JOHN SHERMAN, in his furious and bloody "march to the sea," has not yet crossed the Ohio river.

Farmers and Wool-growers, Attention!

The wool-growers of Ohio lose a million and a half dollars a year by the repeal of the wool-tariff of 1867, to say nothing about the depreciation in the value of sheep. This was the work of a Republican Congress, upon the recommendation of a Republican President. The most active man in bringing about this change, so suicidal to the interests of the farmers and wool-growers, was John Sherman, the Republican Senator from Ohio. His single vote repealed the wool-tariff of 1867, and left the wool men at the mercy of the woolen manufacturers of New England, for whose special benefit the change was brought about.

John Sherman is now candidate for re-election to the Senate, and is begging the support of the very men whose interests he so wantonly and wickedly betrayed. Thomas Odert, the Republican nominee for Representative in Knox county, is pledged to vote for John Sherman, the open and avowed enemy of the wool growers of Ohio; while John S. Braddock, the Democratic nominee, is not only in favor of restoring the protective duty on wool, but will vote for a candidate for Senator who will labor for the best interest of the farmers and wool-growers as against the corporate wealth of New England.

Here, then, the issue is fairly presented: Thomas Odert, pledged to vote for Sherman, the great enemy of the interests of New England's wool-growers, on the one side; and John S. Braddock, the friend of the farmers and wool-growers of the State of Ohio and of Knox county, who is in favor of restoring the wool tariff of 1867, on the other side. Choose ye between them.

The "Free Trade" Bugaboo.
All this talk in the Republican papers about John S. Braddock being a "Free Trader," is idle nonsense, transparent moonshine, without a shadow of foundation, and is merely intended to deceive and mislead the people, and divert their attention from the fact that John Sherman, the principal figure-head in this campaign, is now moving heaven and earth to go back to the United States Senate, in which body he grossly and shamefully betrayed the farmers and wool-growers of Ohio, in the interest of the millionaire manufacturers of New England. As not a word can truthfully be said against Mr. Braddock's standing as a Democrat, or his character as an honorable, high-minded, useful and enterprising citizen, this most ridiculous story is published, which, knowing its purpose, will only have the effect of making Mr. Braddock more friends. Mr. Braddock is heart and soul with the farmers and wool-growers of Knox county in this contest against Sherman, their betrayer.

He is in favor of restoring the duty on wool to what it was before Sherman and the Republican Congress repealed it, as demanded by the Republican manufacturers of New England, who think the whole earth was made for their benefit. Odert is the mere tool of Sherman, and no Democrat and no wool-grower, whatever his political preference may be, should vote for him, as every vote for Odert is a vote for John Sherman.

"Let Us Have Peace."—U. S. Grant.
The people of Ohio don't want another horrible and bloody civil war between the North and South. They want peace, friendship and good-will established between the sections, which will be lasting and beneficial to the whole American people. John Sherman is trying to bring about another civil war, for wicked and devilish purposes—to excite and inflame the minds of the people, so that he will secure another six years' term in the United States Senate. To gratify his ambition he is willing to sacrifice the peace and happiness of the country. Such a bold man must be defeated, and the vote to do it is to vote against every man who stands pledged to vote for Sherman's re-election to the Senate. Therefore, let every man in Knox county, without regard to party, who wants peace and prosperity in the land, vote for John S. Braddock for Representative, and thus place the seal of condemnation upon John Sherman, the agitator and mischief maker, and the enemy of the wool-growers of the State.

A REPUBLICAN Supreme Court decided that the Pond Liquor tax law was unconstitutional, and a Democratic Supreme Court decided that the Scott Liquor tax law was unconstitutional. Both laws were children of the same parent, and both were equally unjust. Now, the Republican party in Ohio, too cowardly to define its position in regard to prohibition, professes to be in favor of re-enacting an unconstitutional law! This is a mere ruse to deceive the voters of Ohio. Foraker is a trickster and straddler, and dare not say how or where he stands on this question. The Democracy, with Gov. Hoadly at its head, stand committed for a graded license, which is the only safe, sensible and rational solution of the liquor question.

