There has been a falling off in the number of deaths by cholera in Spain during the past week.

SIR ANTHONY ASHLEY COOPER Earl of Shaftesbury, died in London on Thursday morning last, in great agony, after a brief illness, aged 81.

## Delano Against Sherman.

After John Sherman grossly betrayed the wool-growers of Ohio, Hon. Columbus Delano publicly denounced him, in a speech delivered in the Mt. Vernon Court House.

In that speech, it will be remembered, Mr. Delano gave an account of his visit to Washington, in behalf of the wool-growers, of which numerous class he is himself an active and honorable member.

He declared that the manufacturers of woolen goods, in New England, sent paid lobbyists to Washington, who, by the liberal use of money, carried through legislation as their interest and their avarice dictated, creating free trade on wool, for the farmer, and protection on manufactured goods, for the manufacturer.

In that speech Mr. Delano said further that the wool-growers could expect no favors from Congress, unless they, too, hired lobbyists, and sent them to Washington with plenty of money, to buy such legislation as they needed and should have.

The millionaire manufacturers could well afford to spend a large sum of money to secure such protective laws as they desired and demanded; and John Sherman, although representing a wool-growing constituency, coldly turned his icy back upon them, and became the willing defender and representative of New England, and of its SINGLE VOTE, ROBBED THE WOOL-GROWERS OF OHIO OF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS, to enrich the bloated nabobs of Massachusetts!

If the farmers of Ohio, and especially of Knox county, wish to throw off the yoke of oppression fastened upon their necks by the Protection Lords of New England, through the acts of their servile tool, John Sherman, they must go to the polls next Tuesday and declare by their votes, solemnly registered, that JOHN SHERMAN SHALL RETIRE FROM THE U. S. SENATE!

To accomplish this result, every farmer and wool-grower, without regard to party, should vote for that honest man and good citizen, John S. Braddock, for Representative to our State Legislature.

## THE TARIFF ON WOOL.

Who caused the reduction of the tariff on wool? John Sherman.

Who now asks wool-growers to send him back to the Senate? John Sherman.

How did Sherman cause the tariff on wool to be cut down, while the tariff on woolen goods was kept up?

The Republicans had a majority of one vote in the Senate, and that vote was cast by John Sherman in favor of the bill which reduced the tariff on wool, and kept up the tariff on woolens. The bill made free trade on wool; and high protection on woolen goods.

Had Sherman voted against the bill, it would have been defeated, and the farmers of Ohio would have been three million dollars richer to-day than they now are.

Sherman himself was in favor of reducing the tariff on wool ten per cent; and he declared in the Senate—as is shown by the Congressional Record—that such would be the effect of an amendment offered by him; but a ten per cent. reduction did not satisfy the Republican Senate and the New England manufacturers, and Sherman voted with the manufacturers.

Do the wool-growers of Knox county desire to be shorn still closer? If they do, let them vote for Thomas Odbert, who will vote to send Sherman back to the Senate in the interest of New England and her selfish and aristocratic woolen manufacturers.

A Brutal and Fiendish Letter.

We publish on the first page of this week's BANNER a letter written by Murat Halstead, editor of the Cincinnati Commercial in 1863, to Gov. Chase, then Secretary of the Treasury, relative to the management of the war, in which the most brutal and fiendish sentiments are uttered in regard to President Lincoln, General Grant and others, which, expressed by a Democrat at that time, would have caused his arrest and imprisonment in Fort Lafayette or some other Government bastille. In this letter Halstead paid his compliments to "the foolish, drunken, stupid Grant," and described him as "an ass," who did not know "how to organize, control or fight an army." The wrathful writer also referred to Lincoln's "weak, pliant, pliant, pliant, pliant," and added that "there are persons who would feel that it was doing God service to kill him, if it were not feared that Hamelin is a bigger fool than he is."

This suggestion of the murder of Lincoln was the same fiendish spirit that governed the assassin Booth; and probably if an opportunity had been offered the Cincinnati fiend, in some dark spot, he would have committed the same act that Booth did publicly in a crowded theater.

This man Halstead who spoke in such contemptuous terms of the "nigger" then, is now seeking to array the "nigger" against the white man in the South, and is doing everything in his power to keep alive the bitterness and animosity that existed between the North and South during the darkest days of the rebellion.

John Sherman is to-day no less violent in his denunciations of the South than Murat Halstead, and Sherman is Halstead's candidate for United States Senator.

If you wish to rebuke these agitators and disturbers of the peace and prevent the return of John Sherman to the United States Senate, vote for John S. Braddock for Representative.

The Wooster Jacksonian says John Sherman is doing a good deal of howling about the disfranchisement of colored people of the South. He overlooked the Republican State of Rhode Island with a population of 300,000. At the last Presidential election but 31,421 votes were cast. In that State it is necessary for a citizen to own at least \$134 worth of real estate before he can exercise the right of franchise, and there are fourteen thousand white citizens in the State who do not own \$134 worth of real estate, consequently they cannot vote. Were such a law enacted in any Southern State what a howl would go up from such patriots as John Sherman, Billy McKinley and Benny Foraker!

