Berlin, Feb. 28 .- The war office has received the following from Count Von Waldersee, dated Peking, Feb. 27: "A patrol of eight Germans repulsed an attack by 160 Chinese imperial troops at Suling pass, killing 20."

Germany In Line.

Berlin, Feb. 28.-Germany will endorse the proposition of the United States, Great Britain and France for the punishment of the guilty provincial officials, and will support the same in the conferences of the ministers of the powers in Peking. This statement is made on the best authority. It is regarded here also as practically certain that the proposition will be adopted unanimously. German officials emphasize the fact that the proposition is non-German, but that Germany is friendly to it.

Alliance Against Uncle Sam.

Berlin, Feb. 28 .- The Cologne Volks Zeitung, the leading Centrist organ, argues in favor of Germany maintaining a good understanding with England, "in order to have a freer hand against the United States," adding: "We have hitherto shown the gentlemen in Washington too much readiness to yield. We can only make them feel the full weight of our power when England does not stand in the way.'

Warner had received a letter head ed, "Silence or death!" and dated Kansas City, Feb. 23. It recited that the writer, who was a member of a gang of five men, intended to kidnap the banker's son, and hold him for ransom, unless he placed \$1,000 in gold in a sack and placed it under the steps leading to the Odd Fellows' hall, a short distance from the business part of town. The letter threatened the Warner family with destruction should Warner fail to comply.

Mr. Warner filled the bag with slugs and deposited it as directed, David Wood, a friend, concealing himself nearby. The steps led up to the lodge rooms of the Odd Fellows' lodge, of which Bearden was a member. It was the night of the regular lodge meeting, and when it had concluded Bearden was the last man to leave the building. 
