Colored Orator Opens Local
Rep. Campaign

OMITS TYLER'S FATE

Meeting Composed Chiefly Of Can-
didates And Committeemen—Col-
ored Votes Conspicuous
By Absence—Empty
Seats Abound—Fu-
ture Looks Very
Gloomy

Moving picture shows a walk up
and down Main street and a harp-
player proved decidedly more attrac-
tive to scores and scores of former
straight-laced Republicans of the city
and the formal opening of their cam-
paign, with Wilber D. Kint of Colum-
bus, colored orator, as the speaker
of the evening, attracted only a pal-
try few to the court house Saturday
night and those, in the main, were
candidates for county office and mem-
bers of the central and executive
committees.

There was a woeful lack of real en-
thusiasm after Garfield Snow's band
departed. In fact, the campaign
might well have been opened in the
Arctic regions with the spectators
sitting around in B. V. D.'s as far
real warmth is concerned.

County candidates and committe-
men, after parading about the streets
in the rear of Snow's band, finally
reached the court house. There were
more in the band than were in line.
The band played well, but it left too
soon.

The purpose of the campaign open-
ing was to line up colored voters for
Hughes. This was vigorously and
enthusiastically denied by the speaker
of the evening who was probably not
aware of the great efforts which were
put forth by the local Republican
machine Saturday to induce the col-
ored people to attend—efforts which
were rewarded in many cases by flat
refusals.

There were a number of colored
people in attendance, possibly 15, but
even they were not treated with the
courtesy due them on such occasions,
as a quartet or more were allowed to
remain standing in the rear, although
there were scores of vacant seats.

The Republican glee club started
