The Radical leaders are doomed.—Their present desperation is only the death struggle.

General Kilpatrick's "bloody shirt" campaign, with money, didn't succeed in Indiana, after all.

The people are tired of Radical robbery. This is evident by the election returns in Ohio, Indiana and West Virginia.

Governor Hendricks is confident that the Democracy will carry Indiana in November by a majority of at least 20,000. Huza!

The "bloody shirt with money," aided by an army of negro voters from Kentucky, did not save the Radicals of Indiana from defeat.

The Presidential election takes place on Tuesday, November 7th. Democrats, close up your ranks, and charge along the whole line!

The bloody-shirt has indeed proved a winding sheet to the party of Morton and Chandler. The people want peace and better times.

The Cincinnati Enquirer calls General Banning "the blue-eyed boy who can't be bounced," and nominates him for President in 1880.

West Virginia will return two Democratic U. S. Senators to the aid and comfort of President Tilden. Huza for West Virginia.

The bouncing Banning beat Hayes for Congress in 1872, and now he has beaten Hayes' old law partner, Stanley Matthews. Hurrah for Banning!

The total vote polled in Hamilton county at the late election was 55,980, of which William Bell received 28,425, and Barnes 27,555, being a majority for Bell of 870.

West Virginia, which cast her vote for Grant in 1868 and again in 1872, now goes Democratic by majority of 12,000.—And the revolution has only just commenced!

Little Holmes rolled up a majority of 1792 for the Democratic ticket, and Jim Estill has that big cock of his out crowing over the result. Every township gave a Democratic majority.

Although the election of Tilden and Hendricks is an assured fact, yet no Democrat should for a single moment relax his efforts to make our success in November complete and overwhelming.

Of the 240 Gannett papers in the United States, 150 are supporting Tilden, Hendricks and Reform, while the remaining 75 are bolstering up the interests of Grantism by supporting Hayes and Wheeler.

The fanatics who have been laboring to secure a "Solid North" for Hayes, in opposition to the "Solid South," which they presume will be counted for Tilden, missed their reckonings considerably in Indiana.

Cleveland Plain Dealer: We do not believe Governor Hayes will receive any more votes in Ohio than Barnes, and we are confident that Tilden will get very many voters who want a new deal in national matters.

Does the Goddamned editor of the Republican approve of the work of his party leaders in making men beastly drunk, and then put balling in their hands, when reason is gone, and they know not what they are doing?

The Philadelphia Times (Independent) declares that the October elections reverse the judgment of September, and point to Tilden as the probable successor of Grant, leaving but the remotest possibility for the success of Hayes.

A terrible boiler explosion occurred at Zug's Iron Works, Pittsburgh, on Thursday morning of last week, by which fourteen persons were killed, four fatally injured, and twenty-nine wounded. The Nail Mill was blown to atoms.

The result of the election in Indiana filled the Democracy of Pennsylvania with hope, and from this on they mean to make the campaign as "hot as a lime-kiln." Arrangements are making for mass meetings in every part of the State.

James Patrick, Jr., (Dem.) of New Philadelphia, has been chosen Judge of the Court of Common Pleas in the district composed of the counties of Tuscarawas, Harrison and Jefferson, by a majority of 597, over Judge John H. Miller, the present incumbent.

The State of Indiana was gerrymandered, just as Ohio was, by the Radicals, so that they might secure a majority of the Congressmen; and while the Democracy have elected only four of the thirteen Congressmen, they have a majority of 7,000 in the Congressional vote.

It requires for the Democracy a gain of only 1 per cent. over their vote in October, to give the State of Ohio to Tilden and Hendricks in November. Knox county, we feel assured, will more than do her share of the good work. Pike township, alone, promises to make a gain of ten over her October vote.

The Radicals, for \$10,000, cash in hand, bought off the Greenback candidate for Governor in Indiana, and got him to decline in favor of Harrison, the Grant-Hayes candidate; but even this disgraceful trick, although it added 10,000 to the vote of Harrison, did not save the party from deserved defeat.

Hon. John A. McMahon, in his late speech at Greenville, Ohio, referred to the swindling of the poor colored depositors of the Freedman's Bank and stated that he was not most of us, namely, that the bank was advertised as a Government institution, and on the pass-books of the colored depositors was printed a guarantee by the General Government itself of the payment of every dollar deposited. It was this, no doubt, that enabled the radical swindlers at Washington to scoop in the hands of the thrifty darkeys, by tens of thousands. We wonder if there may not be an obligation on the part of the Government to pay the claims of the plundered freedmen?

The Chicago Times regards the result in Ohio and Indiana as a great Democratic victory. To insure the former State for Hayes "the majority should have been at least 15,000," says the Times, and it adds: "The bloody-shirt campaign has offended the thinking element of the party, many of whom voted against the State ticket on Tuesday to testify that abhorrence, and many more will vote against it in November to cast such baleful demagoguery permanently out of American politics." So the Times concludes that the effort to carry the State for Hayes in November is "a good deal more hopeless—a useless work."

