Of The Epworth League Of The M. E. Church

Held In Parlors On Wednesday Evening

Was Well Attended And A Pleasant Event

After The Banquet Was Served Chairs Were Drawn Back And A Fine Program Of Toasts Given

Practically all arrangements have been completed for the entertainment of visitors at the thirty-ninth annual encampment, G. A. R. department of Ohio, to be held in Washington C. H., Ohio, June 6, 7, 8 and 9, 1905.

A thorough canvass of the city has been made and the scarcity of rooms and lodging usual to such gatherings will be noted for its absence. Sufficient room has been pledged to fully accommodate all who have spoken for them, and there are plenty in reserve to furnish comfortable lodging to any number of visitors who may wish to attend.

Messengers will meet all trains and direct visitors to the headquarters of the bureau of information, where arrangements for entertainment can be made.

The city will be in gala attire, and it is estimated that from \$8,000 to \$10,000 will be spent in the decoration of the public buildings, business blocks and residences. A large number of extra arc lights have been contracted, and all of the principal streets of the city will be brilliantly illuminated.

The general committee on arrangements have exerted every effort and expended large sums of money to ward making this encampment distinctive in the way of attractions for the entertainment of visitors.

The flower parade, to be held on Wednesday afternoon, June 7, is the first thing of the kind ever attempted at a department encampment, and will prove a decidedly novel feature. Fifty large floats, gaily decorated private equipages, forming a parade over a mile in length, will present a pleasing spectacle second only to the Mardi Gras of New Orleans.

The grand parade of the G. A. R. will be held Thursday afternoon, and will be headed by the monster fife and drum corps composed of over 300 musicians, all of whom are veterans of the Civil War.

At least fifty bands and drum corps will participate in the parade, and will include such notable organization as the Jewell Juvenile Drum corps, of Marietta; the A. O. U. W. Drum corps, of Tiffin, and the Toledo Drum corps.

The children of the Ohio Soldiers and Sailors' Orphan home, at Xenia, and every veteran of Fayette and adjoining counties, who is able, will join in this parade.

The competitive drill of the sons of Veterans' Reserves will be held Friday forenoon, and will prove a fitting finale to the many brilliant entertainment features of the week. A prize of \$100 is offered by the committee; \$65 to the first and \$35 to the second. Six companies have already signified their intention of competing.

The grand chorus of over 300 trained voices will give an open-air recital on the court house lawn every morning and afternoon during the encampment.

Among the delightful side trips from Washington C. H. during the encampment, as arranged by Mr. Frank Johnson, chairman of the transportation committee, will be a trip to the soldiers' home at Dayton, and the soldiers and sailors' orphan's home at Xenia, leaving Washington C. H. at 7 a. m., Friday, June 9, and arriving at Xenia at 8 a. m.; leave Xenia home at 9 a. m., arrive at Dayton 9:45 a. m., returning leave Dayton at 3:30 p. m., arriving at Washington C. H. at 5 p. m. Round trip, \$1.

The citizens of Washington C. H. are noted for their hospitality, and on the present occasion every effort will be made toward giving a royal welcome to the distinguished visitors.

For Fast Driving Was An Insurance Agent

And Given A Fine By Mayor Gotshall—Practice Of Fast Driving To Be Broken Up

An insurance agent by the name of Bowers drove into the city from Utica Wednesday evening with a livery rig and he was in an intoxicated condition and driving at a high rate of speed. RESOLUTION

DECLARING IT NECESSARY TO IMPROVE EAST HIGH STREET EASTWARD FROM THE PUBLIC SQUARE TO THE EAST LINE OF ROGERS STREET.

It is resolved by the Council of the city of Mount Vernon, State of Ohio, three-fourths of all members elected thereto concurring:

That it is necessary to improve East High street from the Public Square eastward to the east line of Rogers street in said city, by establishing new curb lines on each side of said street and making a graveled street with suitable curbing, in accordance with the plans, specifications, estimates and profiles of said proposed improvement, now on file in the office of the Board of Public Service of said city, which plans, specifications, estimates and profiles are hereby approved.

That the whole cost of said improvement, less one-fifth the cost and the cost of interest thereon shall be assessed by the foot frontage upon the following described lots and lands, to-wit: All lots and lands bounding and abutting upon the proposed improvement, which said lots and lands are hereby determined to be especially benefited by said improvement, and the cost of said improvement shall include the expense of the preliminary and other surveys and of publishing notices, resolutions and ordinances required and the serving of notices, the cost of construction, together with interest on bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of deferred assessments, and all other necessary expenditures.

That bonds of the city shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of assessments by instalments in an amount equal thereto.

That the remainder of the entire cost of said improvement, including the expense of said improvement, shall be paid through the issuance and sale of bonds in the manner provided by law.

A notice of the passage of this resolution shall be served by the Clerk of Council, upon the owners of each piece of property to be assessed, in the manner provided by law for the service of summons in civil actions. Provided that if any of said owners be not residents of the county or in case the owner cannot be found, then a notice of the passage of said resolution shall be published at least twice in some newspaper of general circulation in said city.

Be it further resolved that the Clerk be and he is hereby directed to cause this resolution to be published according to law.
