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BANK TO OCCUPY LARGER SPACE IN NEAR FUTURE

Alterations in Knox County Savings Bank To Be Of Great Service

TURNER WILL QUIT RESTAURANT BUSINESS

Bank Will Occupy Handsome Quarters In The Basement of Building

By the end of August, the Knox County Savings bank, located on the west side of the public square of this city, will be equipped as few institutions are in this part of the state, for both banking and general civic work.

Remodeling of the building commences on July 5, and the work is expected to be finished by the end of August.

J. F. Turner, owner and manager of the Turner restaurant, which has occupied the basement rooms of the bank building for 29 years, announces that he will close the doors of his restaurant on July 3. In the future he will conduct a lunch counter for the general public in the basement room under the Dever drug store.

In making the needed improvements the Knox County Savings bank will take over the basement of the building. The iron railing and the stairway now in the front will be abolished. The entrance will be at the side of the building where it is now, and access to the basement will be by a stairway on the interior of the building. This stairway will go down at the end of the corridor in the space now occupied by Mr. B. D. Herron's office, which office will be located in the rear of the building. The wall in the front of the building will be rebuilt entirely.

For the present, the rooms in the basement, now occupied by the restaurant, will be turned into a large public rest room, with parlors for both ladies and gentlemen. These rooms will be open at all times and will be accessible to the public through the bank building. The tables and chairs in the rooms will be left for the use of the public. Farmers can eat their basket dinners here whenever they choose. Every possible equipment will be placed in the ladies' parlors for the care and attention of little children.

SUES FOR \$1,600 AS DAMAGES FOR INJURY TO EYES

Guy R. Hogle Files Suit Against Industrial Commission Of Ohio

MAN WAS HURT AT BRIDGE WORKS

Suit To Quiet Title Filed; Other Items From The County Court House

Guy R. Hogle has commenced suit in the Knox county common pleas court against the Industrial Commission of Ohio in which he seeks to recover the sum of \$1,600 for injuries which he is alleged to have sustained while employed at the Mt. Vernon Bridge Works.

The plaintiff claims that on June 3, 1919, while at work at the Bridge works he was struck in the eye with a piece of steel and severely injured. Plaintiff states that he filed his claim under the workman's compensation act with the Industrial Commission of Ohio, asking for damages in the sum of \$1,600. The allegation is made that the defendant has failed and neglected to pay the claim and he therefore asks for judgment in that amount. Ewart & Blair are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

To Quiet Title—

T. P. Barber and others, trustees of the Mt. Pleasant Presbyterian church, have commenced suit in the Knox county common pleas court against Harvey Graham and others for the purpose of quieting title in real estate located in Pleasant township. The plaintiff claims that they have held the property for the past twenty years, but that the defendant claims an estate or interest therein adverse to the plaintiff's rights. The plaintiffs ask that the defendant's right may be declared null and void by the court and that the title quieted against the property. Paul M. Ashbaugh represents the plaintiffs.