The authorities at Montreal issued an order for compulsory vaccination, and this was followed by posting a warning card on a house where the small-pox prevailed in the French part of the city. The occupants tore it down, and when an attempt was made by the police to replace it a terrible riot ensued, which several persons were badly injured. The mob consisted of 20,000 persons, who were frenzied with excitement. They marched through the streets with shouts of "To live with the Commune!" "kill the vicars!" "burn the town!" "hang the English sons of b—s!" The rioters burnt an alderman's house in the East End.

The business men of Cincinnati, justly alarmed at John Sherman's violent tirades against the people of the South, (from which section that city derives its principal trade), will nearly all vote the Democratic ticket this year, especially for the Democratic candidate for the Legislature, so as to prevent this hot-headed agitator and enemy from being sent back to the U. S. Senate. "Self-preservation is the first law of nature," and the business men of Cincinnati do exactly right in striking back against the man who is trying to destroy them.

The Columbus Journal (Rep.) says that if Sherman beats Hoadly in the present campaign, he will be the Republican candidate for President. Precisely Sherman is the big gun in this campaign, and Foraker is merely a head-a-nobody. The way to defeat Sherman's ambition is to vote for John S. Braddock for Representative.

AFTER Gov. Hoadly left Mt. Vernon he spoke in Zanesville on Wednesday evening, at Straitsville on Thursday evening, and at London on Friday evening. He took a week to make speeches, giving great satisfaction, and calling forth immense applause.

The Republican Wall of Distress and its Cause.

Secretary Brown, of the Republican State Central Committee, wrote to a Republican official at Washington, saying: "For God's sake raise some money in your Department. We have absolutely no money to pay speakers, or even the rent of our rooms." The sad state of affairs is chiefly owing to the fact that the business men of Cincinnati, who have generally given liberal contributions to the Republican campaign fund, refuse to do so any longer, when they find that the bloody-shirt speeches of John Sherman are losing them their Southern trade, which is the principal support of Cincinnati. Many of the most influential business and professional men of Cincinnati, on account of Sherman's abuse of the people of the South, and his crazy efforts to bring about another terrible civil war, have cut loose from the Republican party, and will vote with the Democrats hereafter.

The following card from a prominent and influential attorney of Cincinnati, Mr. Thomas Mack, has just been made public. The *Enquirer* states that "the gentleman is prominent in the community, and has hitherto been a staunch Republican. He is an attorney by profession, and is the son of the senior partner of the great wholesale clothing firm of Mack, Stabler & Co." *Enquirer*, September 28, 1885.

A FEW FACTS.
When Lewis Britton was a candidate for Treasurer in 1875, Thomas Odert (the present Republican candidate for Representative) was only a supporter of him, but persuaded several of his Republican friends to vote for him.

After Mr. Britton was sworn into office, Odert went to him and reminded him of his friendship and support, and asked for a large loan of money from the County Treasury, to be used in the purchase of wool. With this request Mr. Britton said he could not comply, as it was contrary to law and a penitentiary offense. Odert undertook to convince him that there was nothing wrong about it; that other treasurers had accommodated him that way. But Mr. Britton could not be moved. He said: "Mr. Odert, I have \$700 to my credit in the First National Bank, and you can have it with pleasure, without note, security or interest, but not a dollar shall go out of that safe unless upon an order drawn by the Auditor in pursuance of law."

From that moment from a pretended friend Thomas Odert became the avowed enemy of Lewis Britton, and at the next election for Treasurer in 1877 he became a candidate against Mr. Britton, and boasted that he would spend all the office was worth to defeat him, and he succeeded.

The facts here stated are given on the authority of Mr. Britton, and he will substantiate them with an affidavit, if necessary.

A man who has such loose ideas of morals, and would seek to make a criminal out of a sworn officer and an honest man, is not a fit person to be sent to Columbus to make laws for the people.

Nominations in New York.
The New York Democratic State Convention, which met at Saratoga, Sept. 24th and 25th was a largely attended and harmonious body. Governor Hill was renominated without serious opposition. He will be re-elected.

