KENYON MILITARY ACADEMY

The Preparatory Department of Kenyon College is the oldest department of the institution. It was founded by Pailander Chase, the pioneer Bishop of Ohio, early in the spring of 1825 and removed to Gambier, the seat of the College, in 1828. Since 1880 it has been operated by a Board of Regents who have leased from the Board of Trustees the buildings and grounds occupied by the Academy.

In June, 1885, the institution was completely reorganized and practically became a new school. Employing sufficient capital to enable the management to assemble all the elements which should characterize a high grade boarding school, it has been able since that date to compete successfully with other Church schools that have been richly endowed. The present character and standing of the schools is the outcome of the patient and earnest efforts bestowed upon it, and it now ranks in all respects with the best preparatory boarding schools in any section of the country. By an efficient corps of instructors, all of whom are college graduates and experienced teachers, boys are given thorough preparation for college, technical school, or business, and at the same time they receive careful training in all that pertains to developing them into refined and cultivated men. The military features of the school are admirably administered and yet, although they are most useful and important, they are subordinated to the higher purposes of the school as a place of intellectual instruction.

They are directed in such a manner that the benefits of the system, so fully recognized by many parents, are obtained, while care is taken not to devote so much time to this department as to interfere with the academic work of the cadets. The discipline is firm and strict but neither harsh nor severe; it appeals to a boy's sense of justice and fairness. Systematic physical training is given during the year in the large and excellent gymnasium.

The pupils live in the school buildings and the masters and cadets form one household. The rooms for the cadets are large enough to accommodate two each, but each cadet has a single bed. Each bedroom floor is under the supervision of a master, who resides upon it, and is thus easily accessible to the cadets under his special care. The masters also take their meals at the same tables with the cadets, and every effort is put forth to make the school life attractive, pleasant and home-like. Furthermore, the boys are taught as far as possible how to study. All school work is looked after carefully and each one is required by his instructors to know and understand thoroughly his lessons every day. In the evening the cadets study in the large study hall under the direction of the Headmaster or one of the Regents. Boys here receive careful training in all that pertains to developing them into refined, cultivated and upright men, but they are not accepted for reformation from vicious or immoral habits.

TERMS AND VACATIONS

The scholastic year is divided into three terms. The Christmas term begins on the third Wednesday in September.

There is a vacation of about three weeks at

Christmas and a short one at Easter. The year closes on the second Thursday in June.

* This does not include laundry of collars and cuffs and white duck trousers, which is charged at the usual steam laundry rate.

† When two or more boys are entered at the same time by the same parent or guardian, the charge is only \$400 for each.

A fee of five dollars is required on entrance for medical attendance for the year. This is practically an insurance against large medical bills and pays for all ordinary medical attendance. In case, however, it becomes necessary to call in special medical counsel, the cost of this service is charged to the parent or guardian of the boy for whom it is rendered.

All cadets are charged ten dollars for the support of the Athletic Association. This includes free admission to all Academy games with visiting teams.

All cadets are charged three dollars for the use of the Academy Library and Reading-room for the year.

A deposit of twenty dollars at entrance and twenty dollars at the beginning of the second term is required in advance, towards the cost of books and incidentals.

A diploma fee of five dollars is required of all graduates.

A fee of five dollars is required of cadets studying Chemistry, to cover cost of chemicals used in experiments.

A fee of five dollars is charged for use of typewriter for the year.

The charge for dancing lessons is seven dollars per term of twelve lessons.

An itemized statement of account will be rendered at the end of each term, or prior to the end if the deposit is exhausted.

Books, stationery, etc., may be obtained at the Academy, at the usual retail prices.

Willful damage to school property is charged to the perpetrators, if known; otherwise it is assessed upon the whole school.

All bills not paid promptly are subject to sight draft, without notice.

Cadets who remain here during vacation must board at the Academy, and they are subject to such regulations as are necessary to good order. The charge will be twenty-five dollars for the Christmas and ten dollars for the Easter vacation, respectively.

All checks should be made payable to the order of Wyant and Williams, Regents.

UNIFORMS

Two suits, a dress and a fatigue, similar to those worn at West Point, have been adopted for the Academy. These suits are to be procured from the Academy tailor, that there may be no variation in style or color. By making a contract with a large and responsible house, we are able to furnish all the suits for the Academy at the following prices: Dress coat, \$11.50; fatigue coat, \$10.25; trousers, \$7.25; the price of the cap is \$2.25. As the coat buttons to the throat, vests are not usually worn, and are not included with the uniforms. A very serviceable overcoat with cape, has been adopted for the Academy. It is warm and well made, and costs \$19.50. No citizen's clothes will be allowed in use after uniforms are supplied.

Boys are not measured for their suits until they have had about two weeks setting-up exercises and have thus acquired, to a certain extent, a military form.

Our uniforms are made of the best Charlottesville Woolen Mills Cadet-gray Cloth, which stands unexcelled in quality, finish and wearing merit.

It has been decided to adopt a Khaki uniform, made of full government standard goods, for fatigue use during the spring and fall. The cost of the suit, including campaign hat and leggins, is \$7.00. This can be easily washed and is the most serviceable uniform for a boy's wear during the warm weather. Furthermore, by the use of this suit at the beginning of a session, more satisfactory fits can be obtained in the case of the regular uniform than if the measurements for the latter are taken immediately on the entrance of the boys and before they have had the benefit of setting-up drill.

CONCERNING ADMISSION

Applicants for admission must be able to enter the First Form as outlined in the Courses of Study. No vicious or insubordinate boy, if admitted through mistake, will be permitted to remain at the Academy. It is a condition upon which cadets are admitted that they are received only for the entire school year, or the remainder of it if it has already begun; but the right is reserved to dismiss a cadet for misconduct, or when his presence is considered prejudicial to the interest of the school. In such cases, no deduction is made for dismissal, suspension or withdrawal from the school.

Catalogues and blank forms of application may be obtained from the Regents, and all communications concerning the Academy should be addressed to them.
