In an eleven-inning pitchers' battle, with Bowden having a shade the better of the argument, Mt. Vernon shut out the Hogan's Runts team of Marion Sunday by a score of 1 to 0, Leo Maison's single in the eleventh scoring Popejoy from second and winning what was by far the most exciting and sensational game seen on a local diamond for several years.

Porter, in the visitor's half of the tenth, pulled off a fielding stunt that sent the crowd up on its feet and probably saved the game for Mt. Vernon. Dispatches to the morning papers state that Leopold Mambourg of Pleasantville, Ohio, formerly of Mt. Vernon, will recruit an army of 1,200 Belgians in Ohio and will return to Belgium to fight for their country. Mr. Mambourg was born within walking distance of the battlefield of Waterloo, and served three years in the army of King Leopold. Mr. Mambourg lived for many years within 85 miles of Liege, the scene of the present conflict.

NUMEROUS SKIRMISHES

Paris, Aug. 10.—A statement issued by the war department says there are numerous skirmishes along entire front. French army fighting violently. Losses on both sides heavy. Patrols of French army in Belgium covered hilly region of Eifel in Rhenish Prussia, on left bank of Rhine had skirmishes with Germans along Ourthe river, east of Neuf Chateau. Germans fell back to Tongres. Many German prisoners taken. Military officials believe first decisive battle will be fought Alsace at Breisch on the Rhine. Reported that French army that occupied Aitkirk and Neulhausen have also taken Colmar.

CURRENCY LAWS MEETING A TEST

Crisis Arising Out of European Situation Has Effect Here.

MANY BANKNOTES ISSUED.

Treasury Department Quick to Prevent Shortage of Funds in This Country. Banknotes Will Aid South and West in Having Record Breaking Crops. Aid From Government.

Washington.—The first real test of the effectiveness of the new currency laws of the United States is now under way. Contingencies arising out of the European struggle made necessary the issuing of more certificates for use in this country.

Officials of the treasury department and leading bankers from all parts of the country were quick to foresee what might happen and take steps to prevent a shortage of funds to carry on American business and industry.

Accordingly, for the first time congress authorized the issuing of \$500,000,000 in currency under the terms of the Aldrich-Vreeland currency law. Part of this money was made immediately available for use throughout



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
