Lorain, O., April 1.-From authoritadve sources it is learned that the exet amount of the shortage in the unds of the Citizens' Savings bank is \$97,000. To offset this it is alleged that the three defaulting employes carried indemnity bonds in favor of the bank aggregating \$40,000, and in addition have turned over real estate and other property to the bank to the value of \$12,000, leaving the net loss to the institution of \$45,000. The affairs of the bank have been placed in the hands of T. F. Fancher as assignee. Cashler Edward Kaneen has turned over every cent he possessed, but it will not go far toward making good the shortage. He declares that he had no intention of wrongdoing at the start. he points with pride to the fact that never played cards or gambled in any other way, and says that he never did a dishonest thing until he began using the bank's money. St. Petersburg, April 1.-The movement for the severance of the traditional bonds between church and state and giving to the Holy Orthodox church independence and self-rule, which will increase its influence among the people of Russia, has found favor with an important group of clergy at the capital; and a noteworthy document setting forth the views of those of this persuasion, which was presented to Metropolitan Antonius of St. Petersburg, has been received with sufficient consideration to insure its publication in the Church Messenger, the semi-official organ of the diocese of St. Petersburg. The document, after arguing that the church should free itself of obligation to the state in order to lend all its energies to the prosecution of its own special work and eliminate the suspicion that its ministrations may be inclined to-ward worldly ends and interests, demands the summoning of a general council of the church to consider means of attaining the greater free-

Double Tragedy. Malone, N. WILLIAM'S SPEECH. Germany Must Enjoy Same Rights as Other Powers.

Tangier, April 1.-Emperor William of Germany paid a flying visit to Tangier, remaining barely two hours on shore. The elaborate program for his reception and entertainment was much changed, the emperor confining himself to a visit to the German legation, where he received deputations of Germans in Morocco. The changed plans caused much comment and disappointment. It was officially explained that the reason for this procedure was the roughness of the sea, but after the departure of the Hamburg it was stated on good authority that Emperor William, having heard that there was a possibility of an anti-French demonstration on the occasion of his visit, desired to avoid such an incident. Another report states that the German legation was informed that an anarchist plot had been discovered, and advised that the emperor be dissuaded from landing.

It is reliably reported that Emperor William, in the course of his speech at the German legation, said: "There is no preponderating influence in Morocco. Germany must enjoy the same rights as other powers. We guarantee that the sovereignty of Morocco shall and will be maintained." This rather defiant version is probably a too free translation of the emperor's words, but it serves as a peg on which London newspapers hang further querulous editorial observations and criticisms as to the meaning of his visit.

Strike-Breakers Coming.

Wheeling, W. Va., April 1 .- The situation at the Whitaker-Glessner mills remained practically unchanged. No new arrivals of strike-breakers occurred, but the local Amalgamated Association is informed that 100 or more strike-breakers are due to report at Wheeling or Martin's Ferry, and steps are being taken to turn the new arrivals back.
