Which Will You Choose, Lawyers and Bankers, or Farmers and Workmen?

In the course of debate in the Senate, Senator Sherman said that the bank influence in the House was sufficient to control its legislation. A similar policy is now adopted by the Radical leaders in Ohio. They are determined to repeat all State laws imposing a tax on banks, and to throw the entire burden of taxation on industry. This accounts for the nomination of Devin who represents the "Knox County National Bank," and of Cooper who represents the "First National Bank." The Democratic candidates—McDowell for the Senate and Haden for the House, one is a mechanic, the other a farmer—they are men of moral character, and will represent the people instead of the Banks. Let taxpayers choose.

Mr. Boutwell's Speech.

Secretary Boutwell's Cincinnati speech, it now appears, was fully prepared in the Treasury and printed at the Department at the expense of the Government. Profits of the same were mailed on the 27th, to the principal Administration papers of the country. Clerks were engaged for a week previous in copying portions of it and in preparing tables for the same. The speech from beginning to end was a defense of the Administration and the Bondholders. It will make no votes for Radicalism in Ohio.

Butler Defeated.

Ben Butler, the spoon-thief, has been laid on the shelf by the Republicans of Massachusetts, and we honor them for it. They have nominated one of the Washington family for Governor, instead of the hero of Gettysburg, and the spoon-thief is terribly angry about it. He threatens to run on the Labor Reform ticket, and defeat the regular nominee of his party. If the people of Massachusetts wish to have a statesman and a gentleman for Governor of their State, they should vote for John Quincy Adams, the Democratic candidate.

Debt and Pauperism.

Labor fought all the battles, and pays nearly all the taxes. Debt brings poverty. The English debt has made one-eighth of the farming population of England, and one-third of the population of London, paupers. Eighty years ago, in England, there was one land owner for every thirty-two persons; now there is only one land owner for every one thousand persons. If the people wish to see a similar condition of affairs in this country, they have only to keep the Radical party in power.

Young Radical Theives.

Two Government employes at Washington have been detected in stealing the gold and silver beads attached to some half dozen more treaties. They were messengers, one at the Post-office department, and the other at the State department. The Radical disease is getting among the lowest subordinates. It is well the public buildings are well anchored else they would be stolen also, in the hunger and thirst after plunder that prevails at Washington.

Dissolution of the Republican Party.

No better evidence could be given of the decay of the Republican party, than the refusal of Colonel Cooper to vote for Mr. Devin, even if he be a candidate for the State, and of the refusal of Mr. Devin to accept the nomination of a Republican convention. As both of these gentlemen seek the Republican party at defiance, and treat it as being defunct, they have thereby released all Republicans from voting for them, and hundreds will accept the release, and vote the Democratic ticket.

The National Banks in the Field.

Hon. Jos. C. Devin, son-in-law of the "Knox County National Bank," and Hon. W. C. Cooper, son-in-law of the "First National Bank," ask the people to send a law passed requiring the people to pay the taxes which ought to be paid by the banks. Why should not the taxpayers vote for them?

Cooper and Delano.

We understand that Cooper has pledged his honor not to vote for Delano even if he is a candidate for the Senate. Devin says the same thing. Why then, should the friends of Delano, if he has any, vote for them? Are they sincere?

Ex-Senator Allen.

The Cincinnati Commercial has an interesting article from Chillicothe, in which the following mention is made of Senator ALLEN:
The tall young Senator from Ohio, William Allen, is a neighbor of Gen. Wortham. His home is less than a mile away from the old man's hill. Mr. Allen has an interesting personal history, a reliable gentleman in Chillicothe tells me, which is as follows: When a poor young man, in Virginia, he apprenticed to a miller and learned that trade. He is said that he keeps and exhibits his saddle's tools to visitors even now; but, coming to Chillicothe many years ago, to visit an elder sister, who was the wife of a Senator, he was induced to study law. After a while he became enamored of a daughter of General Duncan McArthur, so we may imagine, was willing, but her father was not, and, following the tall young man out of doors, married off his daughter to a Southern gentleman, who took her home. In good time, running against his would-be father-in-law, McArthur, he comes back from the army South a widower. Enter William Allen. The time is come now when he shall take unto himself his first love, and he marries the widow accordingly.
