**Joseph Bradfield Seized By Men At Local Shops**

**RESCUED BY SHERIFF**

**Men Claim Bradfield Made Unpatriotic Remarks To Workman**

Joseph Bradfield, colored, employed at the local shops of the Pennsylvania railroad, made a mistake Tuesday that came near having serious results when he made a remark to a fellow workman that was taken up at once as pro-German sentiment. Workmen in the shop claim Bradfield said he didn't care what became of the rest of the soldiers, "just so I get my boy back."

The remark was taken up at once by the other workmen and Bradfield was roughly handled. Sheriff Mosholder and Deputy Sheriff Lytle were called to the shops at once and they rescued Bradfield from the crowd, gave him a severe lecture and let him go after he had said he was sorry and promised to refrain from similar remarks in the future.

The boy Bradfield is alleged to have made reference to in his son, who is now in France with the A. E. F.

## BUILD ROADS OF GRAVEL NOW. IS ADVICE OF HAYS

**Co. Commissioner Declares Good Highways Are Essential**

**GIVES ADDRESS AT C. OF C. NOONDAY LUNCH**

**Urges That Dirt Roads Instead Of Brick Are Best For Present**

Roads, their cost, construction and maintenance, was the subject taken up at length before the members of the Chamber of Commerce at their noonday luncheon Wednesday by County Commissioner George W. Hays, who has studied roads and has had much experience in building them.

Commissioner Hays declared that the average farmer has selfish ideas concerning good roads, that is, he wants them near his farm because they will increase his income eventually. However, said Mr. Hays, if Knox county is to have a network of good roads everyone must take an interest in promoting them other than that selfish interest he said the farmer takes.

Commissioner Hays took one mile of road near Danville as an example of what kind of a road may be had at a minimum first cost and small maintenance cost. The road is gravel and in time will become permanent and it is only a question of having one mile of brick or concrete road or from four to eight miles of good gravel road as the cost is equivalent.

Commissioner Hays declared that, in his belief, good roads are becoming more essential each day and that good gravel roads leading to market roads are the best thing for the present.

Chairman H. G. Benn, just before introducing the speaker, reported three new members of the Chamber of Commerce.

After the meeting M. L. Abstetter outlined the 1918 chautauqua program. Rev. W. H. Shields followed Abstetter with an appeal to the Chamber of Commerce to back the chautauqua.