The New York Sun says that "Governor Tilden will get a great vote in New York from those who have since the war steadily opposed the Democratic party, but who now see that the only hope of restoring honesty, economy, and statesmanship to the conduct of the Government is in electing the candidates of that party; and in bringing about an entire change in the character of the men who control the Administration and in the methods upon which it works. Gov. Tilden is best known in New York, and here he is most highly appreciated and most implicitly trusted."

The Radical papers in Cincinnati claim that the Democracy carried that city and elected Saylor and Banning by fraudulent votes. Of course this is a trumped up story, manufactured for political effect, and to afford an excuse for men who lost best by not paying them. We have not the slightest doubt but that there was fraudulent voting in Cincinnati, and plenty of it, too; but it was the work of the corrupt Radical leaders, who would "take hell" if they could make votes thereby to keep themselves in power.

We would suggest to the Reverend Hamilton that he will make no friends by continuing his filthy abuse of Mr. John F. Gray, after the people of the county have elected him Sheriff by a handsome majority. Never was a candidate so outrageously slandered and lied about as Mr. Jay has been by the so-called Christian gentleman who is running the Republican party of Knox county; and yet, this sneaking clerical hypocrite and slanderer, when he meets Mr. Gray on the street, is killing him polite and friendly!

The Radical papers take especial delight in publishing shameful falsehoods in regard to the appointments made by the House of Representatives. The truth is that of the 123 appointments on the roll of the doorknockers, 35 served in the Union Army, 10 in the Confederate Army, 2 in the Mexican War, 11 are colored, and 65 are non-combatants, page-boys, etc. The former Republican House had 155 appointees, one of whom states that there were only 18 Union soldiers among them.

Bully for Banning, the bouncing beautiful, blue-eyed boy of destiny. He never was beaten, and we guess never will be beaten. On the night after the election he made a glowing speech to his friends and neighbors, who called at his house to congratulate him. He concluded with this stirring remark: "And again thanking you, my friends, I have a barrel of punch in my house, and I invite you all in to help me drink it," and the motion was carried by acclamation.

It was urged, at Cincinnati, as a reason why Hayes should be nominated, that he would carry Ohio by 40,000 and Indiana by 15,000. But now, that he has barely escaped defeat in his own State, and loses Indiana by a decisive majority, it only goes to show that as a candidate he is a signal failure. Sitting Bull Morton and old Zach Chandler see this, and although they will bluster and bully a while longer, they are really ready to throw up the sponge.

The Washington correspondent of the Cincinnati Times (Republican) states that twenty companies of troops have been sent into South Carolina, and that twenty more will be sent next week. Zach Chandler & Co. believe that with the aid of all these bayonets, South Carolina may be relied upon to vote for Hayes and Wheeler. A greater outrage was never perpetrated upon a free people.

In the United States House of Representatives previous to the present, Ohio was represented by seven Democrats and thirteen Republicans. In the present House it is represented by thirteen Democrats and seven Republicans. In the last House Indiana had three Democrats and ten Republicans, and in this House it has eight Democrats and five Republicans.

A sharp demand for currency is reported at Chicago now from all sections of the wheat, corn and cotton regions, the amounts sent out by the banks averaging about \$500,000 per day. The results of this movement will be seen in the large receipts of grain and cattle at that point, an improvement in collections and a fresh impulse to business generally.



Indiana Legislature Democratic.
Latest returns from Indiana are as follows: "The Democrats will have the election on joint ballot. The Democrats have twenty-seven in the senate and forty-eight in the lower house, now with two counties to hear from, which will tie matters in the house and give the Democracy two majority on joint vote. The Hoosier State is good for 15,000 majority in November for Tilden, Hendricks and Reform."

John D. Lee, a participant in the Mountain Meadow massacre, nineteen years ago, was sentenced to death at Salt Lake City on the 10th instant. The prisoner having the right, under the law, to choose between hanging, shooting and beheading, chose to be shot. The sentence will be executed January 26th, 1877.

Sixteen thousand soldiers are just landed in Cuba from Spain, and 24,000 more were drafted on the 7th instant. A member of the Ministry authorizes the statement that Gen. Martinez Campos goes to Cuba to assume command, and to crush out the rebellion. Gen. Jovellar is to continue as Captain General of Cuba.

Gen. Wade Hampton has just completed his canvass of the Northern portion of South Carolina and now takes in the Southern counties. The living issues of the canvass have been ably and thoroughly handled by Gen. Hampton, and he feels confident that, with a fair and peaceful election, the State will go Democratic by a fair majority.

A patriotic Pennsylvanian, on Thursday, after paying his own entrance fee, handed the Centennial gatekeeper a ten dollar bill and turned the side around half a dozen times, remarking that his four children couldn't come, but he was representing them. Another man took out the value of a ten dollar bill in the same way.

Under Democratic rule the expenses of the White House were \$47,847 50; but now, under Radical rule, they have swelled to \$108,254 87. McMahon's majority in the Dayton District is only 98. He carried his own county (Montgomery) by a good solid majority of 1,222.
The majority for Cox over Hurd in the Toledo district is officially reported at 1,926. The Greenback candidate received 1500 votes.

