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

Our outposts repulsed them. On Thursday (Feb. 2), from 6 o'clock in a veteran of the Turkish campaign. the morning, Russian artillery on the west front of Ta mountain and Liuchiengtun shelled Fangshen and Putsaowo and their vicinities. The enemy's infantry immediately surrounded Fangshen, but we repulsed them. In the direction of the center on Thursday the enemy's artillery, situated about a mile and a quarter north of the village of Shakhe and on Wenpao mountain, bombarded the southern heights of Shakhe village. Constant collision betwen scouts took place to the north of Chenglingtzu and Yaotun. #### Many Thousands Strike.

Sosnovice, Feb. 4.-About 40,000 men are now out on strike here. At a meeting of strikers the men forcibly dragged officials belonging to the management of various concerns to the place of meeting. All the speakers insisted on the preservation of public order. The men's demands include a minimum wage of 75 cents a day, eight hours to constitute a day's work; various reforms in factory management, and old-age pensions. After the meeting 12,000 strikers marched six miles order, but everywhere persuading workmen to strike.

#### Albanians to Revolt.

Rome, Feb. 4.-Prince Ghica of Roumania, who has been elected by the Albanian committees "supreme head for Albanian independence," was interviewed here regarding his plans and purposes of the committees. The prince said his election meant the inauguration of a general revolution in Albania and a bitter struggle to achieve the liberty of that country. The committees, Prince Ghica further stated, have at command all the means necessary for the prosecution of the war for independence, and only ask to be left free in the fight for liberty.

There are three forms of iodic intoxication-first, that in which the symptoms are those of gastric irritation; second, that characterized by nervous troubles, neuralgia, ringing in the ears, convulsive movements, disturbed intellect, and, third, that characterized by rapid emaciation, commencing mostly in the face, and severe nervous palpitations of the heart, with excessive appetite, which sometimes precedes and sometimes follows the loss of flesh. These symptoms are said to be most easily induced in goitrous persons.

#### Result of the Rioting.

#### Oystermen Icebound.

Annapolis, Md., Feb. 4.-The ice boat Annapolis left here to rescue a number of oystermen who have been icebound for two weeks off Deals island, in the Chesapeake bay. The Annapolis soon was frozen in the ice and was unable to proceed. The Annapolis is ice bound 10 miles from the marooned oystermen, who are said to be in a starving condition.
