The Cincinnati Presbytery, that has for some time past been engaged in trying the Rev. Dr. Henry Preserved Smith for "heresy," has brought its labors to a close. On the first charge in the indictment he was found "not guilty." On the second and third counts, however, the jury found a verdict of guilty. These are the charges that pertain to his views on inspiration. The second charge was that he taught contrary to the fundamental doctrine of the word of God and of the confession of faith; that the holy spirit did not so control the inspired writers in their composition of the Holy Scriptures as to make their utterances absolutely California.
