


In the opinion of influential officials the principal feature of alteration will be in the method of department work.

It is a noticeable feature of the Pennsylvania system that each department is a distinct organization, governed by a man invested with authority to dictate the policy of the department over which he has control. According to report such a principle is foreign to the Baltimore & Ohio company, as all departments to a considerable degree are responsible to the executive head of the road, and without authority from that source no action can be taken.
