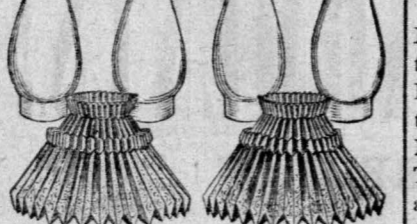

WILSON TARIFF ONE YEAR OLD.

The Wilson tariff is one year old, it having been passed August 28, but practically all statistics of its operation are dated from September 1.

While during the whole term of the McKinley law wages were on the down grade, and the country witnessed the most disastrous and dangerous conflicts between capital and labor, necessitating in a great number of states the calling out of the military, and in some of them the practical supremacy of the military power, these deplorable conditions have been entirely reversed under the Wilson law.

It has been stated by careful nonpartisan authority, such as "Bradstreet," that commencing about the middle of March and until a few weeks ago, the wages of the general government employees had been increased under the Wilson law.

Let anyone compare the price of McKinleyism with that of the reform tariff and he will have the evidence that neither capital nor labor has anything to fear from fair and free competition.

THE Protective Tariff League, of New York, recently sent out circulars to manufacturers asking for information that would help to settle the Wilson tariff, on the wage-earning and wage-purchasing power, for obviously partisan purposes.

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OUR GALLANT LEADER.

Appreciative Review of "Jimmy" Campbell's Career.

HIS SERVICE IN THE CIVIL WAR. His Brilliant Political Career, Beginning With the Prosecuting Attorneyship of His County and Rising to the Governorship of His State, Being Yet Unended—Chicago Republican Paper's Tribute to Campbell.

James Edwin Campbell was born in Middletown, Ohio, Friday, July 7, 1843. His father was Dr. Andrew Campbell, whose parents were pioneers of Revolutionary stock, mainly of Scotch ancestry, and educated beyond the usual attainments of their day.

He was educated in the free schools of Middletown, Ohio, and then entered the law office of the Rev. John P. Morton, a learned Presbyterian minister of that city, and when approaching his majority began the study of law under Judge G. W. Campbell in the Plymouth county office.

During the war he was a Republican, and remained so until the Greeley campaign, when he voted for Greeley and Brown, and has since been a Democrat.

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MCKINLEY'S DEMAGOGUERY.

Gov. McKinley in his speeches lays great stress upon the subject of finances and paves the way for the restoration of his old tariff by insisting that the present law does not provide sufficient money to carry on the government.

Everybody will agree with McKinley as to this statement, but everybody save the Governor will go a little further and call to mind that for this year in which the revenue loss was \$85,000,000 the McKinley law was still in force and effect two months.

It is not to be wondered that from July 1, '93, to July 1, '94, there was a deficit of nearly \$70,000,000 when the McKinley law was in force, and that in less than one year that it did the previous year.

THE Governor continues and shows that for the months of July and August, 1894, there was a deficit of \$14,000,000 an amount twice as great as that paid at the close of the first two decades of the war.

THE BLUE AND GRAY. Beautiful Fraternal Feeling at the Louisville Encampment.

EDITOR BANNER:—I told you I would write you on our trip. As for Louisville and the Grand Army I sent you all the papers except Saturday, and I send you the Louisville Courier from here today, having forgot to mail it to you before.

Yesterday afternoon we were out to the plantation of Col. G. M. Fogg, who was in the Confederate army, and while viewing his beautiful home and plantation from the shaded roadway, Col. Fogg appeared on the scene and gave us a cordial invitation to drive in and take a look from the inside and to look at Confederate Hill, a very prominent point occupied by the confederate forces under Gen'l Cheatham.

THE morning Dr. Reynolds and wife drove us out to the Belle Mead stock farm, seven miles out on the Hardin Pike. This farm is owned by Gen'l W. H. Jackson, a Confederate General, and contains 5,500 acres, and is the most beautiful farm I have ever seen North or South. There is 500 acres alone devoted to deer; 500 being now in this park. This is the home of the famous old running stallion, Enquirer, who died last Friday, aged 29 years.

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