John P. Flower was nominated for Lieut. Governor by acclamation. The following is the balance of the ticket: Secretary of State, Frederick Cook; Comptroller, A. A. Chapin; Attorney General, Dennis O'Brien; State Treasurer, Lawrence J. Fitzgerald; State Engineer, Nathan Sweet.

The New York Republican State Convention, which met on the 22d, made the following nominations: Governor, Iris Davenport; Lieut. Governor, Gen. Carr; Secretary of State, Anson S. Wood; Comptroller, James W. Wadsworth.

As odious proverb says, "a burnt child dreads the fire." The farmers and wool-growers of Ohio are now wailing when they trusted John Sherman. He shamefully betrayed them, because the New England manufacturers demanded it. The farmers and wool-growers have learned a bitter lesson, and they will not trust Mr. Sherman again.

Vote for John S. Braddock for Representative and your interests will be safe.

The New York Times (Mugwump) wants to support the Republican State ticket in New York, but the Tribune objects, and reads it out of the G. O. P. This looks strange. Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of Ohio.

ELECTIONS.

House Joint Resolution No. 67.

JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing Amendments to Articles Two, Three, and Ten, of the Constitution of the State.

Be it Enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, That the following amendments to the Constitution of the State of Ohio, shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Ohio, at the general election to be held on the 1st day of January next thereafter, and continue two years.

ARTICLE II.

Section 2. Senators and Representatives shall be elected biennially by the electors of the respective counties or districts, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, their term of office shall be for two years, and shall begin on the 1st day of January next thereafter, and continue two years.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The executive department shall consist of a Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Secretary of State, and an Attorney-General, who shall be elected on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, by the electors of the State, and at places of voting for members of the general assembly.

ARTICLE X.

Section 2. County officers shall be elected on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, by the electors of each county, in such manner, and for such term, not exceeding three years, as may be provided by law.

FORM OF BALLOT.

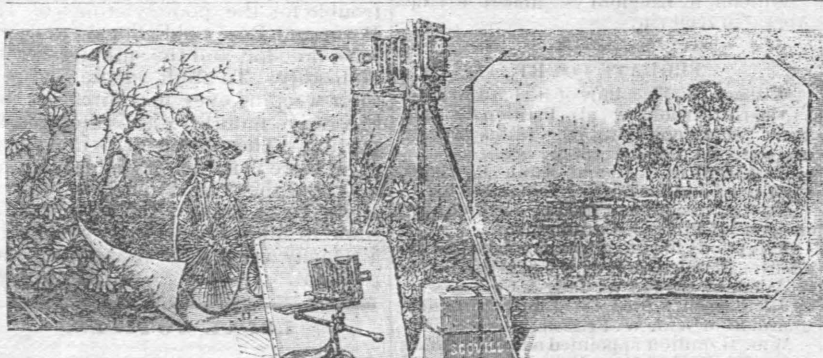

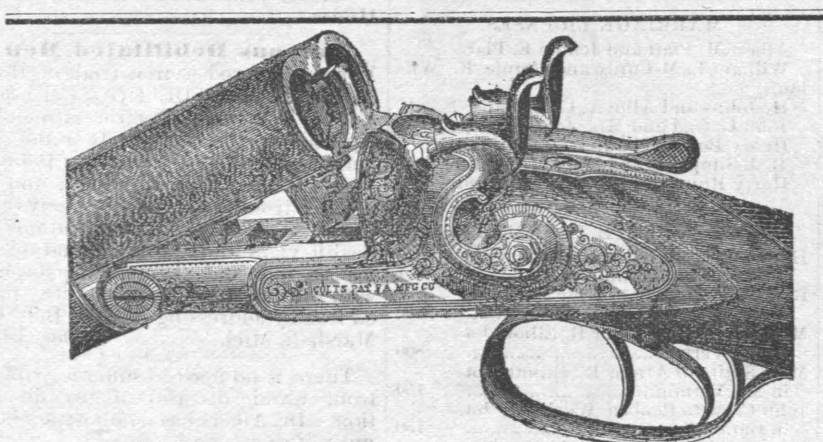