## A Shameless Falsehood.

The following appeared in the Cincinnati Commercial Gazette of Saturday, purporting to be telegraphed from Mt. Vernon:

MT. VERNON, O., October 2.—At a recent caucus of the Democratic leaders here it was determined to abandon all of the ticket save John S. Braddock, Democratic candidate for Representative, and a desperate fight is now being made for him. A secret order has been issued from headquarters to trade any and all candidates for him. In addition to this a printed circular has been secretly sent out by the County Executive Committee all over the county to Democrats, demanding that all its energies be concentrated toward the election of Braddock. Henceforth it is to be Braddock or nothing.

It is true that the Democracy of Knox county are making earnest efforts to elect Mr. Braddock, and they feel entire confidence that they will succeed; but to say that a "secret order has been issued from headquarters to trade any and all candidates for him," is a shameless and senseless falsehood, without the slightest shadow of foundation. The Democrats do not need to "trade" votes. They mean to elect every man on their excellent ticket, and they will do it. The story was published here, and the favor will be returned by Republicans voting "for any and all candidates" on the Democratic ticket. We are glad to know that the Democrats thus approached spurn and repudiate the insulting proposition.

Once more we say, vote for John S. Braddock, and every man on the Democratic ticket, WITHOUT A SCRATCH. Indignantly reject every proposition from Odbert's tools, hired traitors, and "trade" off any man on the Democratic ticket.

"Vote the ticket as Harper prints it."

"WOOL-GROWERS, vote for Thomas Odbert," says one of the Republican papers, "it is the first round in the fight for the restoration of the duty of 67." In the name of the prophet, how can Tom Odbert restore the tariff of 1867? If elected, (which is not at all probable) Odbert will vote for John Sherman, the enemy of the wool-growers of Ohio, who voted to destroy the wool tariff of 1867, by which the farmers of Ohio have been robbed of a million and a half of dollars every year, in the interest of the New England manufacturers. The way to restore the duty on wool is to keep John Sherman out of the Senate.

Vote for John S. Braddock.

SOME of the papers think that Murat Halstead was "insane" in 1863, when he wrote the "assassin letter" to Secretary Chase. Is he any less "insane" now, in dealing out such violent tirades of abuse against the South? Halstead is the acknowledged Republican leader in Ohio, and is laboring to send his Republican party in the West, and is slandering the South, John Sherman, to the United States Senate.

The best way to condemn these distortions of the facts is to vote for John S. Braddock for Representative.

The difference between Halstead, the Republican leader, and Wilkes Booth, the assassin, is this: Booth had the moral courage to carry out his threats, while Halstead, being a brutal coward, thought that some one else than himself would be "doing God's service to kill him." (Lincoln) Halstead is still doing the acknowledged organ of the Republican party in the West, and is whipping John Sherman for United States Senator.

It is announced that Clayton McMichael, (Rep.) who has been retained as Marshal of the District of Columbia ever since the 4th of March, announces that he will "retire" on the first of November. The office is worth \$8,000 per year, the principal duties being to cut as well as "state dinners," when distinguished diplomats and titled foreigners are entertained at the White House.

AFTER considerable wriggling on the part of the Republican State Executive Committee, they have at length been forced to allow their candidate for Governor, Judge Foraker, to meet Governor Hoadly in joint debate. Two meetings have been agreed upon—one at Toledo, October 8th, and the other at Cincinnati, October 10th. Hoadly will read the article straddler all to pieces.

Mrs. MARIA KOCH, wife of Dr. Koch, editor of the German paper in Jersey City fell violently in love with one Besen-dorf, a printer in her husband's office, and as they could not legally live together, they concluded to die together.—They were found lying side by side in Central Park, New York, Friday night, with bullet holes in their heads, and an empty pistol between them.

JOHN S. WISK, the Republican Representative candidate for Governor in Virginia, had a quarrel with J. Ambler Smith, also a Republican, but not a supporter of Wisk, in the cars between Alexandria and Washington, on Friday last, when Wisk struck Smith a violent blow in the face. Smith sent Wisk a challenge to fight a duel, but the exulted declined.

A CLEVELAND paper says: "When John Sherman entered the lower house of Congress thirty years ago, he was not worth to exceed a few thousand dollars. Mr. Sherman has continuously held office ever since, and to-day is worth over one million and a half of dollars. How did he make it? What a silly question for any man to ask."

FARMERS and wool-growers, don't let John Sherman's cunning tool, Thomas Odbert, pull the wool over your eyes.—He can do nothing toward restoring the wool tariff, his patron, John Sherman, destroyed. Place no confidence in anything he says.
