GEN. JOHN G. MITCHELL.

You Know Him.—Republican Pension Agent at Columbus.

Read his refutation of the falsehoods as prepared by Major McKinley's managers, who, with their usual disregard of the truth and for the purpose of arousing prejudice with the soldier element, have given out a document, which states that between 1,700 and 1,800 soldiers in Ohio had been suspended from the pension rolls during the month of August.

Here is a letter from Gen. John G. Mitchell, in reply to an interrogatory from Col. W. A. Taylor, and gives the following information, which establishes as absolutely false the statements made by Republican editors and speakers:

UNITED STATES PENSION AGENCY, Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 1, 1893. Hon. W. A. Taylor:

My Dear Sir:—Your favor of the 28th of July, 1893, was received. The total number of pensioners of all classes on the rolls of this agency on July 31, 1893, was—

Total number August 31, 1893—103,140. During the month of August the following changes were shown:

Total loss to the roll—182. By death—107. By expiration of term—75. By legal limitation—11. By transfer to other agencies—19. Total gain—4,563. Added during August—4,563. Since July 31, 1893, the number of pensioners has increased by 4,381.

This shows plainly that there were 16 dropped from the rolls that could possibly be by suspension. It also shows that there were added to the Ohio pension rolls by original grants and transfers in a single month 4,563 names.

Does this show that this administration is hostile to the ex-soldier?

Gen. Mitchell is good Republican authority for the reason that at the time the above letter was written he was the keeper of the record at the Ohio pension agency. Therefore this statement, copied from the rolls in his office, must be accepted as authoritative and branding as liars and legitimate descendants and heirs of their great prototype Ananias, those who have industriously published to the contrary.

We ask if the ex-soldiers of Ohio endorse this kind of political skill-dugery and willful deception.

The Toledo Sunday Journal, edited and owned by an old-time Abe Lincoln Republican, perpetrates the following bit of delicious irony on the Major's great oratorical effort in Toledo:

"Governor McKinley should have a large majority next November. Will he? That is the question. This is a Republican State, and the people have not yet been interrupted at presidential elections for more than 30 years. But there really seems small cause for all the previous blarney. THE DARK SIDE OF LIFE.

It is very evident that the millennium is not approaching from the unusual number of murders, suicides, robberies, white cap outrages, &c., that are daily taking place throughout the country.

We note below a few of the most prominent occurrences of this kind that have been brought to our notice during the past week.

At Georgetown, Ohio, Mrs. A. J. Wagner, in a fit of despondency, caused by the death of her husband, cut the throats of her two children, aged 4 and 6, and killed herself by a self-inflicted wound.

At Guyanotte, West Va., two negro barbers, who had formerly been partners in business, named Owen Pleasant and Millard Wellman, had a difficulty, and meeting in front of a church, while the congregation, were at worship, proceeded to settle it with knives and pistols. Wellman was shot dead.

At Georgetown, Ky., Town Marshal George James arrested Loyal Cales for disorderly conduct at an election. After his release Cales declared that he would kill the marshal on sight. The next day the two met on the street, and a duel with pistols commenced. James was killed and Cales was badly wounded.

Samuel Dorsey, a well-to-do barber at Washington, Pa., after leaving his shop late on Saturday night, was foully murdered on the street and robbed of all his money. Two negroes were under arrest charged with the murders.

At Sioux Falls, Neb., Harry Lacey, a lawyer and real estate agent, shot and killed his wife and his mother-in-law, Mrs. Zida, and then walked out of the house and sent a bullet through his own brain. Lacey's two children witnessed the tragedy.

The house of Peter Lyons, a well-known Populist of Kenton, O., was entered by two masked robbers a few nights ago, who commanded him to hold up his hands, while they robbed him of \$21. Lyons was shot in the head but will recover.

There has been a hot rivalry between George Washington and William Harris, two negro porters for hotels at Bellaire, O. George invited Harris about his duddish clothes, whereupon the latter drew a knife, but before he could get in his work Harris put a bullet into him, causing his death.

In Campbell county, West Va., Mrs. Ira Brooks and her two daughters were killed when they were walking in the neighborhood and must leave but paying no attention to the notice, they were raised by white caps, who set fire to their house and burned it to the ground, with all its contents. The women barely escaped with their lives. Hereafter the women were objectionable characters the best people in the neighborhood are greatly increased, and the white caps will be prosecuted.

