### Injuries Sustained By Mrs. Gilmore In A Runaway

Mrs. Maria E. Gilmore, residing on East Curtis street, sustained a broken arm in a runaway, which occurred north-east of the city on Sunday morning. Mrs. Gilmore was driving a horse hitched to a buggy and was going to North Liberty to visit with relatives when the accident occurred. She had reached a point near the Ebenezer church when the horse scared at some object at the road side and ran away. Mrs. Gilmore made every effort to stop the frightened animal, but was unsuccessful and as a result, the buggy was upset in a ditch. She was thrown forcibly to the ground and was rendered unconscious for a short time. Assistance was rendered by people residing a short distance from the spot where the accident occurred and the injured woman was taken to the farm house where Dr. F. L. Singray was summoned. It was found that in addition to a number of very painful bruises, Mrs. Gilmore's left arm was broken. She was brought to her home in Mt. Vernon soon afterward.
