SPEAK IN TOLEDO

Will Attend Baptist Convention On Thursday And Friday of This Week

Rev. S. J. Cleland, pastor of the Baptist church, will go to Toledo Thursday, where on Friday morning he will address the Baptist ministers from 31 Ohio counties on the theme, "Evangelism Fundamental to the Life of the Church."

This message will be delivered at the Northwest District conference of the Ohio Baptist Convention, which will be in session in Toledo at that time.

The Baptist denomination is inaugurating a nation-wide evangelism campaign, which in the state of Ohio will begin in the churches next November. It is the plan to have a special program of evangelism in every Baptist church in this state.

TOLEDO WILL HAVE FALL STYLE SHOW

Toledo, O., Oct. 17—A miniature Atlantic City is what an exposition here Oct. 29 to 30, under auspices of the Retail Merchants Board of Toledo will be. It's going to be called the Atlantic City Boardwalk Exposition and Style Show.

Merchants and manufacturers will display every kind of goods sold or made in Toledo. The exhibits will be housed in small stores, patterned after Atlantic City shops.

By means of scenic effects, estimated to cost more than \$25,000, the Terminal Auditorium, in which the exhibition will be held, will be transformed into a replica of Atlantic City. A section of the building will represent the "ocean," and a real sand beach and boardwalk will be laid.

Models will stage a style show along the boardwalk, and extending from it will be an illuminated glass runway. There will be street lamps and signs and traffic policemen along the aisles dividing the shops.

The executive committee of the Merchants Board is trying to get the railroads to offer reduced fares, in order to attract out-of-town visitors.