The town of Osceola, Neb., has also a white cap sensation. The Woman's Christian Temperance Union, organized themselves into a band of white caps for the express purpose of chastising some young women whose reputation for chastity was not above reproach. The erring sisters were decoyed from their homes and dragged into insensibility. Eleven of the perpetrators are known. Some of them are in jail and others are out on bail.

Nathan Strauss, a leading dry-goods merchant of New York, who was of an extremely nervous temperament, committed suicide by shooting himself on the 25th ult. He was a popular man and his domestic life is said to have been happy.

Leonard Johnson, bartender in James H. Lomas's saloon, Clark and Harrison streets, Chicago, was shot and instantly killed last Wednesday night by a man named Bert Young, without any cause whatever.

While in a depondent mood because he could not procure work, Samuel Williamson, a blacksmith, at Altoona, Pa., committed suicide by hanging himself with an apron strap to the closet door in his bedroom. He was 44 years of age. A wife survives him.

THE SHERMAN SILVER LAW REPEALED

By a VOTE of 43 YEAS to 32 NAYS.

After one of the longest and most memorable and exciting contests ever witnessed in the United States Senate, a vote on the repeal of the Sherman Silver Purchasing Act was reached on Monday evening at 7:25 o'clock, when the Voorhees Bill passed by a vote of 43 yeas to 32 nays, and the long agony was over. Before the final vote was reached the numerous amendments offered by different Senators were taken up in their order, and were all voted down. The discussion, which lasted for sixty-one days, was kept up to the very last moment, the silver men making an earnest and bitter fight for their side of the question. Of course, no weekly news paper can pretend to give even a brief sketch of this most remarkable debate, which will make five volumes of the Congressional Record, a book as large as a family bible.

The bill as it passed the Senate, was the Wilson House Bill as amended by Senator Voorhees. It will go back to the House of Representatives for concurrence.

The following is the vote in the Senate.

Of the yeas 23 were Republicans and 20 Democrats; of the vote 9 were Republicans (all from the silver States) with the exception of Don Cameron) and 21 Democrats. All the Populists (Senator Allen, Irby, Kyle, Martin and Peffer) voted nay. Senators Sherman and Bruce voted for the measure.

Here is the Same Old Story.

A disastrous collision occurred on the Pennsylvania Railroad on last Wednesday evening, about a mile west of Lawrence Station, New Jersey. The second section of the Chicago limited, bound for New York, with seven sleepers, ran into part of a freight train, which had jumped the track. The engine of the limited telescoped three of the freight cars and was thrown down an embankment ten feet, and a sleeper and three cars followed it—the other sleepers remaining on the track. The freight was scattered in all directions. Twelve passengers were injured and four tramps were killed while stealing a ride.

Seven unemployed men, in search of work, boarded a coal train at Harrisburg, Pa., last Thursday. The train jumped a switch, wrecking several cars. Four of the unfortunate men were crushed to death under the grinding mass. The body of Richard Doyle, a railroad man of Pittsburgh, was the only one identified. The bodies were horribly mangled. All of the men were from the Western part of the State, bound East in search of work.

A sink-hole on the Ann Arbor, Mich., railroad, gave way last Thursday evening, forcing the engine and twenty freight cars to leave the track, causing a complete wreck. The engineer, fireman and front brakeman were all killed. A fire completed the work of destruction.

Republican and Democratic Meetings.

Ananias continues to get in his work for the Columbus Journal from all parts of the State. He reports the Republican meetings as monstrous gatherings, numbers from 5,000 to 10,000 people, while the Democratic meetings are all "fizzles" with only from 100 to 500 in attendance.

The Columbus Dispatch, however, which is a fair Republican paper, tells a different story about Neal's meetings. Of the one held in Lancaster on Thursday night, the Dispatch says: "The Opera House was packed and the aisles all filled, and it was evidently a Neal crowd as they gave him an ovation when he made his appearance on the stage. The Chairman of the meeting, Hon. Charles D. Martin, one of the old Democratic warriors, in brief and eloquent remarks introduced Mr. Neal, who, when he arose, was greeted with a perfect storm of cheers. * * * The remarks of Mr. Neal were received with great enthusiasm and the meeting is considered one of the best ever held in Fairfield county."

The Cranks are Low at Work.

In New York, on Monday afternoon, a crazy man named Thomas Bradley, emulating the example of the wretch who killed Mayor Harrison in Chicago, fired two shots into Frederick Matthias, Superintendent of the new Postal Telegraph Building, against whom he fancied he had a grievance. Fortunately neither shot was fatal. If the police had not interfered to protect him, the would-be murderer would have been torn to pieces by a mob of over 1,500 persons.

