THE TARIFF QUESTION.

The Democracy Not Free Traders.

When the Republican papers assert that Governor Cleveland and the Democratic party are for free trade, they assert what is unequivocally and unqualifiably false. There is no such thing as free trade in this country. The term is a misnomer. Free trade means the abrogation of all tariffs or duties on foreign imports, and a resort to direct taxation to support the General Government. No Democrat has ever advocated such a chimerical proposition. All tariffs are necessarily protective—that is, the tariff, or duty, or tax, whichever you may please to call it, is added to and becomes a part of the price of everything that is imported into this country, and protects the home producer of the article on which the tax is collected. Every man of an ounce of sense knows this to be true.

The General Government has always derived its chief support from the tariff or tax imposed on articles imported from foreign countries into the United States; and we feel quite certain that this system will not be changed, at least during the present generation. The people are well satisfied with it, because they are more willing to pay the tax, when they seem not to be aware that it is a part of the price of the article they pay for, than to have the amount taken directly from their pockets.

The Democratic ticket is to make this tariff or tax as light as possible, consistent with an honest and economical Government, and make luxuries, which the rich only crave, pay the tax, instead of the necessities of life, which are required and consumed by the poor. A tariff merely to protect the rich, as advocated by the Republican party, is not only wrong, but oppressive. It is clearly carrying out the old Federal doctrine, "take care of the rich and the rich will take care of the poor."

The Republican party favors protection to the manufacturer and not the farmer and producer. A Republican Congress, at the bidding of the New England lordly manufacturers, and at the recommendation of a Republican President, repealed the wool tariff of 1867, by which the farmers of Ohio, alone, lose a million and a half of dollars every year. This is worse than free trade—it is robbery—robbing the farmer and wool-grower for the benefit of the manufacturer.

The Democracy are opposed to this iniquity. They believe in a fair and honest tariff, that will promote all the industries of the country—the farmer as well as the manufacturer—protective in the coal mine as well as the owner of the mine. They are opposed to the Republican system of imposing any unnecessary taxes or burdens upon labor merely to protect capital, in order that an enormous and unnecessary revenue shall be accumulated in the National Treasury. They do not believe in robbing Peter to pay Paul. They believe in justice, and not in honesty. They reject the evils and burdens under which the country now suffers, the Democracy believe that.

The Republican Party Must Go.

Mr. Blaine has been in Ohio for over a week past, and although he has made an endless number of little "speeches," returning thanks for the "cordial reception" he has met, he has taken good care not to allude to the subject of "Prohibition," on which his party, according to Neal Dow, "achieved a glorious victory" in Maine; nor to mention the fact that, although he gave a pledge to vote for Prohibition, he refused to keep his promise. But his friend Neal Dow, the Prohibition leader in Maine, has made the explanation for Mr. Blaine, by saying, "he refrained from voting at the request of prominent Ohio Republicans, on account of the bigoted German."

THE BIG-OTED GERMAN. The cowardice of Blaine was only equalled by the double dealing reason he assigned. The "BIG-OTED GERMAN" in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin, a majority of whom have heretofore elected Republicans, will vote against Blaine to a man in November.

A Conspiracy to Blacken Cleveland's Character.

Two weeks ago it was announced that another scandal would be brought to light through the columns of the New York Sun in regard to Gov. Cleveland; but it did not come at the time announced; and now, all the facts have come to light, showing a most infamous conspiracy on the part of the Republican leaders, with the knowledge and approval of James G. Blaine, to blacken the character of the Democratic candidate for President.

The facts may be stated in a few words: In the Buffalo Orphan Asylum a boy named Cleveland Guehrler, was placed by his father, Frank Guehrler, Nov. 10, 1882, who furnished money for his support, and Dr. Saml' H. Warren was appointed his guardian. This Warren, who has proven himself to be an infamous scoundrel, took the bills which were made out at the Buffalo Orphan Asylum, for boarding Cleveland Guehrler, and by erasing the name "Guehrler," endeavored to make it appear that the boy's name was "Cleveland," and therefore the child of Gov. Cleveland! Warren then wrote during the present generation, the big political bonanza he had in store. Blaine's Private Secretary, Thos. H. Sherman, replied as follows:

AUGUSTA, Me., July 21, 1884.

