Ordinance Passed Extending Middle Sewer District—Contract Awarded for Building Culvert—Other Matters Up for Consideration.

There was great interest manifested in Monday night's meeting of Council, the report having been broadcast, though the efforts of the anti-local, league of Mt. Vernon were to be introduced.

As a matter of fact the subject was not brought up at the meeting of Council and the routine proceedings were about as stale as could be imagined.

There was some foundation, however, for the talk and flurry created by the sensational rumors. It was learned that the anti-local league had been vigorously agitating the matter, since the late general election, and that most, if not all, the Councilmen had been seen and imported to vote for the proposition to submit the question to a number of the members were non-committal, some were outspoken in their opposition to the measure, and when it came to "count noses," the agitators concluded it was not safe to force the question to an issue at Monday night's meeting.