On Monday afternoon, Edwin Gould, second son of the late Jay Gould, and co-heir of the latter's millions, was called upon by a well-dressed crank named Andrews, who said: "Give me that \$50,000 and give it quick, or the tip of the market." Mr. Gould told him to sit down for a moment until he got the money out of the safe. He then went into another room and brought in a policeman, who said to the crank: "Come with me and we'll get the money." Whereupon he handcuffed the crank and took him to a police station.

The Death Roll.

Rev. Samuel W. Haddaway, Chaplain of the House of Representatives and pastor of the M. E. Church, South, in Washington, died Oct. 27, of Bright's disease.

Ex-Judge William T. McKennan, of the United States Circuit Court, for the district of Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware, died in Pittsburgh, Oct. 27, after a prolonged illness, aged 77 years.

Judge Bond, of the United States Circuit Court, died at Baltimore, on Saturday. His circuit was composed of the States of Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia and North and South Carolina. This will leave a vacancy for the President to fill.

John W. Andrews, one of the oldest and best known lawyers of Columbus, died of paralysis at the home of his daughter in Englewood, N. J., on Monday, aged 81 years. He was for many years a Trustee of Kenyon College, and drafted the Constitution of that institution. His remains were taken to Columbus for interment.

ASSASSINATED

Cartier H. Harrison, Mayor of Chicago.

Murdered in His Own House on Saturday Evening.

Three Bullets are Fired Into Him by a Crank Named Pendergast.

There was intense excitement in Chicago, Saturday evening, when it was learned that Hon. Carter H. Harrison, the Mayor of the City, was assassinated in his own house by a crank named Eugene Patrick Pendergast, a newspaper carrier, aged about 25 years.

The assassin went to the residence of Mr. Harrison, 231 South Ashland boulevard, about 8 o'clock and rang the bell. When Mrs. Harrison answered, he asked her to open the door. She did so, and he entered. He then turned to the right and fired three shots into the Mayor in rapid succession. One ball shattered Mr. Harrison's left hand, another passed into the lower right side of the abdomen, making a mortal wound and the third bullet entered the chest, slightly above the heart. This bullet was the immediate cause of his death. He lived but twenty minutes after receiving the fatal shots.

Prescott Harrison, the Mayor's son, came tearing down stairs, and pressed the burglar alarm, which was speedily responded to, and at the same moment the coachman pursued and fired at the rapidly retreating assassin, but he got too far out of reach for his bullets to take effect. Neighbors rushed into the house and physicians were telephoned for, but before they reached the house Mr. Harrison's spirit had taken its flight. He spoke but a few words. "I'm shot in the heart," he said, "and am a dead man." The last words he uttered were, "send for Annie," meaning the young lady to whom he was betrothed.

The murderer took the first street car and went direct to the Desplaines Street Station, where he entered and gave himself up, making known what he had done, while he still held the revolver in his hand. When asked why he killed the Mayor, he answered, "He said he would make me Corporation Counsel, and he did not do it. That's what I shot him for."

In a few minutes an immense crowd of people gathered around the police station, and as there was loud talk about capturing and lynching the assassin, the officers had him quickly taken out of a back door, placed in a carriage, and rapidly driven in the dark to the Central Station in the City Hall.

Mayor Harrison, who was a widower, was engaged to be married to Miss Annie Howard, a beautiful, wealthy and accomplished young lady of New Orleans, who is reputed to be worth \$4,000,000 in her own right, and was liberal and charitable as she was wealthy. This young lady during the summer, visited Chicago as the guest of an old New Orleans friend, a daughter of Judge R. N. Ogden, who married Carter Harrison, Jr. It was here that Mayor Harrison became acquainted with her and a mutual attachment sprang up between them, resulting in a marriage engagement, which was to have been consummated on the 7th of November. Miss Howard is overwhelmed with grief over the tragic end of her affianced husband.

Carter Harrison was the most popular man in Chicago. He was five times elected Mayor of the City—in 1879, 1881, 1883, 1885 and 1893—the last time by a majority of 50,000. Forsaker predicted his own election in 1889, by a majority of 50,000, but James E. Campbell left him 10,872 behind. Forsaker talks a great deal out of his mouth, but as a prophet he is a lamentable failure.

EX-PRIEST SATTERY gave an anti-Catholic lecture at Central Turner Hall, St. Louis, last Friday evening, before an immense audience. TWO PRESIDENTS FOR BRAZIL.