Jackson township, Auglaize county, gave 476 votes at the recent election, of which only four were Republican. They must have an honest population out there.

Two More Votes for Hayes.
Jake Rehm, the chief conspirator of the Chicago Whiskey Ring, who was put behind bars by the determined efforts of Secretary Bristow, was pardoned out of prison on Monday by the President of the United States.
Anton Cesar Hessing, the recently Boss of the Ring, has been enjoying the free air for several weeks, also pardoned by the President of the United States.
These two men and their confederates, all of whom are now free, pardoned out of prison by the President of the United States, robbed the nation of more than three million dollars.
Hessing was an educated, accomplished man, a politician who dictated nominations to Congress and to the Legislature. Rehm, his chief tool, was a vulgar, sordid, illiterate scoundrel. The pair was equally bold, equally unscrupulous, and equally prominent in one of the most infamous schemes of public villainy to be found in history.
Grant has been provided at least two more votes in Illinois for Hayes and against Tilden and Reform.—N. Y. Sun.

The Colored Men for Tilden.
The Colored Men's Central Tilden and Hendricks Club, New York City, held a meeting last Wednesday evening, which was broken up by the violence. Customed Republicans led by a gang of Custom-house retainers. They met again Friday night under the protection of the police. The hall was packed, and hundreds could not get in. It was the largest meeting of colored men held in that city for years.—The Sun says:

"Colonel John Taylor, who served in a colored regiment in the war, and was especially commended for bravery, replied: 'I came to this meeting expecting to have my head broken by the Custom-house roughs, but I am not to be deterred by threats, and I am not coward enough to not to perform my duty. There are hundreds of colored men in this city who are going to vote the Democratic ticket. Why? Because the Republicans have patted us on the backs just to fool us. They got us to put one money in the Republican Bank, and swindled poor white washers, bootblacks, washwomen and waiters out of hard earnings. Now we know the Democrats are our best friends.'"

Colorado in Doubt.
KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 13.—A Denver special to the Times says La Platte county, claimed by the Republican, gives 103 Democratic majority for Patterson for Congress. Hinsdale, San Juan and Rio Grande counties must be officially reported to determine the result. It is thought the Republican State ticket will be successful by a meagre majority.

Grant, in obedience to the orders of Chandler, Cameron & Co., has issued a Proclamation declaring that insurrection exists in South Carolina, (which is an outrageous falsehood), and has sent the entire Army, as he says, to carry the election at the point of the bayonet. This is the crowning outrage of this wicked and corrupt Administration.

Courier-Journal. The American Alliance proposes to ostracize all foreigners who are in this country, and who may come here in the future. Rutherford B. Hayes, the Republican candidate for the Presidency, is a member of the Alliance, is his chosen Presidential candidate, and has by letter sought its co-operation to carry the States of New York, New Jersey and Connecticut. No denial of this statement has emanated from Governor Hayes.

A foolish bet has been made in Cincinnati. If Tilden is elected a councilman of that city will take a good-sized bag and go from room to room in every house in one ward and beg for some rags which are to be sold for charitable purposes. If Hayes is elected the Tilden man will officiate.

Gravel Roads.

No county in the State can surpass Old Knox in the number and excellence of its Iron Bridges. Our Commissioners some years ago commenced this praiseworthy work, and by levying a small tax for bridge purposes each year, they are having substantial Iron Bridges erected over the principal streams in the county. Of no less importance to the farmers of our county will be the construction of good gravel roads, by which they can reach the county seat at all seasons of the year, and bring their surplus products to market with the least possible trouble. During three or four months of the year, our roads have been in such wretched condition that travel over them was next to an impossibility. But we are rejoiced to know that this subject is now engaging the attention of our farmers and business men, and we have reason to believe that within the next year or two a grand system of gravel roads will be inaugurated throughout the county. The Martinsburg road, South of Mt. Vernon, has heretofore been one of the worst thoroughfares in the county; but during the past summer Hon. Columbus Delano, at his own expense, commenced graveling this road from his house Northward; and now, by the aid of H. B. Curtis, P. H. Updegraff, and other enterprising citizens, this work is being extended to the city limits. This is a splendid beginning. Let others follow the example. A drive out on the Martinsburg road is all that is necessary to satisfy any one of the immense value and exceeding beauty of the gravel road system. We shall take occasion to refer to this subject frequently.

Each person charged with Taxes for the year 1876, on the Tax Duplicate of Knox county, is required by Law to pay one-half of said Tax on or before the 20th of December, 1876, and the remaining half on or before the 20th of June following; but may at his option, pay the full amount of such Taxes on or before said 20th of December next. Tax-payers will be afforded every opportunity to pay their taxes, yet in order to avoid the penalties prescribed by Law in case of non-payment at the proper time, and to enable the Treasurer to make his settlement according to Law, they will be expected to respond promptly, as 5 per cent. will be added to all Taxes due and unpaid on the 1st day of January, 1877.

Road Receipts must be presented at the time of payment of Taxes, otherwise they will not be received.
