His Brilliant Political Career, Beginning With the Prosecuting Attorney-

The family of Mr. Reynolds was originally settled in Devonshire, England. Jonathan Reynolds emigrated from Plympton early in 1645, and on his arnear Plymouth, in the Plymouth colony, own, received instruction in later years Presbyterian minister of that city, and when approaching his majority began reading law, and for a short time taught school. In the summer of 1863, after thoroughly organized in all its depart-ments, Mr. Campbell entered the naval service and became a master's mate on the Mississippi and Red river flotillas, and taking part in several engagements. He served a year, when, unable to longer stand the uncongenial climate of the outh, his health broke down, he was compelled to secure his discharge and

office four years. From 1867 to 1869 he was a United States commissioner, and in 1879 he made a close race for state senator, but was defeated by twelve

During the war he was a Republican Brown, and has been a Democrat ever ince. At the Democratic congressional convention at Lebanon, August 16, 1882, e was nominated by acclamation for ongress, the election resulting in a contest, and the seating of his opponent H. L. Morey

In 1884 Mr. Campbell entered the list again against Mr. Morey and was decis vely elected to congress. In 1886 he an a remarkably close race with Hon John Little, but in the contest was given his congressional seat. In 1889 he defeated Hon. J. B. Foraker for Governor of Ohio, and in 1891 was defeated himself by Hon. Wm. McKinley.

Since his retirement from the guber natorial chair his political career is too well known to require detailed mention.
Mr. Campbell is a Knight Templar, a Knight of Pythias, a member of Wetzel-Compton Post, No. 96, G. A. R., of Hamilton, and also of the Hamilton B. P.O. E. While he was in active practice at the bar he stood high as a law-yer, and for some time he coupled with
