## SENIOR PLAY ONE OF SCHOOL'S BEST

"320 College Avenue"  
Earns Rating Of  
"Splendid"

"The play's the thing."

Ask any member of the Mount Vernon high school 1939 senior class. Ask any one of the 600 persons who crowded into Aldini auditorium for the annual senior play, "320 College Avenue," Friday evening.

They will all say the same thing: "It was splendid."

Presented by a cast of 27 boys and girls, the production represented the height of scholastic stage ability, kept members of the audience in constant suspense and furnished a fitting ending to the career of Joe Hantman, one of the best youthful actors ever turned out of Mount Vernon high school.

Hantman shared top honors for the evening with Marjorie Harris and Louis Jahnke, but their performances were not far ahead of the other 24, all but three of whom were on the stage most of the three acts.

The unusual and highly entertaining theme centered around the attempts of Hantman, cast as a detective, to solve the murder of Lee Macon (Don Dowds). The murder occurred during a party in a sorority house headed by the campus sweetheart, Judith Wayne (Marjorie Harris). The murder was committed while Lee was dancing with Judith and while the lights were out. The instrument of death was a hatpin
