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Letter to George and Philander Jr.

Philander Chase

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Hand. Sunday evening
Decr 13. 1812

My dear Son:

I have just come from Church, -
very much fatigued. I seem to feel my weakness more
and more and have taken the Doctor's advice.

I thank you George for your Letter: the news from
the Northward was pretty good except that concerning
Cyrus. I dare not read that part of Inbripi's Letter
in the hearing of his Mother it would render her dis-
trasted. Tell Orrin to write to Cyrus immediately in-
forming that if he prosecutes his design of going into
the Army he will give a wound to the peace of his
Mother which nothing can heal & forever alienate
the affections of both Mrs Chase and myself. These
very words I wish him to communicate to this
same Master Cyrus Fay.

Your Mother wonders her Shawls do not come
and insists upon their being sent immediately
whether done or not done, wet, or dry. Let them
be well bound up with directions on a Letter

Mr. Lloyd begs me to engage a place at Col. Hitch-
cock's with him, for his Son Samuel. Now let
it be known to the Col. and family that this said
Saml. Lloyd is as good & peaceable a boy as ever
was and that he has set his heart on going
to Cheshire and boarding with you or with him
he is a pretty good Latin Scholar, and more
advantage to the Academy and to the teacher than
a Tyro.

If Pimcon come to Cheshire, you must provide
him a good place say at Mr Ives' Col. Hitchcock's
Mr Brunson's Mr Beards. with you, or send
him to me in Hartford.

Your dear Mother is better than she has been for
some time. Your Gran. Mother has a bad cold &
has not been to Church. Almira has staid at
home because of - the reason is too lengthy - I can't
write it. - The Rev. Mr Cornwell has been
with me to day and I am much pleased with his piety
and good sense. Saml. Lloyd is now waiting
for this letter - you must not forget him and

his anxiety to go to Cheshire as soon as can be
Your friends are all well and often mention you
with tenderness - Mr Lee has gone to New York.
- Now, dear boys! Don't think that we forget you
scarcely a moment - paper which does not bring you
dear images to our mind in some shape or other
Your prosperity and patient continuance in the
ways of well-doing will be ever to your Parents
more than meat or drink.

Am faint and weary - Do forgive
my scrawl - Take no example from it
But the tenderness which dictates every word
- Once more dear boys - Remember my
confidence in your Integrity - Remember
I live in your good behavior.
Write me all the News.

Our best respects to Mr Brunson and best con-
pliments to Mr & Mrs Beach. Come to Ohio -
Tell him not to forget his letter & the senti-
ment which I send him tho not in my name
Your Mother Grand Mother and Aunt all
send their most affectionate love. R Chase
