The plaintiff charges that the defendant has been guilty of adultery with George Copeland and Samuel Vanhook. He also alleges that on June 2, 1921, the defendant was out "strolling" on East Ohio avenue at 1:40 a. m. with Frank Jupiter.

The plaintiff therefore asks for a divorce and the custody of the minor children. B. E. Sapp is the attorney for the plaintiff.
