RUSSIANS EXPECT NEWS OF A NAVAL BATTLE

New York, May 18.—With the queenly American schooner Atlantic leading the way, a splendid fleet of Touch Of Each Other

St. Petersburg, May 18. - Keen interest is manifested in naval and military circles here in the field of war. There is a strong possibility the authorities here that Admiral De that Vice Admiral Rojestvensky has cut his last communications with home and set forth on the final stage of his journey to his goal, either Admiral Togo or Viadivostok. Though the admiralty, which has

been silent ever since the advent of Rojestvensky in the Chinese sea, publishes no dispatches, the conviction is growing that the united squadrons departed from the Annam coast immediately after their juncture, and naval officials are anxiously expecting news of the first skirmishes between scouts of the hostile fleets. That the whole cost of said improvement, less one-fiftleth thereof and the cost of intersections shall be assessed by the foot frontage upon the following described lots and lands, to-wit: All lots and lands bounding and abutting upon he proposed improvement, which said lots and lands are hereby determined to be especially benefited by said improvement, and the cost of said improvement shall include the expense of the preliminary and other surveys and of publishing notices, resolutions and ordinances required and the serving of notices, the cost of construction, together with intersection bonds issued in anticipation of the

nances required and the serving of notices, the cost of construction, together with interest on bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of deferred as essments, and all other necessary expenditures.

That bonds of the city shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of assessments by installments in an amount equal thereto. That the remainder of the entire cost of said improvement, including cost of intersections, shall be paid through the issuance and sale of bonds in the manner provided by law.
