Police and Cossacks have had to break up a number of demonstrations and quell disorders, but as yet there has been no repetition of rioting on the scale of the

A large number of workmen are disposed to resume, but fear that the malcontents will employ coercion. The newly an-Pointed governor general, Arcimovitch, is giving the closest attention to the situation. Being asked whether he considered the strike a political movement, the governor general answered: Yes, and no. It is a labor movement, but the strikers' specific demands were d by political agitators, many of whom were foreigners." The strikers are demanding an 8-hour day, etc., but are willing to accept a compromise.

Official's Act Disavowed. St. Petersburg, Feb. 6.-Foreign

Minister Lamsdorff in a note to Sir Charles Hardinge, the British ambassador, has formally disavowed the action of Deputy Chief of Police Roudneff of Moscow in posting a placard asserting that the strikers were assisted with money from Japanese and British sources, with the purpose of crippling the arsenals and other government works.

Columbus, O., Feb. 6.-The postoffices at Groveport and Canal Winchester, a few miles southeast of Coumbus, were robbed and stamps taken to the value of \$300, besides a few dollars in cash. The safe in the Canal Winchester office was blown by dynamite and the outer door shattered. It was here that the greater portion of the stamps were taken. A drawer in the safe containing \$200, and easily accessible, was overlooked. The robbers escaped in a stolen horse and buggy, which they later deserted.

Washington, Feb. 6. - The German embassy, upon the receipt of a cablegram from the home government, authorized the statement that there had not been even so much as an exchange of ideas between the Berlin and London governments regarding the ending of the war in the far east.

Appeal of National Grange. New York, Feb. 6 .- A proclamation

"addressed to the American people" has been promulgated from the various state capitals under the auspices of the National Grange, Patrons of Husbandry, and various national labor and agricultural organizations, declaring that Washington's birthday be observed as "farm, home and factory day." It advises that upon this day the people concentrate their thoughts upon the conditions for the betterment of the home, farm and factory. The proclamation recites a number of reforms as the object of the movement, among them being government authority over railroads "sufficient to abolish unjust rates and discrimination"; a parcels post permitting packages up to 11 pounds weight, and a post check currency system. The proclamation urges every one to communicate with his congressman in Washington in behalf of these measures. Governor Herrick of Ohio is among the signers of the proclamation.
