### ORDERS MODIFIED

#### Soft Drink Dealers Win Fight Against Sterilization of Glasses

The state board of health has modified its order that soda fountain glasses be placed in boiling water or under live steam for a period of three to five minutes.  
The new requirement is that the glasses be washed in hot water, treated with soap or a detergent powder. The thorough sterilization of spoons, which was included in the former order, still obtains.  
Soda fountain dealers protested against the old order on the contention that the prescribed sterilization process caused too many glasses to break. In many cities the dealers either began the use of paper cups or increased the price of sodas to 10 cents. Glass manufacturers said it was injuring their business.
