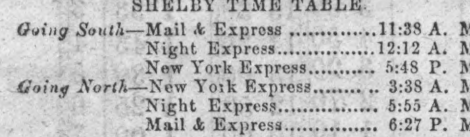

How to Keep Potatoes.

A correspondent of the Scientific American says he has tried the following method of keeping potatoes for years with complete success, though in some instances the were tubers diseased, when taken from the ground: "Dust over the floor of the bin with lime, and put in about six or seven inches of potatoes and dust with lime as before. Put in six or seven inches of potatoes and lime again, repeat the operation until all are stored away. One bushel of lime will do for forty bushels of potatoes, though more will not hurt them—the lime rather improving the flavor than otherwise."

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OHIO STATE NEWS.

—The Mahoning Courier says cow stealing seems to be an epidemic in that neighborhood. A number of fine ones are missing—among others, two belonging to a poor woman.
—The Meigs County Press says a young man named John Parker, who resides near that place, was instantly killed by the accidental discharge of a gun while he and a companion were out hunting one day last week.
—We learn from the Wellsville Union that the farmers in that vicinity have been engaged for some days in cutting off their corn in order to save the fodder. We have heard of a number of fields of buckwheat that have been cut, and are sorry to say that, owing to the continued dry weather, the product of this important grain is very light.
—The Circleville Union says some fields of corn in that county have been sold at forty dollars an acre, the purchasers intending to turn hogs into them.
—The Lebanon Star says that a man at the Shaker village, in that county, has been offered three thousand dollars for his cabbage-seed crop.
—The Youngstown Register says that a farmer in that county raised this season, on one acre of ground, one hundred and three bushels of ears of corn.
—The Union Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met at Ironton on the second instant. Bishop Ames presides. The next Conference will meet at London, Madison county.
—The Alliance Monitor says: "Many farmers complain that the corn crop throughout the country will not average more than half of last year's yield."
—The rolling mill at Steubenville has remained idle for some time, during the progress of repairs and improvements. It is now about to start up, and will employ four hundred and fifty hands.
—The Journeymen tailors of Urbana left their boards on Tuesday morning, and notified their employers that no more work would be done by them until a bill of prices would be agreed upon. The strike continues in force; under the regulations of the Tailors' Society.
—Mr. Jos. Butler, of St. Clairville, met with quite a loss on Saturday last, while thrashing for Mr. Matthew Patton. From friction, his machine took fire and burned up, together with two sacks of grain belonging to Mr. Patton. The horses were saved with some difficulty.
—The drought still continues in this neighborhood, and it may be said to be severe. There is much complaint among farmers of the scarcity of stock water. Grass is burnt up, and wheat, where it sprouted, is dying. The failure of the grass fields has cut short the supply of butter, and for some weeks past it has been next to impossible to procure that article in Lebanon, at any price.—Lebanon Star.

—A young girl, aged about thirteen, on a visit at Mr. Carpenter's, in Bloom township in this county, says the Seneca Advertiser, met with an accident on Friday evening last, which resulted in her death. It appears that she was riding a horse to water and in returning, it became fractious, throwing her off and breaking her neck. Her parents live in Wood county, we believe.
—George Bevington, son of Jonathan Bevington, who lived near Maysville, Salt Creek township, Wayne county, came to a sad accidental death on Monday night, Sept. 10th. It seems that he was out corn hunting that night with several comrades, and while engaged in treeing one stumbled on the root of a tree, and in falling to the ground, his breast struck a knob. He arose, but soon sank insensible, and was carried to the farm house of Mr. Johnson, near by, where he died in an hour, from internal injury. He was about 16 years of age, and a youth much respected and loved.
—We have (says the Wayne County Democrat) to chronicle the sad fact that Mrs. Bolton, aged sixty-one years, was killed in Seville last Saturday evening, about five o'clock. She had been attending the Fair that day, and, while standing on the grounds, two horses attached to a carriage became frightened, ran away, running over her, inflicting fatal injuries. She lived but a few hours. The deceased formerly resided one mile north of Wooster, but lately lived a mile south of Medina. Her remains were buried in Seville last Monday.

—Mr. Samuel Brumbaugh lost an arm, by being caught in a threshing machine, near New Lebanon, Thursday morning, says the Dayton Ledger. Mr. B. was threshing out grain, with a machine, for Jacob Rife, when his right arm was caught in the gearing and completely torn off. It will be remembered that Mr. John Folsie was killed by a similar accident a few weeks since, in the same neighborhood.
—On Monday last, C. S. Vorwerk, County Treasurer, says the Holmes County Farmer, had his shoulder dislocated, by being thrown from a buggy, while on his way to German township to collect taxes. In passing down the hill near the residence of Mr. Robert Maxwell, the holdback strap broke, causing the horse to run away. He will probably be unable to do much for some time.
