

The original object in founding these institutions was the rearing up of Ministers of the Gospel in the midst of the habits and circumstances, and with all the facilities of economy peculiar to the western country, with especial reference to western wants.* The first incorporation, therefore, was under the name of the "Theological Seminary of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Ohio;" and in that character, the Institution was opened for elementary instruction, at Worthington, near Columbus, in 1825.

Subsequently, as pupils in elementary science and the classics increased, an act of the Legislature was obtained, by which the President and Professors of said Seminary were constituted the Faculty of a College, by the name of Kenyon College; and by a concurrent act of the Convention of 1826 the Institution, thus modified and enlarged, was transferred from Worthington to Gambier, its present site.

In this arrangement, however, the original object of the Institution was not changed. Its aim was still to furnish, on the most economical plan, such an education, whether in elementary or other branches, as is required in a thorough preparation for the ministry,* and as a College course became necessary for this purpose, it was believed—and the belief has been fully realized,—that by throwing open the College and its auxiliary institutions for the reception of pupils at large, the two departments would mutually aid and promote each other.†

The operations of the Institution, as a Seminary of learning, for some years after its transfer to Gambier, as well as at Worthington before, were—under the circumstances of its organization—almost exclusively academic; and in this department, therefore, were instituted the first Professorships. That of Latin and Greek, the first in order, was filled as early as the year 1825, while the Institution was still at Worthington; that of Intellectual and Moral Philosophy in 1829; Mathematics and Natural Philosophy, and Chemistry, in 1830; and Rhetoric, History, &c., in 1834.

In the Theological Department, the first Professorship, that of Systematic Divinity, was filled in 1830; Ecclesiastical Polity, Pastoral Divinity, and Sacred Literature, in 1833; and Ecclesiastical History in 1837.

These appointments and dates show the rise and progress of the Institution, under its venerable founder and his successor in office—*pari passu* with the advancement of its first pupils,—from the elementary Grammar School of 1825, to the fully developed College and Seminary of 1833—'34.

The interior government of the entire Institution during this period, and for some years after the date last mentioned, was vested in a mixed Board or Faculty, composed of the Professors in Arts and Theology indiscriminately, by whom degrees were conferred and other corporate acts performed for both departments. But this arrangement having been found in some respects inconvenient, a further act of the Legislature was obtained in 1839, under which, in 1840, the mixed Faculty was resolved into two—one of Theology and one of Arts—by whom the two Institutions have since been administered separately.

Under this system, degrees in Arts and Academic degrees generally, are now conferred by the Faculty of Arts, acting corporately under the name and title of "The President and Professors of Kenyon College," and in Divinity, by the Theological Faculty under the name of "The President and Professors of the Theological Seminary of the Diocese of Ohio."

There have also been constituted, and for several years in successful operation, as auxiliary to the College, a Preparatory School, under the care of a Principal, with a complement of masters and teachers in the various branches of preparatory and elementary knowledge. The entire Institution now consists of three distinct Seminaries:—the Theological Seminary, Kenyon College, and the Grammar School.

The tract upon which these Institutions are located, is a square of four thousand acres,* lying on both sides of Vernon River, in the County of Knox, five miles below the flourishing post town of Mount Vernon, which is also the County town. It was purchased for the present object, by Bishop Chase, in the year 1826, from William Hogg, Esq., of Brownsville, Pa., and by a unanimous vote of the Convention of that year, was confirmed and settled as the site of the Theological Seminary of the Diocese of Ohio and Kenyon College forever.

The situation is admirably chosen in point of natural beauty, healthiness, retirement, internal resources, and convenience of access; and in every respect well adapted to the purpose of a Seminary of Learning on the largest and most liberal scale; while it has an easy communication, from Mt. Vernon, by Railroad with Cleveland and other points on the Lake shore on the north, and with Columbus and Cincinnati on the south.

The particular site of the College and other buildings is an elevated ridge or headland jutting out from the general slope of the hills on the north side of the valley of the Vernon River, and having, consequently, a fine open ex-

passe towards the east, south, and west, with a protection of rolling upland and forest on the north. The table land at the top of this ridge, indefinite in its extent northerly, and from one to five hundred yards wide, affords an irregular area, somewhat undulating, but generally elevated about 150 feet above the stream; the centre of which is occupied by the little village of Gambier, with the buildings of the different Institutions commodiously and tastefully disposed around it.

I. On a knoll somewhat elevated above the plat of the village, and about a quarter of a mile north, is the beautiful building of BEXLEY HALL, intended for the accommodation of the Theological Seminary. This having been commenced in 1841, is still unfinished; it is fully enclosed, however, and rooms are already prepared for the reception of students; all of which are now occupied, and *externally*, it is complete.

II. About 500 yards in the opposite direction, and near the southernmost point of the *plateau*, stands the more massive and venerable edifice of KENYON COLLEGE, fronting north, and overlooking, with all the advantages of its peculiar position, the valley and stream of Vernon River, to the distance of several miles in all directions. This building is of plain stone, 190 feet long, and four stories high, including the basement; with battlements, pinnacles, belfry, and a spire 117 feet high.

The grounds around it, which are well shaded, and beautifully sloped in every direction except the north, are embraced, with Rosse Chapel and the dwellings of the College officers, in a park enclosure; and great pains are taken to preserve the growth of trees, and to cultivate the whole as a green and shady park. A stone gate-way for foot passengers, has been constructed at the entrance of these grounds, near the village, and a wide gravelled walk extending thence to the College; besides which, for the accommodation of carriages, lateral entrances are also provided in front and rear of Rosse Chapel.

III. About 200 yards north, and a little west of the College front, within the park enclosure, is ROSSE CHAPEL, a substantial building, in Ionic Architecture, with a basement room for Lectures, &c. The foundations of this building were laid by Bishop Chase, and the walls raised to the floor; the present building was erected, with some variations from the original plan, in 1836, and has been occupied as the parish Church of Harecourt Parish since that time. It was consecrated to the worship and service of Almighty God by the Right Rev. Charles Pettit McIlvaine, D.D., on the 22d of June, 1845. It is used on commencement occasions; a clause in the consecration office having been specially inserted for that purpose. It is capable of accommodating from 1000 to 1500 persons.

IV. About midway between Kenyon College and Rosse Chapel and about 60 yards East of the latter building, fronting the West, has been laid the foundation of ASCENSION HALL, now in process of erection—171 feet long and four stories high, including the basement. The walls throughout are to be of a fine light-colored free stone—laid in courses with rough undressed face. Of the style and appearance of the building the accompanying plate furnishes a correct representation.

IV. To the north and east of the village, and some distance from the main street, environed by trees, mostly of an artificial growth, and commanding an extensive and beautiful prospect of the Valley of the Kokosing, stands Milnor Hall, appropriated to the use of the Preparatory School. This is a plain structure of brick, the main building four stories high, the wings three including the basement. It contains students' rooms, with Chapel and Recitation rooms, for the accommodation of about forty pupils, with apartments for Teachers and the family of the Principal.

The position at Gambier, it has been observed, is well chosen in regard to health, and this, which would naturally be inferred also from its topographical features and relations, is abundantly verified by the experience of the Institution since its removal hither in 1827. It is too high both in latitude and elevation above the bottoms of the neighboring stream to be affected with miasmatic influences, and too far from the Lake, protected as it is by the intervening ridge and other safeguards on the side of the north, to be much affected by the damp chilly atmosphere of that vicinity. Perhaps no part of Ohio is more favorably situated in this respect than the high central region of which "the Hill" of Gambier is a part; nor would it be easy to find, within that region, a place more free from all local influence calculated to produce disease.
