British Army Beef.

London, April 13 .- The director of contracts says concerning the army beef matter: "The new rule applies only to refrigerated beef hitherto bought in the open market in London. It will not seriously affect the American trade, as the total weekly supply of the army is only 200,000 pounds which is barely 2 per cent of the weekly imports of refrigérated beef into England from the United States. WOMAN KILLED WHILE SHE SLEPT.

Aged Husband Says If He Slew His spouse He Knows Nothing of It-A Mysterious Tragedy on a Farm.

Mason, O., April 13 .- Mrs. John Mc-Clung, wife of a retired farmer, was found dead in her bed with her head crushed, and her husband has been arrested charged with the crime. In the morning Mr. McClung called Mrs. Baysore, who occupied a part of the house, and told her that his wife had been murdered while he was at the barn looking after some stock. The coroner held an inquest and directed that McClung be arrested on charge of murder. McClung sat in a stupor, refusing to talk, but in response to a question from the coroner said, "If I killed her I did not know it." He is 68 years old and Mrs. McClung is 60.

McClung is said to be worth \$100,000. It was at first reported that Mrs. Mc-Clung had been killed by robbers.