Dr. Samuel H. Warren, Buffalo, N. Y.

I am directed by Mr. Blaine to thank you for your kind note of June 30, 1884.

He has read with interest, and referred confidentially to the Secretary of the Republican National Committee. Very truly yours,

THOS. H. SHERMAN, Private Secretary.

Then negotiations began. Warren wanted to make big money by the sale of his forged document. James C. Fullerton, Commander of the First Regiment of Plumed Knights in New York, a confidential friend of Blaine, offered \$500 for the forged account, but Warren wanted more. Other offers were made to sell the infamous document, but without success, as the Republican bosses seemed to have doubts about its genuineness. After considerable delay Warren telegraphed to Dana of the New York Sun in the name of J. M. Wolford, offering the paper for sale. Dana sent two dispatches in reply as follows:

NEW YORK, Sept. 22, 1884.

J. M. Wolford, Buffalo, N. Y.

Cannot offer anything without first seeing the papers. C. A. DANA.

The second read as follows:

NEW YORK, Sept. 23, 1884.

J. M. Wolford, Buffalo, N. Y.

I cannot buy without examining and knowing. C. A. DANA.

By mere accident this dark and damning Republican conspiracy, (of which James G. Blaine has full knowledge), came to light. The legal authorities in Buffalo and New York City will at once seek out, arrest and punish all the parties engaged in this most diabolical attempt to blacken the character of a pure and honest man.

It thus appears that Mr. Blaine is directly connected with this New Buffalo scandal conspiracy. He read it "with interest, and referred it confidentially to the Secretary of the National Committee."

How different has been the conduct of Gov. Cleveland. When the scandal about Blaine's "youthful indiscretions" was mentioned to Cleveland he emphatically denounced all such methods of political warfare as being utterly infamous.

We may add, that this is the "lion" that the "Rev." scandal-monger Blaine recently announced would burst upon and astonish the world! If the "Rev." liar and hypocrite had any sense of shame he would imitate his "illustrious predecessor," Judas Iscariot—go out to a fence corner, and hang himself on a sour apple tree!

The following is a "diagram" of Blaine's stumping tour in Ohio, commencing at Ashtabula, Sep. 30, and ending at Bellaire, Oct. 4th, to-wit: Ashtabula, Painesville, Cleveland, Elyria, Norwalk, Fremont, Toledo, Fostoria, Carey, Kenton, Bellefontaine, Urbana, Springfield, Dayton, Hamilton, Cincinnati, Morrow, Xenia, London, Columbus, Newark, Zanesville, Cambridge, Barnesville, Bellaire. The author of the Mulligan letters has been allowed about one hour at each point to exhibit himself.

The Republican leaders continue to stir Governor Cleveland, because, as Sheriff of Erie county, N. Y., he discharged his sworn duty, and hung a couple of bloody murderers. This is done for the express purpose of angling the criminal cases of the country against Cleveland. There are plenty of rascals, who ought to be hung, who are now doing their level best to defeat Cleveland.

No rogue or ferret let the halter draw "With good opinion of the law."

MR. W. B. CALDWELL writes to the New York World from Oxford, Kansas, Sep. 20: The Democrats in Kansas will re-elect Glick Governor and two Congressmen, one of whom will be the Irish orator, Thomas Fenian. Leavenworth district; the other will be the gallant German, Mr. Uhl, in the northwest. There are many life-long Republicans who will this year support Cleveland. There are no surprises to the country at large.

JOHN A. LOGAN, Republican candidate for Vice President, has been coveting through Ohio, making bloody-splatter speeches, and begging the people to vote for him. Logan has no claims upon the farmers and wool-growers of Ohio. That Blaine's warfare upon Conkling led to the assassination of Garfield is a fact well known to the country.

CHRISTIAN MOERLEIN, the well-known and influential brewer of Cincinnati, has decided to support Cleveland and Hendricks. Up to this time Mr. Moerlein has been neutral and his espousal of the cause of the Democracy is looked upon as an important event in politics there. His influence will no doubt be felt in the coming October contest, especially in Hamilton County.

