OHIO STATE NEWS.

— The Noble County National Bank having received its charter, has gone into operation.

— William Nye, Car Inspector of the C. C. & I. Railroad was killed at Cleveland Thursday, being crushed between two freight cars.

— Morgan county has a 35-year old widow, who weighs 440 pounds, is good-looking and rich.

— A horse disease called the Rheumatism, and proving fatal in many instances, has appeared in Cincinnati.

— The emigrants passing through Toledo, in four days of last week, on their way westward, amounted to nearly fifteen hundred.

— Leopold Spangle died suddenly of heart disease in Chillicothe, Saturday night; the third death from that disease within three days.

— The fourteenth annual convention of the Ohio State Sabbath School Union will be held at Akron, June 11th and 12th, 1873.

— The funeral of Judge Isaac Barker, of Athens, aged 94 years, one of the original settlers of Marietta and 70 years a resident of Athens, occurred Tuesday.

— The Circleville Herald of the 16th says: In Pickaway county there are 34 paupers of the age of 70 years and upward, including Patsy Grant of Saltcreek township, aged 98, and Daniel Holmes, of Circleville, aged 94.

— The Massillon American says that McCue & Billings, of Fulton, have taken a contract to build six miles of the Valley Railroad from Canton northward. They commenced labor last Monday with 27 men.

— The eastern part of Perry county is noted for the manufacture of Pottery Ware. Hundreds of thousands of gallons are yearly shipped to different parts of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Kentucky.

— John A. Trimble, of Hillsboro, is preparing a history of the war of 1812, and a memoir of the services of Col. Wm. A. Trimble, of the old U. S. 8th Infantry, and Senator in Congress, from Ohio, during the Presidency of Monroe.

— The District Court at Ironton, has affirmed a judgment for \$5,000 damages against Thomas Evans, who was convicted of selling liquor to the husband of Mrs. Lewis, who, we believe, was in a state of intoxication.

— On Monday, 5th inst., at about noon, Mrs. Koller, the wife of the Rev. Hy Koller, about 2 miles North of Oceola, on the old Plank Road, Crawford county, committed suicide by hanging herself in the barn, with a skein of yarn.

— Bishop Bodell has appointed Dr. Burr, the oldest presbyter of the diocese in active service, to preach the funeral sermon upon the death of the late Bishop McIlvaine, at the opening of the Episcopal Convention to be held at Sandusky, May 20th.

— Mechanicsburg, Champaign county is becoming an important stock shipping point. During the past season, there were shipped 238 car loads of cattle, 3,808 head; 105 cars of sheep, 21,000 head; 70 cars of hogs, 5,350 head. Also, 109 car loads of grain and 22 of wool.

— The Ohio Liberal says: The Salem shops are in a "languishing state. The Etta shops now owned by J. Twing Brooks, are doing a small business. The Buckeye Engine Works, the largest of the shops have discharged two-thirds of their mechanics. The Salem Manufacturing Company has given up the ghost. The stove shops are in full blast.

— Another terrible tornado, with heavy rain, similar to the one about a year ago, passed through the eastern part of Shelby county about 4 o'clock, Friday afternoon, extending through the villages of Palestine, Pemberton and Quincy, unrooting and destroying many houses. A great many injuries are reported, but nothing definite is known. The telegraph lines are down. W. F. Forsythe, Sewing Machine Agent of Sidney, was overtaken by the storm. His horse was instantly killed, and the buggy blown to atoms, himself making a narrow escape.