JOHN W. GARETT, the distinguished President of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, died on Friday morning last, at Deer Park, Md., in the 65th year of his age. He was a gentleman of great sagacity and powerful executive ability. From the moment he took charge of the B. & O. road, in 1856, its career has been one of continued and unexampled prosperity.

THERE is not a particle of evidence to sustain Mr. Blaine's unsupported statement that he was married in Kentucky. The story has undoubtedly been manufactured to order for political purposes.

Republican Falsehoods—the Duty of Democrats.

We have to caution our Democratic friends all over the county to pay no attention to the lying reports that are being sent out by the Republican leaders and their hired blowers and strikers in Mt. Vernon, relative to prominent Democrats going to vote for Col. Cooper, the Republican nominee for Congress. There is not a shadow of truth in these stories. They are circulated for effect in distant parts of the county, where it is supposed a contradiction will not overtake them. While most of our Democrats here in Mt. Vernon esteem Col. Cooper as a friend and neighbor, and wish him success in everything but politics, they will not vote for him, because he does not represent the party and the principles they hold dear in their hearts. Hon. E. F. Poppleton, the Democratic candidate for Congress is a true and tried Democrat, and is worthy of Democratic support. He served the Ninth District in Congress ably and intelligently eight years ago. He knows the wants of our people, and he will attend to them faithfully and well. He has pledged himself to do everything in his power to restore the wool tariff of 1867, which a Republican Congress destroyed, at the bidding of the selfish and avaricious manufacturers of New England. Mr. Poppleton will have influence in a Democratic Congress, while Col. Cooper would not. We therefore bespeak for Mr. Poppleton the undivided support of the Democracy of Knox county.

The Republicans Contemplate Wholesale Bribery.

The poll of the State, made by both parties, shows a good Democratic majority behind the shadow of a doubt. This fact has alarmed the Republican leaders and they are now actively at work endeavoring to change the inevitable result, by a system of wholesale bribery, such as was practiced in Indiana four years ago. It is stated that Saml' Elkins, the Blaine manager, has \$750,000 on deposit in New York to the credit of the National Republican Committee. Probably a million of this will be brought into Ohio this week and next, to buy a sufficient number of votes to carry the State for the Republicans. Don Cameron has been assigned to this work. As this Congressional district is regarded as doubtful, money will be poured out like water to carry for the Republican candidate.

The Democrats being forward should be forewarned. Watch the bribers and corruptors of the ballot box. Collect all the evidence you can, so that the violators of the law may be arrested and punished. If the Democracy do their duty Ohio will go Democratic on the second Tuesday of October, and Grover Cleveland will be elected President on the first Monday of November.

If Mr. Blaine was secretly married in Kentucky, as he claims, why did he pass himself off as a single man, and "keep a court" the girls," from the 20th of June, 1880, until March, 1881, when he found it advisable to get married over again, privately, in Pittsburgh? Old sailors will wink when they are told that story. Blaine was a "gay deceiver."

Blaine's speeches, while he has been "swinging around the circle," in his hippodrome exhibition in Ohio, are the most common-place twaddle that ever fell from the lips of a man professing to be a statesman. Boiled down to a few words they read: "I am very glad to see you all—good-by!"

The New York Tribune, the champion defender of Blaine, published the Mulligan letters, with explanatory remarks, in its daily issue, but took good care to exclude them from its weekly edition, which goes to the country, and is read by farmers and mechanics.

OCCASIONALLY the Cincinnati Enquirer publishes a readable Democratic article; but it is only occasionally. The meanest slanders and falsehoods of the campaign directed against the head of the Democratic ticket, appeared in the columns of that guerrilla sheet.

The Republican papers, forced to take notice of Blaine's disgraceful record, as established by the Mulligan letters, are now engaged in heaping abuse upon Messrs. Fisher and Mulligan, so as to break the force of this most damning and damaging exposure.

The Cincinnati Gazette (Rep.) in 1876 said that Blaine was nominated for President his Mulligan letters would become the Republican platform. That is true every word. An endorsement of Blaine is an endorsement of his infamous deeds as set forth in those letters.
